## Why the Humber Outfit Use Their Free Passes.

Butler Claims Because He is a News-  
Paper Man, Troops May Go to  
Rockingham, Thanksgiving  
State Guard Uniform.

Expansiveness as to why certain high  
officers have free passes seems to be the  
order of the day. Governor Russell  
under a new little mess as to why he had  
these passes and so his Treasurer, Worth  
and others. Senator Butler in his ex-  
planation says he does use free passes, not  
as a public official, but as a newspaper  
man. It matters little in what capacity  
he uses them, he saves his mileage over  
the country. If free passes are unlawful  
and the grand jury is ordered to find a  
true bill against any railroad who is  
found guilty of issuing them, then there  
should be no free passes to newspaper  
men or any one else. Senator Butler  
talks beautifully about refusing to  
accept passes pressed upon him as a pub-  
lic official.

Yesterday the governor called the  
council of State in session to discuss the  
availability of ordering out the troops  
here to go with the negro Evans, to  
Rockingham where he is to be tried for  
assault on a young lady near that place.  
He was brought here to prevent lynching.  
It was deemed necessary to land  
military escort with the negro for he  
would severely be safe in that part of  
the State.

It will be remembered that the firm  
insurance rates in Greensboro have been  
very much lowered, and now Raleigh  
Chamber of Commerce want these same  
rates for this city.

The trustees of the Blind asylum here  
have made a step forward in that a teach-  
er, Miss Melander, of Finland has been  
employed to teach school. This embraces  
a system in several branches of handi-  
craft.

Dr. George W. Blackwell died this  
morning after an illness of two weeks.

Governor Russell today issued his  
Thanksgiving Proclamation. He says  
that our State has been very much blessed  
in every way and calls upon the people  
to give praise and thanksgiving to God.  
The State has indeed been blessed in  
every way except politically. We could  
give thanks that even a short period of  
this political mudslide had passed, but  
surely there is nothing to be thankful  
for in the fact that the State has such a  
set of rulers.

Judge Child at Statesville has re-  
ceived a decision in favor of K. C. Child  
and ex-James W. Williams as chairman  
of the R. R. commission. The case goes to  
the Supreme court.

W. H. Dean of Asheville who was  
convicted of embezzlement as a magis-  
trate last week gets a position as a clerk  
in the Revenue department.

There is to be quite a change in the  
uniform of the State Guard. The coat  
and trousers both to be dark blue. The  
dress coat to be done away with and a  
long blouse used. All metal buttons to  
be done away. The belt to be changed  
and the longer up with pom-poms to be  
used. The new drill regulations for the  
manual of arms will be issued the State  
Guard December 1st.

The Raleigh Recorder says that it has

little opposition in this State to an edu-  
cational qualification for voters.

## HUNG AT GOLDSBORO

Sam Wright Executed For the Murder  
of Carr October 2nd.

Goldsboro, November 10. Privately  
at 12 o'clock noon, the gallies were pulled  
and Wiley Vaughn, known as Sam  
Wright, was dropped into the water. After  
7 minutes the man's pulse had ceased to  
beat and in 15 minutes was pronounced  
dead and his body taken away. His  
neck was not broken in the death from stran-  
gulation.

The time for which Sam Wright, or as  
he claimed his name to be, Wiley Vaughn,  
suffered death was committed Octo-  
ber 2, 1897, about four miles from this  
city at a small country store kept by a  
white man named Carr.

Wright, who is a mulatto, was once  
employed by Carr, and on the night of  
the murder, Wright came to the store  
where Carr was alone, asked him for  
some cheese, then for some wine. When  
Carr stooped to get the wine, Wright  
struck him, and afterwards struck a knife  
into his throat, killing Carr.

Detection and trial soon followed, and  
though it all Wright has been cool and  
collected.

Today was clear, bright and cool.  
Early in the morning crowds of colored  
people began to gather around the jail,  
and many colored people from the coun-  
try came in. Trees and windows around  
the jail were soon filled with those who  
wanted to see the hanging.

There was a good deal of dissatisfaction  
in that it was found that the hanging was  
to be in private, but the utmost order  
prevailed.

The Goldsboro Rifles formed a line  
around the jail enclosure, and the crowd  
filled the space back of this line.

