SEVEN SAY SO!

That Many Directors Say That Hancock Must Go.

Meadows and Chadbourne Alone Stand by Him. To be Decided In This City Feb. 22d. Will They Fight? Other State News.

JOURNAL BUREAU,
Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 5. A
The general inquiry today was what
will the directors of the North Carolina
railway do with President Hancock?
The answer can now be given. They
will remove him. Seven of them say so
only two L. H. Meadows and W. H.
Chadbourne, Jr., support him.
This morning the directors again met
at the Governor's office, eleven being
present. The meeting adjourned in a few
minutes, until February 22, at New
Berne. The motion to remove was made
by E. H. Meadows.

At the meeting of the State directors
last night at the Governor's mansion
there was much discussion of the Han-
cock matter, in which Governor Russell
joined. More of the private directors
were admitted, Meadows and Chadbourne
alone supported Hancock. All the others
opposed him. It is well understood that
the Governor has settled upon removal
and that other directors Patrick or
Hewitt will be his successor.

There is much talk among the private
directors at the action Governor Russell
took or did not take yesterday afternoon.
They were in his office. He walked in
and said: "Here is my office. I sit when
you please. You know what you came
here for. I leave the whole matter in
your hands. I have no power to remove
Hancock." A private director said: "This
was queer. I think some of the directors
want to wait until the matter cools off,
and continue Hancock." But a State
director said to me: "I can assure you
the Governor will remove him." One of
Hancock's friends said today the Govern-
or was not unfavorable to him. He added
that he could not see why the directors
did not dispose of the matter
responsibly upon themselves.

It is a note had taken last night,
Hancock would certainly have been ousted.
The main thing which causes a
hitch is that there are several applicants
for the place. These are T. D. Hewitt,
D. W. Patrick, John Newberry, W. H.
Chadbourne, Jr., W. J. P. One of
these will get the place Feb. 22.

The adjutant general is notified that
the four canvas boats, built for the
Detroit and the Montgomery, will be
issued to the North Carolina Naval Reserves.
They are now at the Norfolk Navy
yard.

J. M. Curry, is commissioned as 1st
Lt. of Co. B 2nd Regiment, Lambertson,
and Dr. T. S. McMiller of Hertford as
assistant surgeon of the 1st regiment of the
State Guard.

A. W. Shaffer is taking a very active
part in the fight for the post office
here.

It is the current belief here that New
Berne's next sensation will be a personal
war between Robert Hancock and
Dick Williams, two Republican fight-
ers. Hancock denounces Williams and his
friends say he gave Williams the lie
two or three times during the last cam-
paign.

Members in Rockingham county
did a very horrible thing. A lot of three
wrote that a white man named Bowles
had outraged a white girl. The man was
actually on trial for his life when his at-
torney exposed the scheme.

The special tax for public schools raised
only \$1600, while the gifts, private, to
such schools are \$5,000. The August
election for public school special taxes
was a failure.

C. D. McIver, president of the State
Normal and Industrial School, has re-
covered from an attack of pneumonia.
A Philadelphia man wants 100,000 acres
of land in Eastern N. C. in one tract, for
a colony.
State Auditor Ayer has had a letter
from Stoneboro, Minn., from a gentle-
man there who wants to come to warmer
climate, and he asks to be put in corre-
spondence with some land company in
North Carolina from whom he can pur-
chase a farm suitable for gardening and
the nursery business.

STILL ANOTHER

Hearing For The North Carolina Railroad on 10th.

Re ratings of Fire Insurance. Pub- lic School. Capitol Grounds Fencing. Cannon Coal Out- put. Fifty-nine Want Li- censes. Not Resigned.

There is very favorable outlook that
the property in this city will be re-rated
for fire insurance next June by the
Southeastern Tariff Association. Each
individual risk will stand on its own
merits.
At the meeting of the board of alder-
men on Friday night a resolution was
passed to charge \$1200 rental annually for
the General Graded school. This is the
largest public school here. The building
was put up in 1883 by the city and stands
on the site of the old Governor's Palace.
The school committee have limited funds
at its control, and to pay the rental de-
manded by the city would shorten the
term of the public school from 3 to 4
weeks. This is to be very much regretted
as the schools are splendidly patronized,
and doing fine work.

In taking down the coping on one side
of the Capitol grounds upon which the
iron fence rested, the marks of the coping
survey which the government had had
made at great cost, were destroyed. In
the corner of the square stands three
upright granite blocks, and in a particu-
lar line from these were copper rods in
the coping which have been removed.

The North Carolina Department of
Agriculture has made a contract with
trustees of the A. & M. college for the
analysis of the fertilizers as made by the
experiment station. The Department of
Agriculture will hereafter issue the
Bulletin regarding the analysis, instead
of their being issued from the experiment
station.

Rev. James M. Horner of Oxford last
night preached the last of the series of
sermons at the Church of the Good
Shepherd on the "Apostolic Fathers."
His subject was "Origin." Rev. Dr.
Pittenger rec'd that church will lecture
in Toronto, Canada, before the
Students' Missionary Association, about
the 29th of this month.

At the Cannon coal mines in Chat-
ham county there are now 200 miners
employed and the output is 200 daily.
Of this the S. A. L. contracts to take 100
tons daily. Since the mines have fallen
into new hands there has been a marked
improvement there.

Yesterday at Rex Hospital Mr. W. H.
Willard died. He was operated on by
two eminent surgeons just exactly two
weeks before his death.

W. T. Caho resigned from the revenue
department because he did not care to
claim civil service protection, and serve
under Republicanism.

There is to be another hearing in the
case of the N. C. R. R. being leased to
the Southern, at Salisbury on Friday the
10th before Special Master Craig. He
has summoned President Spencer and
other officials of the Southern to present
their books and papers before him at that
time. This is at the request of Gay,
Russell.

The Bell telephone company has
morning filed a \$5,000 bond with the
railroad commission to protect telephone
uses in the State in case the lower rate
ordered by the commission is adopted.
The courts decided this to be legal.

The class for law license before the
Supreme Court today was next to the
largest on record. There were 30. Six
were negroes.

The State today chartered the Worth
Company of Wilmington. Capital paid
in \$100,000. Capital stock permitted
\$500,000. All the members of the com-
pany are members of the family of the
late B. G. Worth.

Claude Bernard the new district at-
torney has not yet sent in his resignation as
collector.

Judge Parnell has sent his opinion of
the sale of the Cape Fear and Yadkin
Valley R. R. to the U. S. circuit court of
appeals. It orders a full sale of the
road. It is a modification of the opinion
of Judge Sumner. It orders a sale of
the whole or by sections as the terms of
the mortgage reads. Baltimore bond
holders will appeal to the U. S. Supreme
Court.
