

Attorney of the Eastern District of North Carolina, he succeeded H. A. Hill, who was captured in office, and his successor should be appointed.

### WILL CAUSE A FIGHT

To Preserve the Civil Service Laws, Armor Plate Plant Location

JOURNAL BUREAU, D. C., Nov. 3.—

The opinion is growing in Washington that the civil service law will have to fight for its existence during the coming session of Congress. Gen. Grover Cleveland, in a long speech at the extra session, made the positive statement that he had enlisted for the war and that he will be held for the repeal of the entire law would be pushed this winter. Some of those who have made it a point to ascertain how members of the House would stand on a vote on the Grover Cleveland bill, expressed the opinion that it would pass. Speaker Reed has not made known his attitude towards the bill, and upon that depends whether it can be got to a vote. Some of his personal friends think that, whether he favored or opposed the bill, it would be good policy, if he has not abandoned his Presidential aspirations, for him to allow the bill to be voted upon. It is believed that although President McKinley favors the civil service law personally, he will not feel called upon to intercede in its favor.

On the 11th there is to be a large gathering of ladies here to attend a big missionary meeting. It will be one of the largest gatherings of ladies ever held here.

Charlotte has raised \$4,200 for a monument to Governor Vance. Asheville has already raised a shaft to his memory. Only a few hundred dollars has been secured for a memorial here, and but little of that came from the citizens of Raleigh. An old Vance homestead at Charlotte was sold this week for \$1,300.

Governor Russell is being criticized for granting so many pardons, and also for sparing them so severely. Many times a convict has been pardoned and no one out side of the penitentiary has been told.

Today like Sunday is an ideal day. While the ground is rather damp the sun will soon have it all right.

Judge Purnell is holding U. S. court in Wilmington this week. He opens court here Dec. 6th. There are about 100 cases docketed for the court here.

On the 8th of November Judge Purnell will be in Richmond, Va., to take up the Heney-Langdon case at Chambers. The sale of the Cumming mines will be either confirmed or rejected. Judge Purnell will make his initial appearance in the court of appeals in Richmond. Chief Justice Fuller will preside.

The hunting season is fully opened and partridges are plentiful.

In the Superior court here there was today argument heard in an interesting case. When the Bank of New Hanover failed its branch bank at Wadesboro was solvent. The argument was one whether the assets of this branch shall be paid first to the creditors of this branch or be distributed to the general creditors of the Bank of New Hanover. A receiver was appointed when the bank failed, but the State Treasurer said he only had the right to move to appoint a receiver. It was decided he was right. The question to be decided is whether the State Treasurer was right in upholding the State Treasurer's ideas.

There are 45 public libraries in the State according to a list prepared by the State Librarian. In these 45 libraries there is a total of 200,000 volumes. There is also a private library of 50,000 volumes in Mitchell county that is open to the public.

Cotton is being brought in in much larger quantities within the last few days.

Haynes who was convicted of murder in the first degree in Columbus county had his death sentence commuted to life imprisonment. He is scarcely more than an idiot. Solicitor Seawell who prosecuted him forwards a strong petition for this commutation.

The crop of acorns, nuts and chestnuts is very large this fall.

The situation is considerably brighter in this city, everybody feeling that the present cold spell is going to kill the fever. There was heavy frost all over the State last night, and the effect of it is shown by the receipt of a number of orders for goods by local merchants from places which had quarantined against New Orleans.

### CRUISE OF TORPEDO BOATS
