MORMONS ACTIVE.

They Have Forty-Four Missions in this State.

What Bank Examiner Crowder Says: Old Veteran Gone. North Carolina Exhibit Car, Mandamus Case Argued by Simmons and Ward.

JOURNAL BUREAU, FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., Nov. 6. That the Mormons are determined to do a great deal of work in North Carolina is clearly shown by the fact that they have increased the number of their missions in this State to 44, and that nearly all the 42 Apostles will assist in holding the 18th State conference.

Senator Daniels left for Virginia this morning, after filing exceptions to the railway commissioners rate reduction on telephone rentals. He will return on the 16th and make argument.

Prof. W. E. Abernethy of Rutherford College says he greatly desires to meet Rev. Dr. Kilgo in debate. They are well matched in intellect and force as speakers.

Bank examiner Crowder returned to the treasury department today, having examined 16 State banks in the Piedmont section. He finds them all right. In one he found \$45,000 in gold, and in another \$5,000. He says there is prosperity everywhere save in the cotton ginning counties.

David Hugh died this morning at the Soldiers' home. He served during the war in Company, E, 4th N. C. regiment from Wake county. He was born in Sept. 1825.

The prospects for the speedy completion of the Durham and Charlotte railway are excellent.

Gen. Chigman was buried at Concord yesterday, the pall bearers being soldiers of his old brigade. He was buried in his uniform as a Confederate brigadier general.

The hands-on car which is to go into 30 or more streets to advertise North Carolina will arrive here next Wednesday from the shops at Wilmington. It is a fine machine which can be placed in it.

Gov. Patton, whose wife was found guilty of assault in Henderson county, is the last arrival at the penitentiary. He gets 15 years. Twelve convicts were sent from the penitentiary to the cotton farms today.

It is said that 500 convicts on the farm only some 200 are able to pick cotton, owing to chills and fever.

All the families who have been removed from the penitentiary in accordance with the recent order of the directors. Four families were living in the prison.

In the suit of John B. Hussy of Washington, D. C., against U. S. Marshall O. J. Carroll for \$100, Justice of the Peace John Nichols gave Hussy \$25. Carroll appealed. Nichols says that Carroll's offer to give Hussy a suit of clothes was evidence of indebtedness or obligation, and Hussy's making a draft on him for \$25 was evidence that that was about the amount proper.

Before Judge Robinson here last night a chamberlain there was argument in a mandamus case, brought by L. A. Garner clerk of court of Carteret county, to compel the State Treasurer to pay a \$750 warrant issued by a collector, E. M. Farnham, in the Carteret county road matter. Simmons and Ward and Abernethy appeared for Garner, and Day and MacRae and J. C. L. Harris for Treasurer Worth. The Attorney General does not appear. The question was asked why he never appears for the Governor or the Treasurer. The answer is that they ignore him. It is rumored that one of the reasons why he did not appear in that case is because he had advised the treasurer to pay the warrant. State Treasurer Worth has offered \$1,500 to compromise those Carteret claims and from Fayetteville, the latter amounting to \$5,000. Yet claims he has no money and that there is no law for its payment. The popular indignation of these claims seems to be that the other who performed this service were not allowed under the existing terms of the law to demand their fee in a balance from the state or in other cases. But the same statute which provides that they shall not demand their fee in advance from the state provided that in case the state is adjudged against that state they shall be paid to the same way as other claims against the state.

Chairman Wilson of the railway commission filed with the State Auditor for his voucher for salary to date. Next Monday his case comes up at Morganton involving title to his office.

President Hobbs of Guilford college is here. He says the college is quite prosperous.

During October here there were only 2.62 inches of rain. The deficiency this year is 18.94 inches.

OFF FOR CUBA.

President Tells Lee "God Speed" and God Bless You.

Sails for the Island on Wednesday Wants Peace but is Ready for War. Intervention Believed to be the Only End.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 7. General Fitzhugh Lee, consul general to Cuba, will leave for New York tomorrow. When he is to sail for Havana on the steamer Segura.