At 11:30 Wright came from the jail,  
walking unassisted, and steadily mounted  
the steps of the scaffold, which was in  
the jail yard, but surrounded by an extra  
high fence.

Mounting the scaffold, with bare head,  
Wright stood six minutes, making his  
speech, declaring that he had committed  
the murder, and was now willing to die  
for it. He spoke quietly, and coolly, and  
without excitement.

After his speech he made a short  
prayer and sang a verse of a song, then  
said, "All right, good bye my friends,  
I am in Jordan."

The warrant for his execution was then  
read, a colored minister offered prayer,  
the noose was adjusted, the black cap  
put on, and with a sudden snap, the  
trap fell, and Sam Wright fell six feet,  
twisted slightly then hung motionless.

Sheriff Scott deserves the greatest  
credit for the admirable order main-  
tained and for the general excellent ar-  
rangements attending the execution.

**Latest News Items.**

It is asserted here that the reply of the  
American government to the last Spanish  
communication declares that the  
United States has made the greatest  
efforts to stop filibustering and has  
employed many officials and expended large  
sums of money to that end.

While a British mail steamer was cross-  
ing from Calais to Dover the vessel sud-  
denly collided with a whale, which  
suddenly appeared, ahead of her.

The Princeton collegians were greatly  
disappointed when it became known that  
ex-President Grover Cleveland's son is to  
be named Richard Edson Cleveland.

They had given the young man the name  
of Grover Cleveland, Jr., on the day of  
his birth, and hoped it would stick to  
him.

Three thousand sheep which belonged to  
John Davidson and also twenty head  
of cattle have been burned to death in  
a fire to destroy a prairie fire which  
sweeping over the stock range of the  
Pawnee country. The damage done  
to fashions is enormous. Fall crops are  
also badly damaged.

John R. Kern has been caught after  
stealing 108 horses and buggies from the  
streets of Indianapolis, Ind.

Yellow fever continues on the decrease  
in New Orleans, and the Board of Health  
isletched over the prospects of an early  
termination of the scare, which has  
badly crippled commerce.

Judge Grosvenor of Chicago, has in  
the World's Columbian Exposition com-  
pany responsible for the \$75,000 loss to  
the French Republic and French ex-  
hibitors by reason of fire during the fair.

There is no change in the condition of  
Benjamin Butterworth, commissioner of  
patents. His chances of recovery are  
poor. Mr. Butterworth has pneumonia  
and is at the Hollenden. He is not here-  
land, Ohio.

The negro section of the Georgia In-  
sane Asylum was burned Tuesday. There  
were within the walls when it  
broke out over 700 persons, but the fire  
of the administration was such  
that no lives were lost. The group of  
buildings constituting the section covered  
about four acres.

Hospitals of Queen Victoria Jubilee  
the American tourist season in Europe  
has been the worst in many years.  
Shipping returns show a decline of no  
less than 50 per cent in the first and  
second class passenger traffic between  
the figures of the season of 1895.

In spite of a thick drizzle and a heavy  
fog, the ancient custom of presenting  
the elected chief magistrate of London  
to the representatives of the sovereign  
and to the people was observed. Tuesday  
with success. Thousands of people lined  
the route and the decorations were more  
ambitious than usual. They consisted  
mainly of triumphal arches, Venetian  
masks, floral festoons and a liberal dis-  
play of bunting.

## TO HANG TODAY.

Durrant Must Now Meet His Fate  
After the Long Delay of the Law.

Technical Points of Lawyers Are  
Brushed Aside.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 10. Who  
Henry Durrant or Durrant, the condemned  
murderer of Miss Blanche Lamont, and  
possibly the slayer of Miss M. J.  
Williams, also, is to hang Nov. 12th.

He was taken before Judge Baird to-  
day to have the date for the execution  
fixed. The Supreme Court of the United  
States refused on Monday to grant a writ  
of habeas corpus for Durrant and this to  
delay the hanging.

Attired in his best suit of clothes, over  
which he wore a faultlessly fitting over-  
coat, Durrant made a conspicuous fig-  
ure on the train and ferry boat, as he was  
taken from San Quentin prison to court.

At the city hall, great crowds impeded  
the progress of the party, and it was  
with difficulty that they were beaten back  
by the officers.

When Judge Baird called upon Dur-  
rant to stand at the bar, the young man  
stood spring erect, and then his mar-  
velous self control asserted itself. He was  
deadly pale, but calm and self possessed.

