## PRINTING MUDDLE.

Results in Unfortunate Delay in Publishing Laws.

Druggists' Liquor Tax. Assembly at Morehead. Bonds Will be Quickly Taken. Cotton Mill Dividends. Public School Letter.

RALEIGH, March 18. Great inconvenience will be caused by the delay in publishing the laws of the last General Assembly and in other printing. John Julian, who is arranging the captions of, and annotating and indexing the new laws, says that Edwards & Broughton will not do any of the heavy and most important printing until their suit with Barnes Bros. is decided. It will be April before the fight is made on the printing. Barnes Bros. have made a statement of their position in the matter.

The North Carolina insane laws have been published and will be distributed at once. The Secretary of State is sending these laws, together with certificates to the clerks in all the counties of the appointment of magistrates, to all parts of the State.

The statement is made by Treasurer Worth that under the new revenue law the sheriff, instead of the State Treasurer, collects the druggists' liquor tax. In towns of 500 inhabitants or less the tax is \$25, and in larger towns than this the tax is \$50.

The Teachers' Assembly will be held at Morehead City if the owners of the Atlantic Hotel can procure a railroad rate of one cent a mile, which they think will be given both by the Southern and the Atlantic & North Carolina railroads. This is on the authority of Superintendent Melane.

Capitalists in several northern cities are proposing to take the bond issue of \$110,000 in parcels or as a whole. One large and well known firm has offered 1.06 for the entire issue. It is now believed that the \$110,000 will hardly cover the indebtedness of the State's prison. The executive committee report that the books of the former management indicate additional debts and that it will not be possible to ascertain before a week's time exactly how the institution stands financially.

The cotton mills of Raleigh are in a highly prosperous condition. The Carolina High mills have declared a dividend payable April 1st of 4 per cent on the preferred stock and 3 per cent on the common stock.

The West Raleigh Baptist church extended a call to Rev. T. H. Leavitt of Fayetteville to the pastorate of that church. Mr. Leavitt has now accepted the call and he is expected in Raleigh probably this week or early next week. Hamrick has formally given up his office of Labor Commissioner and R. B. Lacy has taken possession.

Superintendent Melane has sent out the following circular letter:

"To the County Supervisors: The manuscripts of the public school law and notes thereon were placed in the hands of the public printer on March 15th, but owing to law suits, injunctions, &c., have no assurance as to a definite time having the school law published hence this letter.

"The supervisor will hold his office and discharge his official duties until the end of the school year or until his successor, the county superintendent of schools, is elected and qualified.

"The county superintendent of schools will be elected by the county board of directors on the second Monday in July.

"The county supervisor cannot do any visiting of schools since the 7th of March because there has not existed a county board of education since that date under whose supervision this work must have been done in order to be in accordance with law.

"The new county Board of Directors will allow the county supervisor pay for services actually rendered in public school work since the 7th of March. Such as examination of teachers, signing vouchers, &c., such compensation as was allowed by law by the county boards of education.

"It would be well for the County Supervisor to meet with the county Boards of Education and county Boards of Directors on the second Monday in April and assist in every way possible to make clear and plain matters of record as to the public schools and give all the information possible so that the school interest and work will not be injured by change of officers.

"The township committees will sign orders of teachers' salaries to finish up contracts made with teachers of the schools now in operation. These orders are to be rendered by the county supervisor as heretofore.

"This, I think is sufficient information until your successors are elected and qualified."

## TO CORNER AGUINALDO.

Otis' Plan in His Advance Movement Said to be Aimed at Closing in on Malolos.

New York, March 17.—A Washington special to the New York Press says: In the latest movement of troops the campaign against the capital of the Philippines is foreshadowed. A battalion pushed out from Pasig to the north side of the entrance to Laguna de Bay and took Calata. In so doing it crossed the Manila line and entered the Province of Morong.

Some days ago General Otis received overtures from the people of Morong, indicating that they desired to acknowledge American sovereignty. The capital of Morong is a city of 9,400 persons, bearing the same name. Calata is a place of 2,275, nine miles from Morong, and on Laguna de Bay. Tapay is even more important, having a population of 6,800. The belief is that the Morong people only await a show of American force to declare allegiance.

