MAY WITHDRAW.

Talk That Waddell and Jarvis Will Retire From Race.

Real State Campaign Opens Monday. Lumber Prices Expected to Rise. Ninth District Campaign. Sup. Term Court.

Special to Journal. Raleigh, Sept. 29.—The Senate tonight will next week be livelier than ever. It is now approaching the critical stage. As yet there have been no personalities. Efforts are made to repress these.

Some Democrats are heard to express the opinion that both A. M. Waddell and Thomas J. Jarvis will retire from the race for the United States Senatorship by October 15.

The really active work of the Democratic campaign begins next Monday. The Republicans will begin a little later. There are as yet no signs of Populist activity. Some Democrats express a willingness to bet that the Republicans and Populists will fuse on Congressional candidates in every district.

Arrangements will be made to give the Florida Press Association a very pleasant reception here on the occasion of its visit October 12th, on its way to Richmond.

Among today's arrivals were Robert R. Peckles of Northampton and A. D. Vats of Ireland.

The lumber men are in hope of an early advance in prices. Many mills in this section have run on half time, and there is considerable stock on hand.

State Chairman Simmons will formally open the national campaign in the 9th district by a speech at Asheville next Wednesday.

The Supreme Court will devote next week to the hearing of appeals from the Second district. The dockets at this time are somewhat larger than at the last one.

STRIKE KEEPS GOING.

Complete Tie Up in Hazelton Region. Men Not Satisfied With 10 Per Cent Rate.

Hazelton, Pa., October 1.—The thoroughness of the strike in the Hazelton region is shown by the fact that for the first time in years no coal car went out over the Reading Railway. The reading daily spends out hundreds of cars daily. All the mines in this region are now cleaned up, not a ton of coal is left for shipment.

The employees paid no attention to the ten per cent advance in wages offered by the Reading companies. Only 7 of the 29 Reading coal collieries are working today. All the Shamokin-coal mine Superintendents attempted to begin work today. Only a few, if any miners reported for work.

A demonstration to be made in Wilkes-Barre tomorrow, will be the most important yet attempted by the strikers, who now express the belief that there will be nothing less than 25,000 men in the line. President Mitchell expects to fully outline his policy in a speech he will then make.

Strike Cuts No Figure. Special to Journal. Washington, October 1.—Senator Morgan, of Alabama, whose conservative opinions have a high value, is in Washington. He said of the coal strike: "I don't believe that the mining troubles in Pennsylvania and other sections will cut much figure in the election. As for the charge that the Democratic committee was influential in bringing out the order for the general strike, I don't believe it. Either party would fight shy of getting mixed up in such a matter. It will be over and out no figure in November, I believe from the outlook."

Weather Conditions. Washington, October 1.—For North Carolina, rain Tuesday, fresh northeast winds.

Weather Conditions.—The barometer is high over New England and the lower lakes, and low to the southeast of Florida, causing general northeasterly winds on the Atlantic coast. Cloudy weather prevails from North Carolina northeastward to New England. Showers have fallen on the Middle and South Atlantic coasts. Philadelphia reports a rainfall of 2.32 inches during the past 24 hours. The conditions indicate rain for this section with fresh northeast winds.