As the date of his doom was pro-  
nounced just the suspicion of a sneer ap-  
peared on the corners of his mouth. And  
when all was over and the officials began to  
clear the courtroom, he resumed his seat  
and chatted unconcernedly with his  
father and some sympathizing friends.

**HISTORY OF HIS CRIME.**  
The dead body of Minnie Williams  
was found in the library of Emanuel  
Baptist Church, San Francisco, April 12,  
1895. Miss Lamont had been missing  
for some time and the finding of the  
body of Miss Williams led to the  
belief that that of Miss Lamont might  
also be concealed there.

This proved to be the fact. A hurried  
search revealed the body in the belfry of  
the church. Suspicion fell upon young  
Durrant, who was a medical student, ap-  
proaching graduation and conversant  
with the methods of handling the human  
form in such manner as to avoid getting  
blood on his clothing.

It was also known that Durrant had  
been a leading spirit in the Emanuel Sun-  
day school, which was attended by the  
Williams and Lamont girls. Further-  
more, evidence was at hand showing  
that Miss Lamont was last seen alive in  
Durrant's company.

Mrs. Vogel saw Durrant join Blanche  
Lamont as she left school on the after-  
noon of the murder. Mrs. Crockett saw  
them together traveling south on a Va-  
lencia street car. They got off at Twenty-  
second street and walked in the direction  
of the church. Mrs. Leake saw them  
enter the church.

At 5 o'clock the same afternoon Dur-  
rant was seen in the church by George  
King, the organist. He was disheveled  
in appearance and said he was not well.  
Durrant on the witness stand admitted  
his presence in the church at 5 o'clock  
that afternoon.

The defense at the trial insisted that  
no motive for the crime was proved.  
The court took the ground that proof of  
motive was not essential. It was stated  
to be at best a speculative question  
touching on the realms of metaphysics and  
criminology, and the opinion added.

"The deed may be due to a single mo-  
tive, or to a number of motives, or to  
no motive at all, or to a motive so  
remote that even when the books of the learned  
criminologists have been studied the moti-  
ve and mind still shrink from a belief in  
the possibility of its existence."

The case was given to the jury Novem-  
ber 1895, about seven months after the  
discovery of the murder, and although  
the evidence was circumstantial, the  
jury was out but five minutes. Durrant  
was sentenced to death, on December 5,  
1895.

Since that time every possible effort  
has been made by his friends to prevent  
execution of the sentence. Every tech-  
nical point known to the sharpest lawyers  
has been resorted to save the young  
man's life.

**THE CABINET MEETING**  
Spain's Reply Pacific McKinley Asks  
for Peace.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 10.  
The full text of Spain's reply to the Wash-  
ington dispatches was read at the cabinet  
meeting today. It is most pacific, and  
instead of being at all warlike, was  
regarded by the cabinet as very satisfac-  
tory and as calculated to delay any fear  
of a hostile outbreak.

As stated repeatedly with emphasis,  
President McKinley is doing everything  
within reason to avoid a rupture with  
Spain. He is following very closely Mr.  
Cleveland's peace policy. But notwith-  
standing the administration's well known  
attitude, certain papers print sensational  
articles every day to show that war with  
Spain is sure to come.

**BLANCO'S HUMANE POLICY.**  
Cuban Reconverts to Be Given  
Rations by the Spaniards and  
Allowed to Raise Cattle.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10. Senator Dupa-  
re of Maine, the Spanish minister has re-  
ceived the following cable message from  
General Blanco, governor-general of  
Cuba, in regard to the "reconverts":

"Extensive zones of cultivation have  
been organized, daily rations are pro-  
vided by the state and work is furnished.  
They will be well treated and can be  
employed by the planters; they have free  
transportation and are protected wherever  
they go. Provincial protective committees  
have been formed and have already en-  
tered upon their functions. They will con-  
tinue to be organized in the remaining  
provinces with the object of procuring the  
necessary relief funds. Subscrip-  
tions have been set on foot to raise funds  
necessaries, and everything that is pos-  
sible is being done."

"An effort is published to stay and only  
greeting permission to grant, signify, and  
advise that this be done, and collecting  
the necessary military and civil protec-  
tion. No moment is lost in attending to  
all immediate needs which, from the  
object of my personal attention. It is
