THE NEW SITUATION.

Spain Accustoming Herself to Her Altered Fortunes.

Capture of Manila With Allot Terms, Reorganization of the Fleet, Shley to the Pacific, The Great Naval Parade in New York Harbor.

Washington, August 20. The Spanish Cabinet is considering the question of whether it will be necessary to reorganize the department of the government known as the Colonial office.
Now that Cuba and Porto Rico are gone and the fate of the Philippine Islands hanging in the balance, the necessity of the office is questioned. The general opinion is that it would be a matter of economy to abolish the Colonial office altogether and make that branch of the government a subordinate one, dependent directly upon the orders of the President of the Council. Several other members of the Cabinet, however, still advocate its retention upon the question.

Fleet Organization.

It is stated that on the return of the fleet the entire reorganization of the north Atlantic Squadron will be made. It will include all vessels in the north Atlantic and West Indies.
A limited number of vessels will be retained at least temporarily to carry on the work of the north Atlantic Squadron. They will be succeeded by American Battleships and Cruisers.

Raleigh, N. C., August 22. At the Democratic primaries held last week the names decided upon for the county officers, sheriff, etc., were such as to almost assure the people of victory when the election comes off. There has been such a terrible dirty state of affairs in the county since here, that even the Republicans and Populists have become disgusted.
There are 80 convicts now at work grading the road of the Raleigh and Cape Fear Railroad. Sixteen miles will be finished by September 15.
It is said that the board of trustees of the Deaf, Dumb and Blind Institute gave the contract to J. D. Elliott of Hickory paying \$300 more than Boyster and Mosely of Raleigh had contracted to do the work for. The contract was made with the Raleigh firm for \$10,900.33, but in the specifications nothing was said about a forfeit should the work not be completed in the time stated. When the contract was to be signed a forfeit of \$23 per day for every day after 90 days was put in. This the contractors refused to submit, they refused even a 100 day forfeit clause. Then the contract was given to the Hickory firm at the above advance.

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THE CUBAN FLAG.

Hoisted Over Public Buildings at Santiago But Ordered Down.

Sentinel Shot by Cubans While on Guard, Being Investigated, No More Troops to Go to Manila at Present, Miles Sails For Home.

Washington, August 22. A soldier belonging to the 8th Infantry and a private of the same regiment were shot dead Friday night at Santiago, a short distance east of Santiago de Cuba.
The battalion to which the men belonged, who is a regiment was sent to duty about a week ago. The man who was killed was a private who was passing his post, he had just been assigned to duty.

When General Lertoux heard of the occurrence, he sent a staff officer to Santiago yesterday to investigate the affair. But the office was unable to obtain any definite information.

According to General Batten, he will visit Santiago today to look into the state of affairs there.
