BEFORE THE SENATE.

Articles of Impeachment Adopted by The House Yesterday.

Managers Present the Articles to the Senate. Organize as Court Monday. The Judges Will Ask for Time.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, February 25.—Articles of Impeachment were presented by the board of managers to the House today at noon. The House went into a committee of the whole to consider the articles. All five sections were adopted by a vote of 50 to 22.

The House then voted upon the articles and adopted them by a vote of 50 to 22.

The House, presided by the board of managers went to the Senate Chamber when the articles of impeachment were read.

The Senate decided to organize Monday at noon as a High Court of Impeachment and be sworn in.

The judges will be immediately notified and will appear before the Senate with their counsel and ask for time to prepare their defense.

The managers of the impeachment and their lawyers have done a great deal of work on the preparation of the articles of impeachment, notably, a bill of indictment against the judges. It was thought the articles could be presented earlier than there were, but the progress made was not what was expected.

Timber Sale Near Iuluth.

DELAITH, MISS., Feb. 25.—Wisconsin lumbermen from Wausau and a Chicago firm are buying a tract of 200,000,000 feet of pine timber near this city at \$111,000. This is \$5.50 per 1,000 feet, and is the highest price ever paid, especially as the sale covers everything down to and including No. 1 stock.

Lumber from such a purchase will have to bring \$20 for No. 2 and better to give any adequate return.

THE REFORMATORY BILL.

Reported Favorably But Will Be Opposed. Bill to Regulate Labor Hours.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 25.—The bill for a reformatory for young criminals was today reported favorably. Great pressure will be brought to bear to secure the passage of the bill. Many legislators, however, expressing opposition to it, this opposition being mainly from the east.

There will be argument Tuesday in the very important bill to regulate hours of labor and the employment of children in factories. The agreement by the mill owners will then be presented.

TAX ON DISTILLERIES.

Legislature Will Levy It to Keep Them in Check.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, February 25.—The legislature will levy a tax on whiskey and brandy distilleries. It wishes to have particular supervision of whiskey distilleries and keep these out of prohibition districts. Up to this time there has been no State check whatever on these distilleries.

IN FOR 30 YEARS.

Man Who Terrorized Hot Springs Is in the Penitentiary.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, February 25.—The sheriff of Madison county brought to the penitentiary here, to serve 30 years, Guy Turner. The latter was one of those men who terrorized the town of Hot Springs, where in cold blood they shot down four men in the street. One of those shot died. The trial of the three occupied a week. The sheriff who brought Turner here said that there was not on the docket of that county about 400 criminal cases annually and that not a dozen of them were for larceny. There are no negroes in that county.

Y., one hour and six minutes late, and arrived in Chicago on time. The time made the run between Madison, O., and Huntington, Ind., a distance of 127 miles, in 147 minutes. This time, including stops, one of eight minutes' duration.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 24.—The Senate today passed the bill which releases the appropriation of \$5,000,000 for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition at St. Louis in 1903. It was amended by providing an appropriation of \$250,000 for a government exhibit at the Charleston Exposition to be held next December. Before the bill passed amendments were adopted, without dissent, closing both Expositions on Sunday.

AUGUST ELECTIONS.

Necessity Has Passed and There Will be no More.

State toward to Meet at Wrightsville. Governor and Staff Will go to Buffalo. Position, Rail road characters.

Revised February 25.—The bill on notice on effect in law has completed the draft of a bill for a new law. The August elections are done away with. Last August State Chairman Simmons told your correspondent that there would be no more August elections. Of course the election last August was held in that month as to be entirely separate from the national election, so there could be no federal interference with the constitutional amendment vote at the polls. The necessity for such elections has ended, of course.

The first real snow storm of the winter began this morning. The ground was very dry and ready to hold it.

It is quite probable that the State Guard will go into camp this year at Wrightsville, if the property on which the encampments from 1888 to 1891 inclusive were held can be secured.

The congressional district arrangement is a great puzzle. The census has settled that there shall be 10 districts, but now the task comes of so arranging as to make all equally Democratic.

W. H. Gray was today appointed assistant quartermaster general of the State Guard.

It is now regarded as reasonably sure that the State will build a new arsenal and hold of record. A bill to that end was favorably reported today.

The Southport, Wilmington and Darlington railway company is the one which has invested \$500,000 in terminal property at Southport. It will connect with the Norfolk and Western at Durham and give the latter road an outlet South, which it greatly desires.

The State charter for the Burlington fuel and ice company, capital \$13,000, with leave to increase to \$50,000.

Gov. Aycock will not attend the presidential inauguration. He and staff will go to the exposition at Buffalo.

New School Law Completed.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 25.—The subcommittee of the educational committee of the legislature today completed the new school law. There will certainly be four months' schools all over the State.

Rev. W. G. Clements, the superintendent of public schools in this county says he can have 5 months' schools. The trouble he finds is that parents insist on taking their children from the schools to work. He declares strongly in favor of compulsory education, and says that while he sees no immediate hope of it yet it will be ordered sooner or later, as a necessity.

Tea in South Carolina.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 25.—The American Tea Co., chartered under the laws of South Carolina, has purchased 500,000 acres of land near this city, and the planting of the next year's crop of tea will begin this week.

It is expected that next season 200,000 pounds of tea will be raised for the American market. The company is negotiating for other property.

WILL CUT DOWN.

Appropriation For Insane Asylums Too Large For Revenue.

Proposed Public Road Law Is Defective. Dr. Street Jones Said End. Bills Still Before the Legislature.

RALEIGH, Feb. 25.—The Supreme Court will devote this week to the hearing of arguments on appeals from the 4th district. The docket of this district is the lightest of all ever called in this court.

The total appropriation asked for the three insane asylums, and recommended by the joint committee is \$513,000. It was said today regarding this that there will have to be reduction, that the finance bill does not permit so large an appropriation and that the revenue proposed to be raised will not be sufficient. Under these circumstances the proposed appropriation for enlargement will probably be cut down. The Western asylum asked for \$150,000 for buildings. It has under way a new building to accommodate 250 patients on which \$50,000 has been expended.

Only about 4 inches of snow fell here. The temperature rose yesterday and the sunshine and wind carried it away rapidly.

It is learned from Rev. T. N. Frey that the South Carolina Epworth League will send a good delegation to the national convention at San Francisco.

The agricultural department's expert Mr. Sherman indicates that the State's wheat crop is well above the average.

There are some grave defects in the proposed new public road law. The chief one is that it does not give the State Highway Commission any real authority but really makes it advisory, that it makes the county surveyor a member ex-officio of the county commission, while as a matter of fact the majority of the surveyors are not competent, and lastly it puts the whole power and responsibility upon a township road trustee, who nine times out of ten will not have the zeal or the ability to carry out the work or plan it.

About three months ago Dr. Street Jones of Goldsboro, a young physician, was smothered in New York, and his skull fractured. He was about a week ago sent to the insane asylum at Morgan for special treatment, but died there Saturday.

There now remains only two weeks of the 60 days session of the legislature. Only one large measure is disposed of—the increasing of the superior court districts to 16. This week most of the greater measures will be acted on, partially at least.

General Gordon's Coat.
