## MAY NOT CARRY.

### Election For Bonds For City Improvement May Fail.

Good Prospects For Trinity St. Mary's Fund Being Raised. More Squirrels For the Square. Operation on Governor. Trouble at Winston.

There does not seem to be very much feeling of certainty as to the carrying of the election for the issue of \$50,000 of city bonds in September for street improvements. A new registration is needed and very few have registered. Those opposed to the issue assert that the street committee will employ mostly outside labor, and thus the working class will vote against the measure.

Governor Russell has issued a commission to George L. Morton of Wilmington as the Commander of the North Carolina Naval Battalion. Lieut. Winslow of New Bern was once the commander. All the schools over the State seem to have bright prospects for the fall term. Trinity College at Durham has had one hundred and one thousand dollars added to its endowment fund and opens school September 8th with fine prospects. Women are admitted to all classes in this college. The Baptists will not be able to open their Female University here in October as they hoped to do.

The work of raising funds for the purchase of St. Mary's by the three dioceses of this State goes on steadily. It was a big undertaking, but all who have ever had the opportunity of attending this school feel an interest in seeing it a permanent.

The penitentiary board adjourned yesterday. There was only one item of interest before the board and that was that it has become notorious, the amount of people (families of the officers) who are fed at the State's expense, so the board ordered that board should be paid for the families of the officers—also was routine business.

Mr. A. F. Wimshol of Oxford will succeed Mr. J. J. Bernard as book-keeper September 1st.

### Market Advances Thirty-three Points Yesterday.

Stocks Continue Very Strong With Gains Wheat Excited With Wild Fluctuations. Predictions Said to be for Higher Prices.

NEW YORK, August 23.—The beginning of the new week brought buying orders and the feeling extremely bullish.

Prices opened at a point advance of Saturday's close and continued upward showing a gain over two per cent.

The dollar mark for Saturday brought a reaction, despite higher foreign market. Trading was wild. The visible supply of wheat decreased one-half million bushels. More than this was expected, and caused renewed realizing.

Dollar wheat in Minneapolis was sold for the floor of the Exchange by a brass band headed by the big flour mill Pillsbury.

A correspondent of the London Chronicle, in a letter from Cuba, tells of further cruelty and distress on that island. He says the patients are dying by the hundreds, their bodies tainting the air close to the Spanish fort.

The Winston Tobacco Board of Trade held an enthusiastic meeting this afternoon and organized a Tobacco Fair Association and selected an Executive Committee to formulate plans for a big tobacco fair for exposition to be held the first of November.

The first sale of North Carolina new cotton was sold at Marvin, Saturday to the Harrison Company. It was raised by Steven West, weighed 161 pounds, dressed good middling, and sold for 8c.

The Spanish government has prohibited the publication in Spain of the telegraphing abroad of the details of the execution of Michael Angiolillo, the Spanish anarchist who shot and killed Senator Canovas Del Castillo, the Premier of Spain on Sunday, August 21st.

Secretary Sherman has received prompt acknowledgment from Minister Hoshi of Japan, of the Secretary's letter of last Saturday, relating to the annexation of Hawaii to the United States. Mr. Hoshi's acknowledgment is formal.

Mr. Thomas Le Bourgeois, from St. Charles parish, near New Orleans, died of the Staphylococcus bacilli, after three months illness, aged sixty. She was a native and a woman of fine talents. Her husband was a prominent citizen of New Orleans.
