Plan of Campaign.

New York, July 20. After the receipt of the report of General Miles' dispatch, peremptory instructions were sent to Admiral Sampson promptly to furnish the transports asked for by General Miles. KILGO-CLARK MATTER.

Question of Republican Endorsements a Problem.

In Practice Camp, Curious Burial Service. Senator Pritchard Not at Republican Convention. North Carolina's Quota of Soldiers.

JOURNAL BERKELEY. Raleigh, N. C., July 20. — The Kilgo-Clark controversy was discussed by the board of trustees of Trinity College but action was postponed until another meeting which is to be held August 29th. There was a full meeting and much evidence heard regarding the charges made by Judge Clark against President Kilgo, both of whom were present.

Early this morning the tap of the drum and the loud blowing of bugles with the heavy tramp of troops along the street told the line of march of the six companies of the Second Regiment had taken to go out on a practice march of six miles to the river where they will go in camp for two days.

The death of private Godley yesterday was a sad one although his condition from typhoid fever had been expected. There is some criticism upon the ways in which he was hurriedly buried. No services, only a few prayers at his grave in the Federal Cemetery, and a volley was fired over him and only the low muffled roll of the drums told that a soldier had been laid to rest to await the resurrection morn. Surely no matter what he died of he was entitled to a military funeral so far as it was possible to give it to him. His company was from Tarboro and on Sunday had been sent to the South.

It is well that when Col. Burren returns here with his soldiers from their outfit, that they should change their camp for typhoid fever has developed at their present camp to quite an extent, though it has not been pronounced epidemic.

The two deservists, Robert Carter from Company H, and William Miller from Company M, were sentenced to four years in prison, but on account of their youth and inexperience the sentence was reduced to one year. They will be carried to Ft. McPherson.

The Regiment is still not completely equipped. The cartridge straps have come, but there are no cartridges. The War Department has ordered the complete equipment of these companies that were ordered south before these here arrived.

Senator Pritchard did not attend the Republican convention which met at 12 o'clock today. As stated yesterday the attendance was small. The real test before the convention was the endorsement question. All the delegates wanted to endorse McKinley and Pritchard, but few wanted any endorsement whatever of their Governor. Some leading Republicans admitted they were in a dilemma, for if they endorsed Russell, the Democrats would use it against them in the campaign and would use the fact of their not endorsing him also. The real object of the convention was to endorse the nomination of Judges. Those so far named are D. W. Caldwell, 9th District, C. P. Locke, 8th, H. P. Sewell, 11th, and Henry Lacey, 10th. No nominations have been made in the 1st, 4th, 5th, 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th. James E. Boyd is permanent chairman of the convention, but Holton will be elected State chairman.

The statement from Washington yesterday that in the second call for volunteers North Carolina's quota was 284, but that only 50 had been furnished, has caused quite a stir in the State. Showing her to statements and figures shown here it is said about 20 men short of the required number.

Neither of the North Carolina Regiments have been furnished with the state or National colors. There is something very negligent particularly on the part of the State.

Russell Personally Ignored by His Party, Death in Camp, New Buildings, Populists to Endorse Pearson.

JOURNAL BERKELEY. Raleigh, N. C., July 21. — The State Republican convention has adjourned after 3 short sessions. It finally swallowed the nauseous dose of endorsing Russell along with President McKinley and North Carolina's Republican Senator J. C. Pritchard. The resolution regarding the State administration was as follows: "We hereby commend the administration of the State, because, (First) the finances have been wisely administered, (Second) the laws have been justly and impartially administered and the rights of life, and property secured thereunder. (Third) there are marked and gratifying signs of progress and development in all the material conditions of the State, exhibiting the return of prosperity, and the satisfaction of the people."

Governor Russell was in the convention but was not invited to take a seat on the platform. It was one of the worst gatherings of men that has ever been seen here.

SAN JUAN CAMPAIGN.

Occupation of Porto Rico to Begin This Week.

GARCIA SEEMS ALIVE.

Denied That the Cuban Leader Has Departed This Life.

Denied That the Attack on Spain is Off. Santingo in Peaceful Shape. Business Reviving. Fast. Cubans May Lose Their Supplies.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, July 21. General Miles cables to the War Department today that he expected to sail for Porto Rico at three o'clock this afternoon.

His departure from Cuba with the forces now under his command, on transports in the Bay of Guantanamo, depends on the naval convoy which he asked for, which has been provided from the fleet of Admiral Sampson by orders from Washington.

General Miles' command comprises General Carrister's brigade, which was a part of the reinforcements sent to Cuba but which were not landed, and other troops that have since arrived from Tampa and elsewhere, numbering in all about five thousand. Three steamers have sailed from Charleston with General Carrister's brigade on board, direct to the point selected for landing, and on Saturday General Haun's brigade at Charleston will also be on the sea, bound for the same place.

Fighting Soon. The Porto Rico expedition will reach the neighborhood of San Juan Saturday. A landing at the selected point will be made when fighting will begin at once. The Postmaster General has directed that a postoffice be opened on the island July 23.

The government has made arrangements to establish a postal service as fast as it is occupied by United States troops. Letter postage to all parts of the island in the possession of the American army will be two cents.

Attack on Spain. Secretary Long denies the report that Commodore Watson's fleet will be detached for that the attack on Spanish coast cities has been abandoned. He says everything possible is being done to hurry its departure for Spain. The administration determined to strengthen the fleet to the attack, even if possible, says to produce a general effect in Europe which will be beneficial to the United States and prevent foreign governments from interfering in the interests of peace to be made.

The President shows little policy of withdrawal of the United States from the Pacific under Commissioner Watson's command, which would make an offer will be sufficient to make the European never give way to a new treaty, but made of necessity in the price of peace. The departure to Spain will, however, be deferred until the Porto Rico expedition is ready, which is ordered to be immediate.

About Garcia. The rumored shooting of General Garcia is now denied at Kingston, at which place the report originated. General Garcia has left the neighborhood of the American army and will go to alone. The officials are considering the advisability for stopping the issue of food supplies to Garcia's men. The Cuban junta makes statements to the authorities in Washington that they disapprove of the reported actions of General Garcia and his men in rejecting General Shafter's treatment of them. The assertion was made that the Cuban insurgents desire to give the most complete cooperation in this country.

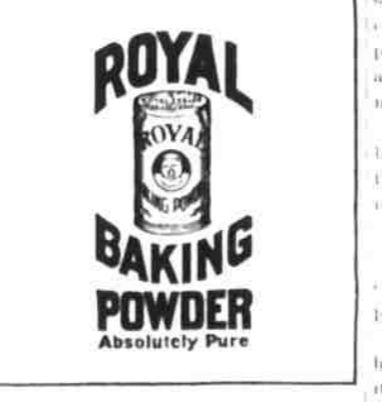

Yellow Fever. The progress of yellow fever at Tampa is confined by the government sending immune serum and nurses there. The steamer Geneva arrived at New York today with a wounded crew. The vessel was quarantined with its crew of suspected yellow fever on board.
