## TO BE PROSECUTED.

### Action will be Taken Against the Sanctificationists.

### Sudden Rise in a River. Discord in Populists Ranks. Not Satisfied with Railroad Commission.

### Marshall Carroll Sick. Quaker Meeting.

RALEIGH, N. C., August 10.—Governor Russell has received such advice regarding the conduct of the "sanctified bands" now on the coast of this State that he directs the solicitors of two districts to prosecute them. They are now working in Carteret county mainly.

Saturday French Broad river, near Marshall, rose eight feet in four hours. It swept away a man and woman who were in a buggy. Her body was found today ten miles down stream.

It is learned that earnest efforts are being made to effect reconciliation between Governor Russell and Senator Pritchard, who for months have been at outs.

Eight members of the Populist State committee, which meets here Wednesday are said to be friends of Congressman Skinner and inimical to Senator Butler. They will try to oust A. E. Fountain as Populist State chairman. The meeting will be lively, as Butler will do some plain talking.

Some leading populists are now declaring that unless the railway commission takes more positive action in reducing rates and increasing taxable values the next Legislature will abolish it.

Rain is badly needed in the counties along the northern border of the State.

United States Marshal O. J. Carroll is very sick at Connelly's Springs. It looks quite like collapse. It is the plan to take him to Buffalo Springs.

Letters to the commissioner of agriculture from prominent Colorado populists say many are coming from that State to North Carolina.

At the yearly meeting of the Quakers, or Friends, at High Point only about five thousand persons were present. Usually there are double that number. Distinctive Quaker dress is now entirely discarded.

Today the election is being held to ascertain if the voters are willing to levy a special tax, not to exceed 10 cents on the \$100 and 20 cents on poll, to maintain public schools. A spirited campaign has been waged in few places, but in most of the townships there is no interest.

Captain Claude B. Denison, for fifteen years one of the principals of the King-Mountain Academy, is now at Norfolk, and in September takes charge of the King-Mountain Academy.

The state road is being put on the Baptist Female University here. In all ways the work is being pushed in order to get the building in readiness for three hundred students by November 1st.

Though the shipments of choice grapes from this city continue, yet prices are very low. It is a disappointment to the growers, who felt sure of high prices.

## WHEAT STILL JUMPING.

Advance of Two Cents. Stocks are Strong. Cotton Only Steady.

NEW YORK, August 10.—The attempt of yesterday evening to cause reaction was continued with the aid of London at the opening. After the first hour the market steadied on the renewed buying account.

The advance in wheat caused another advance and stocks gradually worked to a higher level gaining from one to two per cent. upon the day.

Cotton. Rains in Texas and a condition of 80.4 for Government estimate of condition caused a five point break in the early session. Bears could awaken no enthusiasm and the market became dull and narrow closing unchanged.

Wheat. Stronger cables were effective and caused a strong opening. Later foreign advices higher with good demand caused a steady advance of two cents per bushel. Realizing by those who always fear Government crop reports caused some reaction but the closing prices showed a cent advance for the day.

The Government report should be a conservative one and wheat should continue to advance.

## THE END IS EXPECTED.

### Pittsburg Mine Operators Say That Destitution Will Soon Cause the Strikers to Yield.

### Fireman Gets \$2,500 from Yadkin Valley Railroad.

### Improvement at Fair Grounds. Business in the State Improving. Bankers Association Incorporated. Meeting of Populist Committee.

RALEIGH, N. C., August 11.—At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the State Fair it was decided to let a sub-committee arrange for putting in permanent boilers for machinery and also to electrically light the buildings and grounds at night.

Seventy-five persons left here for Red Springs, Robeson county, to attend the Baptist Sunday School Chautauque, which continues all this week. The gathering will be a large one.

Five negroes were sent to jail by Mayor Russ today for throwing stones at excursion transients. They will all be sent to the penitentiary. The penalty is severe in this State for this offense.

The Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railway pays a fireman, McCutchen, \$500, as a compromise for a strange injury. He was under the engine, cleaning out the fire-box, when another engine bumped the one he was under. He was dragged over the glowing coals and horribly burned. He shed the roof for \$500, under the new law servant liability law.

Commercial travelers agree in reporting business as extraordinary good in this State, with heavy orders, and a fine outlook. "The best certainly since 1889."

The State Board of Equalization of Taxes is to meet here on the 16th. It does not appear that, under the very defective law, it can do much this year or next.

The North Carolina Bankers' Association was incorporated by the Secretary of State, T. H. Battle, J. E. Burton and J. C. Hales being incorporators. The Business Men's Association of Durham, was also incorporated, the incorporators being W. A. Slater, A. E. Lloyd, L. W. Vaughan, T. J. Lambert, W. H. Proctor.

The semi-annual dividend of \$90,000 on the North Carolina railway, was paid the State today.

The annual meeting of the State Farmers Alliance has been at Hillsboro.

Some interesting developments are looked for at the meeting of the Populist State Committee here today.

Senator Butler is working like a beaver to have things go his way. There is a strong element working to consummate.

Improvements on the Erie Canal.

NEW YORK, August 9. Contracts were awarded for a portion of the improvements on the State canal system, for which the people voted two years ago, and which, when completed, will cost \$2,000,000, and will open navigation between this city and ports on the great lake for most of the large vessels now employed in lake transportation.

The most of the improvement will be met by an issue of State bonds, the sale of which was deferred during the hard times of the last two years.

Iron Industry Booming.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., August 9. The Birmingham Rolling Mill Company is now running and will at once begin making its own necessary steel production. The Alabama Rolling mill at Gate City will be in operation in a few days in all departments. The entire plant has been thoroughly overhauled. There is a general building boom and over \$200,000 has been put into business and residence houses.

