RALFIGH.

Weekly Output of Penitentiary Shirt Factory.

Commitment of Sentence Asked For Convicts Sent to Granite Quarry. Annual Returns of A. C. S. System Underground Phone Wire.

RALFIGH, June 16.—Robert H. Cronly, secretary to President Elliott of the Atlantic Coast Line arrived here today and placed in the hands of secretary Brown of the corporation the complete annual returns of that system in North Carolina.

A. S. Hall of Fayetteville, today, as attorney for Lewis Council, colored, sent a petition to the Governor, June 2 for a reprieve, placed in the hands of Gov. A. C. S. for commutation of sentence. This is signed by the trial judge, the collector, the jury and hundreds of the best citizens of Fayetteville and of Cumberland county. Mr. Hall says there are the gravest doubts as to the sanity of the convict, and that popular sentiment all over the county is for commutation. Mr. Hall talked interestedly about the case, which presents a serious and dark future. It is said that it was not the purpose of the jury to let the prisoner suffer the death penalty. Since the trial there have been several interesting developments, Mr. Hall said.

Fifty convicts were sent from the penitentiary to Ashboro yesterday to work in the quarry of Mr. W. B. Troy.

In the 50 men of the penitentiary work output is about 400 dozen made to get brick sent to the penitentiary, but the freight rate was 22 1/2 cents. There are 4 kilns, each of which produces 100,000 bricks a day.

EXPECTS A GREAT CRASH.

Representative Mercer Thinks Trust Issue Will Settle Itself.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Congress will have plenty to do next winter and abundance of time in which to do it, said Representative Mercer, chairman of the House Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds, today.

Among other things, Mercer expects the trust issue will be settled by the time the Department of Justice Building is completed. The site for that building is too small, and some day we may have a fine structure elsewhere which will accommodate the Department of Justice, the Supreme Court and the Court of Claims.

"The trust question will doubtless be liberally discussed in Congress. I have not paid much attention to the Babcock bill and have no views to express concerning it. I think the trust will sooner or later care for themselves and anticipate a heavy crash at some future time. They cannot hope to continue consolidating time after time, and every time they consolidate injecting a quantity of water into the stock and securities. Sooner or later there will come a time when the holders of the securities will want to be paid, and where the money to come from? The way they are going now is like a man renewing a note and each time making it for a larger amount. The people hold those notes, and some day they will want their money and there will be difficulty in getting it."

Will Send Liberty Bell.

PHILADELPHIA, June 14.—Mayor Ashbridge has signed an ordinance appropriating \$35,000 for defraying the expenses of a Philadelphia exhibit at the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition, to be held in Charleston, S. C., next winter.

The Mayor also signed a resolution of the City Council providing that the old Liberty Bell be sent to Charleston as a part of Philadelphia's display.

Capsized in Dry Dock.

New York, June 14.—While the United States transport Ingalls was in the balance of the dry dock, at the Erie Basin, South Brooklyn, this afternoon, where she was about to undergo extensive repairs, she suddenly slipped from the blocks and capsized. One man is known to have been killed and many injured. There were about 340 carpenters, machinists and other laborers at work on the vessel and dock at the time. It is supposed that the vessel was thrown from an even keel by ballast placed on by the shifting of the blocks on which she rested, causing her to list to starboard, driving the shoring beams through the rotten walls of the old floating dry-dock in which she was cradled. Besides the mechanics and other workmen which crowded the vessel and dock preparing her for a voyage to Manila, there were supposed to have been about thirty Italian laborers in the hold of the ship, employed in shifting the pig iron ballast.

A Frightful Explosion.

PARIS, June 14.—An explosion in a cartridge factory situated in the suburbs of Les Moulins has resulted in the loss of 15 lives and the injuring of about 20 persons.

The victims were horribly mutilated, most of those injured were women.

NASHVILLE, TENN., June 16.—The boards of missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church South before adjourning yesterday appropriated \$18,000 for the expense account. A report of money received for Boothwork University in China in cash and subscriptions was given by Treasurer Hamilton, making a total of more than \$100,000. The board authorized the trustees to go forward with the building.