General Lee called at the White House and notwithstanding the fact that the cabinet was about to meet the President and the Consul General had a conference about Spain and the United States, which lasted about twenty minutes.

The President was very tender in saying good-bye to General Lee. As he pressed the General's hand he said: "God, speed and God bless you." Secretary of the President Porter and Judge Day, who were standing near, referred to the scene as quite affecting.

The President impressed on the Consul General the importance of giving the fullest protection to American citizens in Cuba and to "keep in the middle of the road." He told him that it was the administration's earnest desire to do justice to all parties concerned but to avoid war if possible.

General Lee is earnest in his desire to do all in his power to uphold the President's peace policy, but it is thought by many that his motto is: "If Spain wants war and forces it, then war let it be," which is simply the motto of all true Americans. Not many people here believe that the Cuban insurrection can be terminated and the free island saved from utter ruin without strong intervention on the part of the United States government.

General Lee was met as he was coming out of the Executive Mansion and asked if he could give "the substance of what would be the policy if the intervention were refused. He only said: "The President said he wished me to remain in Cuba until the trouble was over."

"When will the island be peacefully governed?" was asked.

"I haven't heard," was the General's answer.

Home Again. NEW YORK, Nov. 5. Senator Edward O. Wolff, of Colorado, and Gen. Charles J. Paine, two of the monetary commissioners appointed by President McKinley to confer with European governments concerning the feasibility of establishing international bimetalism, arrived here tonight on the steamship Compagnia. The other commissioner, ex-Vice-President A. L. Stevenson, will return on a later vessel.

Senator Wolff asked to be excused from saying anything of his mission abroad.

General Paine also declined to speak about his European trip.

Widows Going to Klondike. NEW YORK, November 7. Martin by explaining the details of the proposed voyage of nearly 25,000 miles.

MANY WANT IT.

The Senate Seat of Gorman Has Many Applicants.

Pension List Shows an Increase Good Recommendations to Public Names and Shut off Frauds, Seal Questions, Hanna Has Sure Thing

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., November 7. Washington is likely to see much of the war, pulling that will be done by the Republicans who would like to succeed Senator Gorman, at least three of the gentlemen spend practically all their time at the National Capitol. Those who would like to be Senators from Maryland are Postmaster General Gary, Judge McKim, of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, and Representative Mudd, Governor Lowndes, who also credited with a desire to sit in the Senate, like some spends considerable time in Washington, being a member of the famous Metropolitan Club. One of these gentlemen has formally announced himself to be a candidate for the Senate, but they are each being pushed for the position by friends, and there are others who would not object to the plan.

Commissioner of Pensions Evans, not only fails to predict, as his predecessors in that office did, an early decrease in the number of pensions paid by this government, but calls attention to the failure of such predictions. At the close of the fiscal year, June 30, there were 928,014 pensioners on the rolls, a net increase in a year of 5336. The annual report of the Commissioner doesn't say so, but all the same, it is reasonably certain that the net increase of pensioners for the current fiscal year will be much larger than during the last fiscal year, owing to the change of policy in the conduct of the pension bureau, which now gives preference to applications for original pensions. The Commissioner makes two recommendations, which seem to be in line with everyday necessities. First, that a complete list of the names and addresses of pensioners be published, and second, that Congress make it illegal for the widows and orphans of late war who marry after this time to draw pensions. The list is intended to break up the demoralizing practice, the extent of which is extraordinary, of women marrying the old soldiers when they are on their death-beds, solely for the purpose of drawing a widow's pension. Under existing laws, pensions cannot be denied to these women, even when they are known to be indisputably illegitimate.

The treaty between the U. S. and Japan, Russia, by which it is agreed that the killing of seals in open sea in Behring Sea and the north Pacific Ocean shall be temporarily suspended, having been signed by the Representatives of the several governments, the work of the first sealing conference is closed, and this week, the second conference, between the U. S., Great Britain and Canada will meet. Interest has been increased in this conference by the intimation that the Canadian officials intend to try to negotiate a treaty which will include some sort of commercial reciprocity between the U. S. and Canada.

