RIGHT TO LICENSES.

Question Whether County Commissioners Can Grant Them.

Commissioners Chatham County Hold They Can Grant Liquor Licenses. Decision of Judge Adams.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, N. C., September 29.—The county commissioners of Chatham county, held they had a right to refuse liquor licenses to any one.

Mandamus proceedings were instituted to require them to issue license.

Judge Adams issues a mandamus ordering them to pass on each particular case, and find the facts in each, and if facts agree with statute, then license must be issued.

This gives the commissioners discretion only so far as finding facts.

Protected by Troops. Special to Journal. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., September 29.—A portion of the State troops have been called out at Apalachicola to protect a white man who recently killed a negro boy by cutting his throat.

Latest News Items. The yellow fever fright has struck the State of Texas in earnest. Nearly all of the towns in eastern and southern Texas have declared stringent quarantine against Houston.

Captain-General Weyler has published a decree of debarment still in force prohibiting the exportation of Cuban tobacco, produce and in the provinces of Havana and Pinar del Rio.

George Fred. Williams, of Baltimore, was nominated for Governor of Massachusetts by the Democratic State convention on a platform that squarely endorses that adopted by the national convention at Chicago last summer.

Captain Augustus E. Blom has left Washington for Norfolk, Va., where he will take charge as master of the new Diamond shield light-ship No. 69 on her arrival from New York.

The Blackfoot Indian reservation in Montana will soon be thrown open to settlement.

Three members of the expedition which went to Peru last March have returned. They tell a story of privation and hard luck, and give anything but a glowing account of the Peruvian gold fields.

The Prussian police are on the track of a powerful anti-alcoholic movement in South Germany, which includes many members of the best families, among them two notable university professors.

The Berlin authorities are endeavoring to conduct the inquiry with the utmost secrecy.

Neal Dow, the veteran Prohibitionist, is dying, at Portland, Me.

State Department officials (denial) the state attributed to Canadian sources that the United States is negotiating with Denmark for the acquisition of Greenland. It is positively denied that the United States has any designs upon the territory in that part of the world.

The Queen Regent of Spain has accepted the Cabinet's resignation. But has asked General Aznaraga to continue in office until a solution of the crisis is found. Her Majesty will summon the leaders of the various parties of the presidents of the chambers to consult as to the situation. Senor Sagasta has been telegraphed for, and it is believed that the liberal leader will be asked to form a Cabinet. It is said that Senor Sagasta is in favor of superseding Captain-General Weyler, and of granting autonomy to Cuba immediately.

The three days' session of the Labor convention in Chicago ended in a climax of incendiary speeches. E. M. Bannister, of St. Louis, chairman of the convention resigned the gavel to introduce a resolution advising strikers in general to arm themselves for resistance, when necessary.

Fire broke out in the central power station of the Capital Traction company, at Washington and in thirty minutes the magnificent six story structure was doomed. The building occupies the entire block from Pennsylvania avenue to G street, and from Thirteenth and One-half to Fourteenth streets. The blaze started on the southwest corner, and despite the efforts of the entire fire department swept like wild through the enormous building. The heat was so intense that the men were driven from the building street.

CRISIS APPROACHING.

Resignation of the Spanish Cabinet Creates Excitement.

The Spanish Minister De Lome Returns Hastily to Washington. The Queen Regent Arrived in the Spanish Capital.

Special to Journal. NEW YORK, September 29.—It is announced this afternoon from Madrid that the Spanish Cabinet has resigned.

The Queen Regent returned to the Spanish Capital yesterday and it was apparent that some event of importance was at hand.

The Spanish Minister, Dupuy De Lome, returned yesterday to Washington unexpectedly from Lenox, Mass., where he has spent the summer with his family. Upon his arrival he went to the State Department to see the Secretary of State.

The State Department officials are very reticent and no intimation of the contents of the cipher dispatching passing between the two Capitals is given.

STILL PRAISING RUSSELL. Butler Approves His Appointees. Hearing of the Lease Matter. Maj. Wilson Declines Invitation of Sheriff to Go.

Journal Bureau. RALEIGH, N. C., Sept. 29. The hearing of the lease matter before Hon. Kerr Craig still goes on here today. The files of the Tidewater were introduced in the evidence yesterday to show that Col. A. B. Andrews, the vice-president of the Southern R. R. was a stockholder, and to show false and misleading statements that had been made by the Southern Railway as to the earnings of the N. G. R. R., etc., but special Master Craig ruled such evidence out of order. It will be strange if any thing against Col. Andrews can be proved.

North Carolina receives from the Peabody fund this year \$2400 in scholarships at the Peabody college at Nashville and \$5,400 in cash.

Chairman J. W. Wilson of the R. R. Commission had served on him a written notice by the Sheriff of Burke county from L. C. Caldwell denouncing the wife of R. R. Commissioner, Maj. Wilson, as a "most respectfully decline to accede to your request."

The will of the late M. B. R. Harding was admitted to probate yesterday. The estate is valued at \$20,000 to be equally divided between his wife and five children.

