EFFECT OF INCREASED COST OF NEWS PAPER.

No person has the opportunity of seeing the practical demonstration of the effect of the increased cost of news paper, as does the exchange editor of a newspaper.

Within the past six months, the change in the appearance of a number of the newspapers of North Carolina has been most noticeable.

At the very best the press of North Carolina is but poorly sustained and paid by the people of the State. The outside news paper can under sell in this State, and it is not the responsibility of leading matter.

Too many "home folks" refuse to see the importance of local news, first as being all important to them, and second, that much of the quantity furnished them by the outside newspaper is of no value whatever to them.

The present price of printing paper means an added cost to the newspaper of 40 to 60 per cent, and to the newspapers of North Carolina which have to carry one quarter to three quarters of their subscribers from six months to the end of time, it takes little figuring to see how long the average paper can hold out.

A fair and legitimate advance in paper is all right, but an advance to benefit a single company, which controls the situation, is not to be tolerated, if it can be helped.

The present duties of six dollars per ton on paper, and \$1.67 on wood pulp is unwarranted, and is simply an unnatural commercial condition, and the repeal of this tariff is demanded by the press of the entire country.

The matter simply rests, that there must be a repeal of this tariff, or a poorer class of newspapers.

FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

Some Fighting Reported. No Peace Overtures. Dissection Said to Exist.

LONDON, March 25.—Lord Roberts cables to the War Office from Bloemfontein, under date of March 21, as follows: "So many burghers have expressed a desire to surrender under the terms of the last proclamation that I have sent small columns in various directions to register their names and take over their arms."

A cavalry brigade has gone to the eastward to Tzaneba and a detachment from Springfontein has occupied Suidbult, where some Transvaalers and a wagon with arms and ammunition were captured. The Transvaalers are at Elenburg and Heiderburg.

LONDON, March 25.—The Daily Telegraph has received the following dispatch from South Africa: "Warrenton, Cape Colony, March 21. An artillery duel took place this morning north of the Vaal river. The Twentieth Battery of Artillery, under Major Biewitt, silenced the Boer guns."

Artillery, supported by the Kimberley Light Horse, has made a reconnaissance which showed that the Boers hold several strong laagers. LONDON, March 25.—No new peace overtures have been made to Lord Salisbury nor are any expected at present by Great Britain. The recent telegraphic correspondence with Pretoria has been confined to the treatment of the prisoners.

Lord Salisbury is holding the Presidents of the South African republics responsible for the welfare of the British prisoners. The question of the safety of Johannesburg and the gold mines there have not been raised in this correspondence, which will soon be given to Parliament.

DURBAN, NATAL, March 25.—The town of Pomeroy, 20 miles east of Ladysmith, has been burned by the Boers. A British detachment arriving at Pomeroy as the Boers evacuated the place succeeded in taking up a strong position in the hill with a force estimated at number 500 men.

LONDON, March 25.—A correspondent of the Times at Bloemfontein, telegraphing Thursday says: "Yesterday Mr. Kruger issued a proclamation annexing the Free State to the Transvaal. Mr. Steyn immediately issued a counter proclamation declaring the Free State intact."

RELIEF FOR PORTO RICO. Help Given by the Passage of the Bill. The Duty Bill Hung Up.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The Porto Ricans are fortunate that they didn't have to wait until the Senate unknotted the knots in the bill providing a civil form of government and leaving a 10 per cent duty on their products before getting money badly needed for public use.

If any progress has been made with that bill during the past week it is not perceptible. Supporters of the bill are claiming that it is favored by the President and every member of the cabinet and that a majority is assured, but it is significant that they have made no move to get the bill to a vote.

The bill appropriating all money collected on Porto Rican products under the Dingley tariff and all to be used while that law remains in force, to be used for public purposes in Porto Rico has become a law, and steps have been taken to relieve the immediate necessities of the islanders so far as it may be done by spending money liberally on public works.