This movement suggests the possibility that General Lawton is planning to close in on three sides of Malolos when the time comes to make the general advance. Wheaton now holds the Pasig river to the lake and controls the lake with the improvised gunboats. He has the southern wing of the Philippine army where it cannot communicate with the northern, save by a journey through a difficult country of 150 miles or more. This most recent advance into Morong on the north side of the lake and formal dispersion of the natives at Calata and Taytay removes conditions which might be barring to an American column moving north.

Hale's brigade has been waiting at San Juan del Monte, north of the Pasig, and some distance out of Manila, in the direction of Morong. The operations of Wheaton northeast of Pasig and on the north side of the lake seem to make the way easy for Hale to march northward without fear of an attack on his right flank and to come in on the east side of Malolos.

Gen. Harrison Gray Otis is at Calcutan, a few miles south of Malolos. The fleet can steam to the westward of Malolos within a few miles, and a transport can land a force to approach the capital on that side.

Army officers who have studied the maps with reference to Wheaton's movements and the disposition of the other troops, think they see the formation of a plan to close in on Malolos in such a way as to make the capture complete.

## WILL CAMP AGAIN.

Annual Event of State Guard to Be Resumed. Directors For Goldsboro Hospital. Day Case.

RALEIGH, March 20.—The Governor today issued commissions as directors of the Eastern Hospital at Goldsboro, to Dr. Eliza Porter, of Rocky Point; Dr. J. W. Bullock, of Wilmington; Dr. J. E. Grimley, for a term of six years from March 1897; Dr. Albert Anderson, of Wilson; Dr. Shad L. Wooten of LaGrange and W. F. Rountree, of New Bern, for a term of six years, beginning March, 1899. H. C. Tyson, of Carthage, was commissioned a trustee for the colored Agricultural and Mechanical College at Greensboro for a term of six years, beginning March, 1899.

The Auditor has given a warrant of \$5,000 to P. H. Lybrook, the paymaster general of the State Guard, as part payment of the appropriation of \$16,000 given to the State Guard by the Legislature. It is now practically decided that there will be an encampment of State troops this summer. The annual encampment was stopped by the General Assembly of 1895, which reduced the appropriation to \$6,000, but the new bill, in addition to increasing the appropriation, specially says that the Guard may be ordered out once a year and have an encampment, provided that such encampment does not occupy a longer time than ten days.

The case of the State's prison, etc., vs. W. H. Day, was heard by the Supreme Court Saturday. The State's prison attorneys are Charles Busbee and R. O. Burton, while Day is represented by Judge McLaure, Judge Hul, of Halifax county, and Cameron McLaure. The substance of the arguments on both sides has been published. The decision of the court will not be made until next week.

## FIRE HORROR.

Windsor Hotel New York City Burned. Eleven Killed.

New York, March 17.—At least eleven persons were killed and about thirty five were injured in a fire which destroyed the fashionable Windsor Hotel, at the corner of Fifth Avenue and Forty seventh street, this afternoon.

The hotel was full of wealthy guests, many of whom were women. Their panic was terrible when the flames suddenly caught them in a furnace from which escape for many seemed impossible.

The fire was one of the worst horrors of the kind that ever occurred in this city. It started from the lighting of a gas curtain a few minutes after 3 p. m., and in two hours the hotel was in ruins.

## ADVISED DIFFER.

Regarding Situation at Philippines. The Nicaragua Canal Scheme.

WASHINGTON, March 20th.—Why are the official advices received from the Philippines different from those received by private parties? That is the question of the hour in Washington. At both the War and Navy Departments it is stated that all the news received indicates that the victories of the past week have demoralized the Filipinos, and that their early submission is looked for. This is decidedly cheering and there would be great rejoicing were it not for private dispatches received via Hong Kong, which say that the war is likely to go on for an indefinite period, and that it is liable to break out in fresh places any time, owing to the treacherous nature of the Filipinos, and their enmity to America; that the natives in Manila itself are organized and ready to take advantage of any opportunity they may get to massacre and burn, and that the whipping of Aguinaldo's army as a body will only result in turning the war into a bushwhacking guerrilla affair.

The Navy Department has been advised of the arrival at Manila of the battleship Oregon. The following is the cablegram received from Admiral Dewey:

Manila, March 18. "Secretary of the Navy, Washington: 'The Oregon and the Iris arrived today. The Oregon is in fit condition for any duty.'"