Blondie Gold Fields.

TORONTO, Ont., August 9. A special report to the Hon. Mr. O'Rourke says that the Dominion Government has received several important documents regarding the working of the gold fields of the Yukon country. It has been decided to appoint an administrator for the gold fields, who shall have charge of the Canadian operations there.

The party of mounted police to leave Manitoba next week for the gold country has been increased from twenty to thirty five. They will take with them two Maxim guns.

A Court of Administration for civil and military justice, has also been established upon Justice McGuire, of Prince Albert, is to preside over the court.

GRIEVING FOR CANOVAS.

Will be Interred in the Pantheon With Great Honors.

MATRUH, August 10. The Queen's agent has decided that the military honors observed in the case of the funeral of the late Premier of Spain, Sr. Don Camarillo Del Castillo.

The body of the Spanish statesman will arrive here on Wednesday morning accompanied by his widow with the Minister for the Colonies, representing the Queen Regent.

The pall bearers will be an academician, an admiral, the president of the Senate, a knight of the Golden Fleece and Marshal Martinez De Campos. The interment will take place in the Pantheon. Funeral services will take place simultaneously in all the churches throughout the country, and the official mourning will last three days.

## STATE CROP REPORT

Conditions are Favorable. Small To Large Increase.

SPECIAL TO JOURNAL.

RALEIGH, N. C., August 10. The State crop report for August based on the returns from over six hundred correspondents, gives perspective of present conditions as follows: Cotton 10% (highest ever recorded—over 91 tubers 88, and 87, pounds 72. Last August cotton was 91 cent, 20 tubers 85, pounds 82.) Average in tubers reported as only 53 percent of average.

## THE TIDE OF IMMIGRATION.

To the United States at the Lowest Point Since 1892.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 11. The tide of immigration to the United States since the General Government resumed jurisdiction of the subject in 1892. The number of arrivals from all countries according to Treasury statistics, during the last fiscal year, was 230,822, a decrease as compared with the previous year of 11,775. The latter's immigration of any previous year was in 1890, when the number from all countries was 250,948. During the same period of Federal immigration, 1,570,000 immigrants had entered the United States.

WILLIAM IN RUSSIA.

EMPEROR OF GERMANY RECEIVED BY THE CAESAR.

LEIPZIG, August 9th. The Emperor and Empress of Germany have passed on to Krasnoyarsk the great military camp where they were received by the Czar and Czarina. Upon the arrival of their Majesties, the band played "Heil der Kaiser." The German Emperor greeted the troops in Russian. Their Majesties then proceeded to the Alexander Palace, dined in private, and after ward witnessed a performance at the theatre.

The military review at Camp Krasnoyarsk was a grand spectacle. Troops of the Emperor of the Grand Duke Vladimir were drawn up in a square in the center of which was the Imperial tent. The Grand Ducal suite was formed in the St. Petersburg formation.

The Emperor of the Russian Czar was in that of a Duke of the Guards. The German Emperor, the Czarina and the Dowager Empress were seated in four horse carriages and after driving along the front of the Indian square, took a position directly in front of the tent, from which point the Czar took his gun and performed much part.

COXEY FOR GOVERNOR.

OHIO POPULISTS DECLINE TO FREE, AND NOMINATE THEIR OWN TICKET.

COLUMBUS, O., August 11.—Fusion was repudiated today by the Populists of Ohio in a manner so emphatic as to leave no chance for controversy regarding the future policy of the party.

The Populist State Convention by an overwhelming majority, severed the alliance made a year ago with the Democrats on the free silver issue and nominated a full State ticket, headed by Jacob Coxey, of "Commonwealth" fame, as the nominee for Governor.

## ELECTRIC RAILROAD

### Proposed to Run from Morganton to Blowing Rock.

### List of Bank Stock Owners. Two Weddings in Raleigh. Big Cotton Crop. Moonshine on the Increase. Importance of the Populist Session.

RALEIGH, N. C., August 12. A large and enthusiastic meeting of the citizens of Morganton was held Tuesday to consider plans for the furtherance of the Morganton and Blowing Rock electric railway.

As a result of their deliberation, a committee of ten consisting of W. R. Carter, J. J. Watauga, Milton Shearer, of Caldwell; Samuel Hoffman, W. C. Erwin, Frank P. Tate, W. E. Walton, J. E. Spaulding, of Burke, and Walter Brown, of Charlotte, and Messrs. A. H. Hayden, E. K. Bruner, was appointed to have a preliminary survey made, prepare and obtain a charter for the company, to be known as the Morganton and Blowing Rock Electric Company, to solicit subscriptions to the capital stock, and to do such other and further acts in aid of the organization and completion of this enterprise as may be deemed necessary for the permanent organization of the said company.

Double the amount of money estimated as necessary to make the preliminary survey was subscribed on the spot, and it is expected that a much larger amount of stock will be taken as soon as the committee presents the subscription list. The meeting adjourned to meet at the call of Mr. J. J. Davis, chairman.

Under the provisions of a new section of the revenue act the State Auditor has obtained a list of all bank stock owners, and he is sending the names to each sheriff, so that it can be seen who the stock is held in.

The State crop report shows that the percentage of condition of the cotton is the highest ever recorded, 102. The average is at least 25 percent greater than it was last season, and it all means an immense crop for this State, very possibly over 200,000 bales.

It is hardly to be expected that night moonshine distillery was captured in Raleigh. The owner had fled. Moonshine is on the increase.
