SAMPSON AT SAN JUAN.

Two Vessels Sunk There. Three Others Escaped.

The Philippines.

Was Ignored May 12. A flag of truce floats over Manila. Admiral Dewey will soon be in possession of the city itself, having sunk the Spanish fleet and the Manila harbor.

Dewey had already notified the government that he had captured all the Spanish forces in the vicinity.

Admiral Dewey also reports that the center of the Spanish fleet, the Spanish cruiser Albatros, was not in the Manila harbor, and after three hours of the Spanish vessels.

As a result of the successful exploit in Manila harbor, Admiral Dewey has obtained possession of the flag of Admiral Montenegro, the Spanish warship Albatros, and other trophies of the battle.

Other vessels of the Spanish fleet captured at Manila. The fleet consisted of a battleship, a cruiser, a torpedo boat, and a minesweeper. The Spanish fleet was completely destroyed.

WENT THE OTHER WAY.

Spain's Cape Verde Fleet Has Retreated to Cadiz.

IT IS A PITY

For Sampson's Fleet is Cruising Off Porto Rico.

And Hoped to Make an End to Spain's Navy. Spain Unprepared to Fight at Manila. Talk of Intervention Again. Mexico Unfriendly to Spain.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Although ten days have elapsed since the Spanish fleet left St. Vincent, and going at the rate of ten knots an hour they could by this time have covered the distance to San Juan, it now turns out that the Spanish fleet is not there at all.

Conjectures have been made by the naval authorities as to the whereabouts of the Cape Verde fleet. The official view was that the Spanish fleet was to the south of Porto Rico, at the Windward Islands and a battle was hourly expected to be heard from.

All these surmises will now have to be laid aside and new plans laid, if there is no mistake in the last reports, for according to official advices received tonight by the Navy Department the Spanish fleet has returned to Cadiz instead of having the attack of Sampson's fleet as has been hoped they would do.

From Hong Kong it is reported that the movements are taking place among the naval vessels of the foreign powers that suggests an intention of intervention by the powers in the Philippines. The situation at those islands is very serious for telegrams from Manila to Madrid, say that the insurgents have gotten beyond control of the authorities, and that they had attacked and killed many Spanish soldiers, among the killed being Admiral Montenegro, who fought against the American vessels, and who was wounded in the fight.

The probable condition of the whole Spanish navy is shown by reports of the Manila engagement. According to reports from reliable sources many of the Spanish vessels from their warships were uncharged and did not explode upon striking the American vessels. Several such shells passed through the flag ship Olympia without exploding.

The fear that has struck to the heart of the commercial interests, has reached the fishing interests. The owners of American fishing vessels have decided to abandon the fisheries on the New Foundland banks for fear of Spanish warships, reports of their presence in those waters being sent out from time to time.

Mexico has followed the other nations and now refuses to allow Spain to send any men or supplies of any kind through the Isthmus.

A report from China says that the British Consulate at Shanghai, in the Empire was burned by a mob.

At the churches in this city it is said that the Archbishop has ordered that prayers be offered for the success of the American arms in the contest against Spain.

Recently advice to the possibility of the United States transferring the Philippine Islands to another power, Europe is waiting with intense interest the policy of this country with respect to their ultimate destination.

It can be stated on high diplomatic authority that rather than that the Philippines should be given to the possession of any other nation, provided they could be returned to Spain, Europe, as a whole, prefers that they shall remain the property of the American government. A high State Department official who keeps in close touch with the President said today:

One thing is certain. If the United States does not retain possession of all of the islands it will keep a coaling station in the Far East for the benefit of American warships and American commerce.

Dewey's Orders. Washington, May 10.—The orders sent to Commodore Dewey were a model in every respect, but in none, in the minds of naval men and strategists, more so than in the absolute liberty they conferred upon Dewey to proceed after his own fashion in accomplishing the task which the department had set for him.

Here is the text of the orders: Washington, April 24, 1898. Dewey, Hong Kong, China: War has commenced between the United States and Spain. Proceed at once to Philippine Islands. Commence operations at once, particularly against the Spanish fleet. You must capture vessels or destroy them. Use utmost endeavors.

NORTH CAROLINA'S OFFERING

Ensign Bagley Gives Up His Life in His Country's Service. Special to Journal.

RALEIGH, May 12.—This city is in mourning over the death of Ensign Worth Bagley who was killed on the torpedo boat Winslow off the coast of Cuba yesterday.

The Winslow was fired on by a battery in ambush. A shell from the hidden battery burst above the boat. Ensign Bagley and four men were working a rapid fire gun and were killed by the fragments of the bursting shell. Lieut. Bernadon and three seamen were slightly hurt. The Winslow was considerably damaged and was towed to Key West.

The effect of the shell on Bagley was to blow off his entire face from the skull and to scatter the pieces. It is said that the Ensign staggered towards the flag when struck and sank down under "Old Glory" dying there. His comrades did not believe that he was dead until his arms slipped from the flag staff and lay fell to the deck.

The body of Bagley will be embalmed and sent to this city. He was only 25 years old, having graduated at Annapolis last year. The Raleigh Post is starting a monument fund for the Ensign's memory and the people are responding largely.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Grand Lodge to Meet at Raleigh Next Year. Special Terms for Superior Courts. Young Bagley's Death. First Regiment Equipment.

The Grand Lodge of the Odd Fellows met in secret session yesterday to discuss some important matters, among them being the meeting place for next year, Winston and Raleigh were the places named and Raleigh won by a large majority.

The next issue of "The Confederate Veteran" published at Nashville, Tenn., will be a North Carolina edition. It will contain among other things a portrait of Louisa Merritt of Chatham county, with a sketch of him by Mr. Richard H. Battle of Raleigh.

Ten convicts were yesterday sent to the Castle Hayne State Farm.

In the case of William Squire of Cleveland county who is sentenced to hang at Shelby, July 20, for burglary in the first degree, The Governor declines to interfere.

At the laying of the corner stone of the big new building at the Blind Institute yesterday the Governor had been asked to make the address, but not having time to prepare his speech he asked Mr. W. J. Peelle to speak for him. Mr. Peelle made a good address.