If President McKinley and the prominent Ohio Republicans in Washington take any stock in the numerous stories appearing in print, alleging the existence of serious doubts of the electoral success of Hanna by the Ohio legislature, they had it well for to a man they voted that Senator Hanna's election was assured.

Cotton Letter. NEW YORK, Friday, Nov. 5, 1907. DEAR SIR: The market is the lowest price touched this season, this morning, January delivery sold at 5 1/2 which is within 1/2 per cent of the lowest touched in 1894 when stocks of the world were 800,000 bales more than at present. It may be said we have already passed the point that conservative operators consider it prudent to follow the short side and yet the market still follows under previous conditions which would lead to two continuous declines since the season opened. Trade is back, and under uncertain conditions, many feel justified in pursuing the policy of buying only moderately.

The crop is large beyond all question so that speculation on a broad scale has been slow to develop. The planter meanwhile markets his crop with the usual freedom and to make sales is continually forced to make concessions. How long is this thing to go on? No one denies that prices are very low and most people admit that they are already below the cost of production. Having their calculations of this one part namely, that cotton cannot be raised for 5c per pound, strong parties have already entered the market and will buy further as the market declines. If there is to be substantial support given it evidently must come from investment buying. We don't mean purchase made on \$1.00 per bale margin but purchases by those prepared to protect their holdings and buy more if the price declines. But we must have some substantial support if present values are to be.

MUST PAY CLAIMS.

Judge Robinson Decides Carteret Oyster Claims Must be Paid

Meets Dr. Kilgo, Whiskey for Chilled Convicts, Evance List Lee Stirring Up Raleigh.

JOURNAL BUREAU, FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., November 7. The city bonds for \$20,000 for the street improvements were bid by East Brook & Co. of Boston for 100 and a fraction. These bonds will be delivered this week. It is said that they are being disposed of in part for 112 and 112 1/2 and they may go to 115. About \$5,000 in premiums will be netted by the city.

It is said that a man from Salisbury will soon write a book showing the cruelty of the guards to the prisoners in the penitentiary. If such is the case the public ought to know the truth of it.

Today at Salisbury Judge Coble heard the case of Chairman Wilson vs. his right to hold the position on the R. R. Commission. The people are anxious to know whether he, as well as Mr. S. O. P. Wilson will be denied the right of trial by jury.

President Abernethy of Rutherford College says he would like to meet Dr. Kilgo president of Trinity College in debate on the question of education. He considers Dr. Kilgo a dangerous man.

The Post office Inspector has caught up with the person who has been robbing the mails in a Star route down in Bertie county. It was a negro who was assistant postmaster at Williamston. He pleaded guilty and will be tried here before the United States court on December 7.

The North Carolina Presbyterian has been bought by a stock company and will henceforth be published in Charlotte. The "Lives of Distinguished North Carolinians" is the title of a new book, just out. It is edited and compiled by W. J. DeLoe of Raleigh.

The Supreme court has reached the 7th District and appeals from that district will be called tomorrow.

The North Carolina Roofing Exposition is to be called "The Great Exhibition." It is 71 ft. 9 inches in length, and is divided into two divisions, the exhibition room and the living room. The exterior and interior is in white and gold. It is to be held here today, and the exhibits will be put in from the large museum.

There has been noted the large quantity of whiskey purchased by the penitentiary authorities. They now state that it was bought to give convicts who were down on the Roanoke. It was mixed with quinine and given to prevent chills.

It is said that mortgage money has about ceased in this State. That mortgage brought here from Brazil as ballast has about flooded the market.

Evanlist Lee has begun a heavy field against saloon keepers here. He is conducting a series of meetings here and proposes to show up this town.

Secretary of State Thompson has issued a charter to the Dunn and Johnson Telephone company.

Judge Robinson heard the claims of the Carteret oyster case in Chambers here, and decides that the Auditor must issue the warrant for the payment of them.

Col. W. H. S. Bargrave is sure that Gen. Chigman be finally buried at Ashe ville.

Rev. Dr. Strange of Wilmington has decided to decline the call to Norfolk, and will remain in this State.
