## MUST KNOW SOMETHING

THE COTTON CONVENTION  
It Has Adjourned Without Decisive Action

Or Why Should J. R. Smith Give Up.

The McWhorter-Smith Deal. Vance Monument Corner Stone Laying. Yarn Mills Busy. Tarleton Basis at Raleigh. Increase in State Guard.

JOURNAL BUREAU, ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 15.—The news of the swapping of offices between Superintendent South of the peninsula, and Commissioner New home of the Agricultural Department, came very unexpectedly upon the Agricultural bear last evening upon the general public. It seems the plan had been concocted between the two interested parties, Governor Russell and a few intimate advisors. It impresses the people more firmly than ever as to how the government things to himself. But right here, he must have played into the hands of the penitentiary board by refusing them of their heaviest burden, John R. Smith. It must be that John R. is in some secret, whose would not have so quickly given up a \$25,000 salary for a \$1,500 one, and that now when he is in the mercy of the Agricultural Board may be disposed of whenever the board sees fit to do so. The chance of offices takes place on January 1st.

Smith of Goldsboro delegates to the National Fisher Congress to be held at Tampa, Fla., January 10th, 1894.

The Vance Monument Association of Asheville held the Grand Masons, Walker E. Moore, and the contractor to fix the date for the laying of the corner stone for the monument, which is to be made by the Grand Lodge of Masons December 2nd is the date settled upon. Wonder what date will be given for the Raleigh memorial to the beloved Vance.

One of the rooms on the third floor of the Capital is being fitted up as a storage room. There are some very valuable papers among these documents, and some are badly damaged.

The Raleigh Hosiery Yarn mill is now running full time. A dividend will probably be declared in January.

The Mission Board of the Baptists of the State met here last night and distributed about \$1,000 for mission work in the State. They employ about twenty men in missions and usually spend \$1,000 yearly in this work.

Tuberculosis appeared in the herd of cattle at the Agricultural and Mechanic College, and have been killed. The herd is a splendid one being blooded and standard bred and always command fancy prices.

The Supreme court ruled the people yesterday to not hand down the opinion in the Radcliffe-commission case.

The Test commission met yesterday. Chairman Withers made his report saying that the San-Jean Scale which had appeared in three successive test spring had been extenuated. Mr. Fox of the experimental station was selected secretary to the commission. No one was appointed as historian and ethnologist. The one elected Prof. Hayes.

Rev. Dr. A. W. Wetmore has resigned as assistant minister at First Church here and accepted a call to St. Paul's church in Wilkesboro. He takes charge on Dec. 25.

Ex-Sheriff W. H. High died at his home here early this morning.

The Adjutant General is sending out blanks for the next report of the State Guard.

The number of pupils here at the school for the white blind and for the colored deaf and dumb is 222, this being 100 over the number this time last year.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Melton says that the convention of Supervisors of Education which meets in Greenville this month will be well attended.

Very few state bonds have come in this year for exchange, but 53 came today from Boston.

U. S. Marshal Carroll has gone to Columbus, Ga., with 50 prisoners for the Federal court here.

The State Guard has gained about 200 in members during the year. The first regiment gains 44 and the 4th regiment gains 60.
