WE DON'T NEED STOMACHS.

A Swiss Woman Living and Working After Her's is Removed.

New York, Dec. 24.—For the first time in the history of surgery the complete excision of the stomach of a human being has been successfully accomplished, the patient, a woman, more than three months after the operation being to all intents and purposes well and capable of performing daily work. The operation which was performed by Dr. Carl Schlotter, of the University of Zurich, Switzerland, has attracted widespread attention in Europe, where it is hailed as a brilliant one, the first step in a new history of surgical triumphs. Through the enterprise of its representative at Zurich, Dr. Edmund Charles Wendt, of New York, the Medical Record will print tomorrow not only Dr. Wendt's remarks, based on personal study of the case, but a complete description of the operation, written by Dr. Schlotter himself.
