Passenger Rate Reduction, Baptist Female University, Mott a Candidate, Earthquake Felt, Penitentiary to Cultivate Rice Farm.

On the 17th when the R. R. commis- sion met again it is expected that pas- senger rates will be reduced to 2 and 2 1/2 cents per mile on the following roads: Seaboard and Roanoke 120 miles in N. C.; North Carolina Railroad; Piedmont Railroad (Greensboro to Danville); Peters- burg road, (8 miles in North Carolina); Raleigh and Gaston; Wilmington and Weldon, (main line) Western North Car- olina, (Salisbury to Paint Rock); Atlanta and Charlotte, (40 miles in North Car- olina). These being the best paying roads in the State, the commissioners think they can best stand the reduction.

Rev. Mr. Stringfield who is the solici- ting agent for the Baptist Female Uni- versity has returned from a trip down in the Eastern part of the State and is well pleased with the success of said trip. The building is a lovely one even now without the finishing touches. Every effort will be made to have it opened in September.

Keeper of the Capital Burns has de- manded that a key to the Supreme court Library be furnished him. Marshal Bradley has had to give bond for the safe keeping of the books, and he has refused to furnish the key unless so ordered by the court.

Governor Russell and family are in- vited to attend a reception of President McKinley at the executive mansion February 16th, but he will not attend. Neither will he attend a ball, to which he is invited March 3rd, to be given way up in New York.

The party of Scandinavian editors who were booked to stop here, and whom a committee from the Chamber of Com- merce went to the depot to meet this morning, disappointed this committee for they did not stop here but for about five minutes.

The Southern Building and Loan As- sociation that went to the wall last year may declare a dividend before long. This will be good news to many who hold stock.

Cotton receipts for the week ending Feb. 11th here are 390 bales against 149 for the same time last year. The total to date for 1898 is 21,040 against 12890 for 1897.

Ex-postmaster Shaffer has paid the costs in the matter of the judgment against Governor Russell and other bondsmen.

Yesterday out in the country, a Mr. Browning shot fatally his father-in-law a Mr. Strickland. No one could learn any of the particulars.

ALWAYS A MUDDLE.

The Administration Fights Commissioner Abbott.

Reward Increased, May Build a New Opera House, Buys Goods Outside of State, Convicts Are Vaccinated, Harry Skinner Politically.

Dr. Abbott and the R. R. Commis- sioners told the clerk of the Commission, Mr. Brown, last week to issue subpoenas for certain persons who were interested in hotels along the lines of the Seaboard Air Line and the Atlantic Coast Line to appear before the Commission on the 17th and testify as to any reduction that the railroads had made there, or interested in hotels. There had been such severe comment upon the Southern for the re- duced rates said to have been granted the Round Knob Hotel, that Dr. Abbott wanted a full investigation as to other hotels on other lines. Dr. Abbott re- turned to Raleigh late Saturday afternoon. It was near midnight when he found that Mr. Brown was preparing the sub- poenas according to his (Abbott's) orders. When Pearson, one of Russell's tools, came in and told him not to send out those papers until he returned. He went immediately to see Russell and returned to order that the subpoenas be not issued. Dr. Abbott says that Russell and his men are trying to stifle investigation. Now one Commissioner has as much power to issue orders as another. Dr. Abbott declares that Pearson is guilty of a great piece of impertinence. The governor has declared that if Abbott opposes him any more that he will remove him from office. It is believed by many that if Russell attempts to do this that he will be impeached. That there is a certain limit, beyond which the peo- ple, even his own party with the fusion supporters will not allow him to go is very evident. Once before in the history of the State, a governor W. W. Holden, tried to ride rough shod over the people and impeachment followed. There is a very large majority of the people who will welcome almost anything that has im- peachment of Governor Russell in sight.

The reward of \$10 for the arrest of the miscreant who defaced the Confederate Monument has been increased to \$20. Mr. W. G. Stronach offered the \$10 and now different gentlemen have gone to him and requested to be allowed to con- tribute to the reward.

Wheeler Morton succeeds Bernard as Solicitor and it is said that Oscar J. Spears will be appointed as assistant Dis- trict Attorney, and that the negro, Ed Johnson, will be office assistant in Bernard's office here.

Last night Rev. Dr. Pittenger delivered an address on "American Missions in China." He had prepared a map and illustrated his lecture by this means.

Miss Susie Kirwin of the Wilber Opera House Troupe, that plays a week's en- gagement here this week, says, after looking into the situation, she thinks it a wise plan, she will begin at once work on a first class Opera House for this place. Surely no place needs such a building so much as does Raleigh.

A list of portraits that adorn the walls of the Supreme court room was given a short time ago. Now Mr. Randall, the artist has received an order to paint one of ex-Judge William Preston Byrnes, who was on the Supreme court bench when Judge Pearson was Chief Justice.

The Raleigh and Cape Fear railroad, is to be the name of the new road that is to be constructed between Raleigh and Lillington.

It is now learned that this new ad- ministration of ours not only have given the State printing, or much of it, to the Richmond houses, but the penitentiary authorities are purchasing grocery sup- plies for that institution from a Rich- mond house. Well the old saying "put give them rope enough and they will hang themselves" is coming true. Play them out only a little longer line and the job will be done and the funeral of the Republican party will be announced.

The state today chartered the Resky Mount Ice company with \$18,000 capital to do business in any part of the State. The charter gives the right also to have electric light and cold storage plants.

All the penitentiary convicts have been vaccinated, and many of them are dis- abled. Superintendent Mewborne says he expects the penitentiary proper to be used mainly for hospital work. That is he does not expect convicts to be em- ployed there on a large scale.