Additional supplies of smokeless powder ammunition are to be forwarded to Manila by the next steamer leaving San Francisco and New York. Preparations are being made by the army ordnance bureau to maintain in the Philippines large quantities of ammunition, so that the stock on hand may never be reduced below a certain limit.

A warning has been sounded concerning the crafty methods that are being used to create a sentiment in this country in behalf of the Panama Canal, a project through which the poor people of France have already been robbed of millions and a scandal created which, for a time, threatened the existence of the French republic, and which caused Ferdinand de Lesseps to end his days under the shadow of disgrace, that is worthy of more than a passing notice. Senator Frye found out while he was in Paris as a Peace Commissioner, that the managers of the Panama Canal Company intended to make the attempt to get control of the United States Congress, for the purpose of getting legislation in favor of the Panama Canal, and, of course, a big pile of Uncle Sam's good dollars.

The scheme succeeded to the extent of getting legislation for a Commission to investigate both the Panama and Nicaragua routes, work which Senator Frye points out was done by a Committee of which he was a member, more than twenty years ago. The next move in the scheme is a free trip given to such Senators and Representatives as will go, for the alleged purpose of investigating and inspecting the Canal routes. The trip is to last a month and the steamship that will carry the party will be furnished with everything good to eat and drink, and no money will be accepted from passengers.

## NAMES OF MAGISTRATES.

Appointed by the General Assembly of North Carolina, 1899.

An Act appointing additional Justices of the Peace for Craven County. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That the following named persons be and the same are hereby appointed Justices of the Peace for the various townships in Craven County as follows:

For No 1 Township: T. F. Hill and R. F. Dinkins, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; A. M. Williams and W. A. Ewell, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1902; W. C. Brewer, Freeman Gaskins, and E. A. Lancaster, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 2 Township: Freeman Enul and Josiah Tingle, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; W. H. Whitehurst and G. L. Arthur, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; S. W. Latham and Alfred Gaskins, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 3 Township: W. C. White and R. A. Russell, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th day of November, 1901; Joseph Kinsey and John W. Lane, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; M. Duffy Lane and J. S. Robinson, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 5 Township: J. R. Bacon and L. M. Gilbert, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; Isaac Taylor and W. G. Temple, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; Samuel Bacon and A. Lee, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 6 Township: John N. Hunter, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; T. H. Mallison, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; W. D. Flanner and John D. Pittman, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 7 Township: B. W. Ives, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; H. C. Wood and C. W. Hardison, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; J. W. Latham and C. B. Lilliston, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 8 Township: Thomas Gates, Mark Disoway, J. M. Hargett, E. T. Gas kill, J. F. Ives, S. W. Ipeck, and E. G. Hill, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; E. S. Guion, Edward Gerock, H. B. Duffy, H. L. Hall, D. F. Foy, S. W. Willis, H. B. Lane, G. N. Ives, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; N. Tisdale, J. A. Jones, E. K. Bryan, J. B. Baxter, C. E. Foy, E. W. Smallwood, J. B. French, T. F. Waters and G. T. Richardson, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

For No 9 Township: E. W. Wadsworth and Enoch Lane, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1901; Harris Lane and M. W. Carman, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1903; W. E. Lane, O. H. Perry, Thomas B. Ipeck and E. Z. R. Davis, whose term of office shall expire on the 30th of November, 1905.

Sec. 2. That the term of office of the above named Justices of the Peace shall begin upon the ratification of this act except that of J. F. Hill, A. M. Williams, John W. Lane, R. A. Russell, J. S. Robinson, S. W. Latham, Josiah Tingle, Alfred Gaskins, W. H. Whitehurst, G. L. Arthur, John D. Pittman, T. H. Mallison, Isaac Taylor, W. G. Temple, H. C. Wood, J. W. Latham, W. B. Lane, Thomas B. Ipeck and N. Tisdale, whose term of office under this act shall begin when their present term of office as Justices of the Peace shall expire.

Sec. 3. That all of the said Justices of the Peace except those mentioned in section 2, shall have until the 1st day of June 1899, in which to qualify, and those mentioned in sec. 2 of this act shall have thirty days after the expiration of their present term in which to qualify.

Sec. 4. That all laws and clauses of laws in conflict with this act be and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification, March 6, 1899.
