A NEW TOWER.

Pine Improvement Begun On St. Paul's Catholic Church.

Work has begun on the new tower to be built on the front of St. Paul's church. The lower part of the tower will form a vestibule for the church. Above the vestibule there will be a music room for the convenience of the choir with an entrance to the gallery. The tower will rise 25 feet above the apex of the church building and will be an iron cross eight feet in height which will be covered with gold leaf. The height from the ground to the top of the cross will be 50 feet.

The improvement to the appearance of the building will be great. The plans are drawn by Mr. H. W. Simpson, architect. When the addition is made the whole building will be newly painted.

Fathers Edwards is much pleased with the changes being made and takes a personal interest in the work.

The history of the church building is of considerable interest. The church organization was perfected in May 1821, by Rev. John England, Bishop of the Carolinas. On the 24th June 1821, the vestry met and bought the lot corner Middle and New street, \$194 by D. T. for \$550. Enough money could not be raised however to erect a building and from 1824 to 1836, a building on Johnson street was used as a chapel. In 1836 \$1000 was raised for a church building of this \$1000 had been in hand for a number of years. \$100 was left by will by Dr. Key, a Protestant who wished to help the poor members.

On May 1st, Judge Wm. Gaston made a contract to Hardy B. Lane to build the church for \$3,784.34. It was finished during 1841. The dimensions were 40 feet long by 33 feet wide. The church was blessed in 1841 by Rev. Dr. Keynolds. Judge Gaston died January 20th, 1844, living long enough to see the building blessed, having always taken the greatest interest in all its affairs.

Two Robbed By Four.

Last Monday night two white men from Pollocksville were waylaid just outside this city, beyond the water works by four negroes and robbed. The names of the men were William Meadows and Henry Adams. They left here about 8 o'clock to walk home, going by the railroad and were come upon from behind and seized before resistance could be made.

They were relieved of their money and other effects, as well as pistols with which they appear to have been armed. Meadows was considerably beaten in the struggle. The above was reported by a visitor returning from Pollocksville.

ROBES WITH HONOR.

A NEW MASONIC TEMPLE.

Pursuant to the official notice published in the Messenger, a large number of the members of St. John's Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. M. Wilmington Lodge No. 219, Orient Lodge No. 355 Concord Chapter No. 1, and Plantagenet Commandery No. 1, attended the meeting called last night at St. John's hall on Market street for the purpose of hearing a report from the Masonic Temple corporation and considering the plans submitted by the board of directors for the erection of a Masonic Temple on the lot on north Front street now occupied by the old First National Bank building.

Mr. M. S. Willard, of the Temple corporation, explained the working of the association and how the funds are being raised for the erection of the building, and stated that upwards of \$6000 of the \$30,000 necessary for the purpose have already been secured so that no trouble in raising the additional amount is anticipated.

The plans were thoroughly discussed and a motion was unanimously adopted authorizing the corporation to proceed with the work on the plans adopted.

The plans for the building prepared by Mr. McMillen, the architect, were shown and they met with the approval of the meeting. The building is to be four stories in height, and the first floor will contain three stores twenty four by six inches in the clear and running back to a depth of ninety-eight feet. The second floor will consist of fifteen handsome offices. The Masons will have a large and elegant hall on the third floor, and the fourth floor will embrace a commodious hall to be let for public purposes. An elevator will connect all four floors, and the entire building is to be heated by steam.

The building will be the handsomest in the city and would be an ornament to any place. We understand that work on it will be commenced in January. —Wilmington Messenger 8th.