Judge Robinson of the Criminal court has in charge to the grand jury called upon them to indict railroad officials for giving free passes that it has long been overlooked but is on the statute books and it is the duty of all the Superior court judges to charge the grand jury to bring in an indictment against any railroad that is known to have violated this law. This created some comment. Judge Robinson is the first judge that has so charged.

The incense, Butler's paper, endorses the course Russell has taken in the R. R. commission case. He denounces the rightful commissioners, and praises Russell's new appointees. This same paper calls for a full investigation of the pending matter and says remove in South of the charges are proved.

TAMMANY'S CANDIDATE.

Nomination of W. O. Van Wyck For Mayor of Greater New York.

Special to Journal. NEW YORK, September 30th.—Tammany has put to nomination Judge W. O. Van Wyck as its candidate for Mayor of Greater New York. Judge Van Wyck is a brother-in-law of Gen. Robert F. Hoke.

CANNOT SHIP CATTLE

Into Virginia from this State Works Hardships

Railroad Lease Case Goes to Salisbury. Important Cases Before State Supreme Court. Ice in Ashe County, State Fair October 18th.

Journal Bureau. RALEIGH, N. C., Sept. 30. Special Master Kerr Craig yesterday afternoon finished the hearing here in the railroad lease matter and nothing was developed. It will be continued in Salisbury October 15.

Mr. Thos. W. Strange of Wilmington has been appointed standing master in equity for this district, the appointment being made by Judge T. R. Funnell and approved by circuit Judges Simonton and Goff and Chief Justice Fuller.

The railroad commission today is handling the telephone rate question.

Col. A. B. Andrews and party yesterday returned from his delightful month's trip to the Pacific coast.

Governor Russell emphatically denies the interview he is credited with in the Washington Post.

Commissioner of Agriculture McWhorter has received notification that after October 1st until November 15th no cattle can be shipped from this State into Virginia. The notification comes from the Board of Control of the Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station at Blacksburg. It will work great hardships on the cattle raisers of the Western counties.

Bids will be advertised for and the contract awarded for the \$20,000 building to be put up by the Capital club of this city by October 10th.

Mr. W. S. McCombs of Harvill-Graecy Maryland was here yesterday with another gentleman looking out the prospect of establishing a Republican paper.

Bishop Cheshire of this State has returned from his visit abroad. He has been gone three months.

The commissioner of labor statistics J. Y. Hamrick will leave tomorrow to visit the different furniture factories and mines in the State. The mines in Montgomery, Randolph and Guilford will be specially looked after.

The Supreme court has heard argument in a case of general interest. The last legislature passed a law giving to chiefs of Superior court power to appoint inspectors of timber. The constitutionality of the law has been attacked.

The Supreme court also heard argument in the case where the State Treasurer declines to pay the cost of the 605 oyster cases from Pamlico to the amount of \$4,200. These cases were all consigned. The decision will be watched for with interest.

It is said that in Ashe county last week there was plenty of ice, and the crop injured.

The State Fair authorities have undoubtedly been more than ever active in preparations for the fair next month. It begins October 18th.

The October bulletin of the Agricultural department is in the hands of the public printer. It will give a complete list of all North Carolina factories.

The Young Men's State Republican League will hold its first convention here October 19.

MORGAN IN HAWAII.

All the Better Classes Favor Annexation. The Treaty Has Been Passed by the Hawaiian Senate.

NEW YORK, September 30.—United States Senator Morgan in a dispatch to the Herald, mailed from Honolulu, September 29, and telegraphed tonight from San Francisco, says:

"There is no active or organized opposition to annexation in Hawaii. Some royalists naturally regret every step that leads to the dedication of the country to free self government, which is now beyond reversal, and they excite the apprehensions of some natives that annexation will tend to their social degradation. But the effort and its results are insignificant. The less informed classes are

free from political axes, and the colored natives are free from all jealous toward the white race. Their desire for annexation is intense and earnestly patriotic. They are Americans in the most decided form, without any tinge of Asiatic theories of forms of civilization. They copy nothing from the Asiatics, while they eagerly adopt the customs and manners of the Americans."

Interesting dispatches have been received from Admiral Meyer, commanding the naval forces at Hawaii, and from Mr. Harold Sewall, the United States minister at Honolulu, in regard to the course of events in that quarter up to the 19th instant. Official confirmation is given of the press report that the treaty of annexation with the United States was unanimously ratified by the Hawaiian senate in special session on the 30th instant.

FOR MAYOR OF NEW YORK. NEW YORK, September 28. Benjamin F. Tracy, the former Secretary of the Navy, was tonight nominated by the convention of the Republican organization for Mayor of Greater New York. Seth Low the nominee of the Citizens Union, got less than 500 of the 200,000 votes cast.

His name was received by the delegates and spectators with great interest, and Jacob Worth, the leader of the opposition to Senator Platt, was expected to announce his withdrawal from the contest. Some of the delegates, however, expressed any intention to bolt the crowd, but failed.

The Citizens Union, several days ago announced that the withdrawal of Low was out of the question, and the Republican committee at the same time proposed an ultimatum to the effect that if Low was not acceptable to the Republican committee, a union of the anti-Tammany forces seems now unlikely.
