TORPEDOED!

Battle-Ship Maine Blown to Pieces From an Outside Foe.

Feeling is Rapidly Rising Against the Spaniard.

Only 96 Men of the Crew Are Saved. 258 Are Dead Many Diverse Opinions Expressed, May Mean War at Once.

Special to Journal. Key West, February, 17. A corps of divers from the scene of the wreck of the battleship Maine in Havana harbor says that divers have gone down along side the vessel and have discovered an 8 inch perforation hole, made by a torpedo in the steel plate of the battleship.

Admiral Montoro has summoned Captain Sigbee of the Maine to appear before the military judge to make the necessary depositions regarding the loss of his ship.

Another United States man of war is expected at Havana tonight.

It is reported that divers have found an eight inch hole in the plate of the Maine, indicating that the destruction of the vessel was caused by a torpedo.

It is believed here that a Spanish fanatic or a secret emissary of the Spanish government floated a torpedo under the water line under the Maine and against the forward magazine of the battleship.

It is stated that the belief of Captain Sigbee of the Maine, and that he has communicated this view of the matter to the Navy Department.

Admiral Montoro has notified Captain Sigbee that a joint committee of American and Spanish officers are to be appointed to investigate the cause of the explosion.

opinion. It is little less than remarkable that not a single resolution was introduced or a single speech was made in either House of Congress bearing on the disaster, save one of condolences with the families of those killed, offered by Mr. Boutwell and adopted by the House of Representatives.

The government of Madrid has expressed to Minister Woodford its regret at the catastrophe, more especially as it occurred in waters within Spanish jurisdiction.

The Maine went down in water deep enough to submerge all but the aft part of her superstructure deck. The whole forward part of the hull was turned completely inside out by the explosion.

The officers say had the explosion taken place with the vessel in deeper water, that first wild lurch of hers would have sent her settling sideways to the bottom. As it was, the vessel sank within three minutes, partly righting, she touched bottom.

The wreck took fire and sank and lighted the harbor by the lurid glare of flames, fed by the inflammable cellulose contained in the forward and after ends.

A large diamond shaped piece of equipment, which went so high in the air as to fall clean through the deck of the City of Washington in its descent adds another puzzling feature to the case.

Nearly all who were near at the time agree that the explosion was not in one single crash. These say that there was a loud report and that the sound of this was cut in two by that mighty roar which shook the city and wrecked the Maine.

Captain Sigbee was thrown from his bed, but was unharmed. He went on deck and ordered men to flood 2,000 pounds of gun cotton, which was on board. The order was carried out, but the men never returned. Havana, however, was saved from a still more terrible explosion.

Captain Sigbee says: "There is very little that I can tell. I was in the cabin at the time. I had just finished a letter to my family when that enormous crash came. The ship lurched heavily to port and I knew in an instant what it all meant, that it meant that my ship had blown up. All the cabin lights were put out, and as I groped my way out of the apartment I met my orderly running toward me. Reaching the deck, I gave orders to post sentries, keep silence and to flood the magazines. The magazines were already flooding themselves. I saw then the disaster was complete.

General Lee telegraphed the State Department.

Flashes at half-mast on governor-general's palace, on shipping in harbor and in city. Business suspended, theatres closed. Funeral tomorrow at 3 p. m.

Officers Morrill and Jenkins still missing.
