CITY AND VICINITY

We are sorry to have to chronicle the death of Charles Edward infant son of Dr. and Mrs. Geo. Storer.

The Sunday school convention of this low county (non-denominational) will meet in Jack'sville, May 17th and 18th.

The large display fountain for Cedar Grove Cemetery has been shipped for its destination and will probably be here and in operation by the 10th.

The postal car for the W. N. & N. Railroad has arrived at Wilmington, and will be put on the route this week with Postmaster Clark in charge.

The Beautour Herald says that the wreckage that washed ashore on Lookout a week ago was from the British schooner Pearl abandoned off Frying Pan shoals, March.

The burning of the Hamilton & Lines mill at Greenville is a severe loss to them. It was a large mill and was totally destroyed. Loss \$12,000. Almost no insurance.

Mr. J. H. Ellis received a telegram yesterday from Capt. E. W. Linton of the safe arrival of the schooner Melvin at Baltimore from the West Indies with a cargo of molasses. This is a quick trip. It only five weeks last Friday since she left New Bern for the West Indies.