LOSSES OF FILIPINOS.

Number Captured or Surrendered Put at Over 31,000.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The War Department makes public today statistics showing losses by Filipinos in the war.

The compilation of reports covers the period up to April 30, 1901. Up to January 1, 1901, the number of Filipinos captured or surrendered was 21,485, together with 6,947 other persons, over 5,000 shells, 573,700 rounds of ammunition and 19 tons of powder. From January 1 to April 30, the number of captures includes 247 officers, 2,539 men and 8,492 men, making a total of 1,067 officers and 8,951 men, or a grand total up to that date of 31,415 Filipinos captured. To this is to be added 1,995 rifles captured and 4,300 surrendered, a total of 6,298, 45,149 rounds of ammunition, 405 boxes and 436 pieces of cannon.

THE STATE GUARD.

Encampment Will be Held at Seaside Park, Wrightsville.

RALFIGH, June 17.—The board of officers appointed by Governor Aycock to examine sites for the State Guard encampments this summer, Colonel T. H. Bain, F. A. Maceo and P. M. Pearson, agreed upon a report to recommend the Lattimer park at Wrightsville as the most suitable and available site.

The encampment will be by regiments. They recommend that the Second Regiment be encamped from July 10th to 19th inclusive; the Third Regiment from July 20th to 30th inclusive; and the First Regiment from July 31st to August 10th inclusive.

The Lattimer property on Wrightsville sound which is the site of the beautiful summer home of Mrs. Frederick Polson, of London, England, who kindly and generously tendered it to the State Guard. The board adopted resolutions thanking Mrs. Polson for her kind consideration.

"Lefty" High Sells for \$600.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., June 16.—Ed High, pitcher in the Virginia-North Carolina League, was sold today by Manager Ashenback to the New Orleans Club for \$600. This, it is claimed, is the largest sum ever paid for a player's release by one minor league team to another. High is a Baltimorean and a "southpaw."

RALFIGH.

Governor Hears Opposition to Commuting Council's Sentence.

PREFERS NORTH CAROLINA TO CALIFORNIA Third Spring Flood. Wealthier Too Cool. Seal Case Before Judge Parnell.

RALFIGH, June 17.—Last Saturday, as stated attorney Hall of Fayetteville was here and presented to Gov. Aycock petitions for commutation of the death sentence of Louis Council, convicted of murdering Mrs. J. R. West of Wade, Cameron county. Gov. Aycock's first visitors this morning were Mr. and Mrs. West and their friend J. P. Skipper of Wade. Mrs. West made a personal statement to the Governor in regard to the case and in opposition to clemency. Mr. Skipper said that attorney Hall had gone about through the county and secured in parts of it not near Wade, signatures to the petition for commutation, and intimated quite plainly that Hall had clouded the issue of the case. In view of these facts, said Skipper, it was thought best to bring Mrs. West here and let the Governor talk with her. She is a small woman of perhaps 30 years, and her husband is a farmer. Gov. Aycock will act in the case tomorrow.

Chairman Franklin McNeill of the corporation commission returned today, quite unexpectedly, from San Francisco. He came by the Santa Fe route. The other commissioners will not return before the end of the week. They will come over the Union Pacific. The chairman says the trip was a delightful one but that he prefers the Atlantic Coast to that of the Pacific. In other words he prefers North Carolina to California.

Much rain has fallen during the past 36 hours, and the weather is far too cool. The farmers will be lit hard again if this continues.

Dividend on May Corn Deal.

CHICAGO, June 16.—Checks for \$1,000,000 were sent out by the George H. Phillips Company yesterday to various points. The disbursements were in the nature of a dividend on the celebrated May corn deal, the pool account having been written up to 48 cents, this being the average price which the leader of the campaign has been able to figure out up to this time. These checks go out to about 300 individuals, who had an interest in the pool of approximately 15,000,000 bushels of corn. The "boxed" money bought at 35 cents. The average profit so far determined is about 3 cents per bushel.
