Resolved, That in the death of our comrades, Forns, Armstrong, Palne, Midyett and Potter, that this Camp has lost five of its beloved and faithful members, who in the dark days of war were vigilant sentinels, true, loyal and faithful soldiers, and in the years since the close of the war, they have been loyal citizens, faithful to every trust reposed in them, and the county, State and country have lost five good, law-abiding and peaceful citizens.

Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the records of this Camp to perpetuate their memory, that a copy be sent to each of the families of the deceased and a copy sent to the New Bern Journal for publication.

Dowdy of New Bern Camp, No. 1162 was called for and he made a short and appropriate speech to the Camp. Dr. B. F. Dixon, the orator, having arrived, escorted by Capt. K. R. Jones and X. M.