NO CUBAN TREATY.

President McKinley Cuts off all Negotiation With Spain.

A Result of De Lome Letter, Indignation in Washington is Rising, Spain's Shabby Conduct, Foreign Press Approves McKinley's Action.

WASHINGTON, February 11.—President McKinley has suspended indefinitely all negotiations with this country and Spain for a trade treaty which was being prepared between the United States and Cuba.

This action on the trade treaty is be- cause of the revelation in the Lome's letter that Spain was negotiating in the matter with the United States with the dishonest purpose of deceiving the ad- ministration and only as a "bluff."

Assistant Secretary of State Day makes public today the text of the official communication received from Minister Woodford at Madrid last night, the de- tails of which were not made known to the press.

This cablegram from Minister Wood- ford stated that the resignation of the Spanish Minister was accepted and that the First Assistant du Bios had been placed in charge of the legation.

The acceptance of the resignation by the government by Spain was done upon a second dispatch from de Lome to his Government demanding that it be acted upon. De Lome showed his skill in diplomacy by getting in his resignation before a recall could be made. The Minister cabled his resignation the moment he learned that the letter had been published.

This has left the situation as it stood yesterday when the President and As- sistant Secretary Day learned that de Lome had outwitted them by having his resig- nation accepted, thereby placing him out of the reach of diplomatic discipline.

The government is deeply chagrined by the careless way in which Spain has treated the de Lome affair.

There is a growing disposition by the administration not to withdraw the offending Minister, but to hand him his passport and furnish him an escort to the steamer which would in a way be a mark of disgrace to the retiring minister.

The afternoon London papers approve the action of the United States in the de Lome affair. The general comment by the foreign press is on the business ad- vised by the President under the provi- sion of the law. The Spanish press comments to appreciate the position of the Minister or the magnitude of his offense.

TORPEDO BOATS FOR SPAIN.

Work in Glasgow Yards Ordered Pushed on Spanish Vessels.

GLASGOW, Scotland, February 11.—The Spanish government requests the Clyde Shipbuilding company to push work on all Spanish vessels at the yards.

The company has dispatched a high speed torpedo boat fully manned with Spanish officers and crew. Other torpedo destroyers will be ready for transfer by the company to Spain as soon as the crews arrive to take them in charge.

MUST BE ACTION.

Congress Will Soon Force the Hand of Spain.

Belief That the President Will be Compelled to Demand Apology, Crisis Not Far Off, Condition of Secretary Sherman, Likely to Retire Soon.

WASHINGTON, February 11.—The city is filled with rumors of the coming action of a most serious nature by the United States regarding Spain and Cuba.

Every Republican member of the House has received a special notification to be in his seat when the Williams resolution comes up for a vote.

The Williams resolution calls on Pres- ident McKinley for information regarding the situation in Cuba. The resolution was unanimously reported to the House by the committee on Foreign Affairs. It was feared that an attempt would be made in the House to amend the resolution, hence it was reported at once.

It is believed by careful observers that the President will be driven to action by the force of circumstances and the spirit which is growing in it to submit longer to the insolence of Spain.

The President has given no sign of his intentions and no message has been re- ceived by Congress from him on this sub- ject.

The fact as revealed in the last cable from Minister Woodford that Spain has not disavowed the language used by de Lome is causing high feeling, and the disreputable members of Congress that a demand be made upon Spain for an apology.

An embarrassing complication to the President and his official family is the condition of Secretary of State John Sherman. His mental condition has become such that his advice is not consid- ered an important question.

Since the de Lome affair has come up the situation has become especially un- pleasant. Secretary Sherman was not consulted at any time in regard to the affair, Assistant Secretary Day managing all the official business while the cabinet officer remained mute in the State de- partment regarding the crisis that had the people of Washington.

If the wishes and expectations of the friends of our country are to be realized, Secretary Sherman will resign im- mediately. He has done nothing since he took office to improve the relations of the United States with the European countries.

Senator Hoar, a former member of the Foreign committee, says: "The Pres- ident should not be allowed to deal with the acceptance by Spain of the Minister's resignation. We should have our opinion of the offense of Minister de Lome made a serious one. In my judgment the time has come for something stronger, per- sistent and conclusive to be done by the United States. Christianity, morality, humanity, patriotism and the spirit of liberty all combine to demand that we intervene to put an end to an atrocious struggle. We must answer for all the pillage, waste, rapine, butchery and starvation that may ensue from this time in Cuba."

The garrison of Paris are being rein- forced by large numbers of troops from Versailles.

ZOLA IN DANGER.

His Friends Think That Criminals Have Been Bribed to Hail or Kill Him.

Paris, February 13.—The question of M. Zola's personal safety is seriously ex- citing his friends, who assert that several notorious criminals have been seen hovering about the court building throughout the week. It is suggested that they have been lavishly bribed to injure M. Zola seriously, even if they do kill him.

The grave feature of the situation is the incursion of mob law inside and outside the Palais de Justice. Every dwell- ing of the Rothschilds is guarded as if it were a powder magazine.

It is expected that the trial will be con- cluded on Thursday next. It appears that there are certain flaws in the pro- ceedings which may entitle M. Zola to appeal to the Supreme Court.

In the Chamber of Deputies several members sought to revive the Dreyfus discussion, but the minister for war, General Billot, and the premier, M. Me- line, urged that the interpellation be deferred until the trial of M. Zola and Porreux is finished.

Numerous meetings were held in the provinces today in connection with the Dreyfus agitation. In some cases resolu- tions against the government were adopted, but there were no serious dis- orders.
