GOOD FIGURES.

Methodists and Baptists Make Very Good Financial Reports.

Soldiers' Home Inmate Died on the Road. Gen. Tonn Has Pneumonia. Fair Receipts Were Large.

The annual meeting of the trustees of the Methodist episcopate will be held at Fayetteville during the meeting of the Conference there. The cash collections thus far for the episcopate are \$19,000, from A. F. Page, half of the Academy of music here, in lieu of \$7,500, from sons of A. F. Page \$100, subscriptions \$10,000, and besides this 30 individuals and Sunday schools pledge themselves to pay \$60 a year to maintain an orphan, this being equivalent to a \$2,000 endowment.

SERIOUS ERROR.

Manner of Fighting Fire at A. & M. College Caused Fatal Loss.

REMARKS. November 30.—Most of the talk here today was about the fire which last night destroyed Watasuga Hall at the State Agricultural and Mechanical College, two miles west of here. The fire originated in a loft over the kitchen, in which were stored mattresses, and various other very inflammable property and was due to a defective fuse. The building was three stories in height. On the first floor was the dining hall, used also for dancing and receptions. In rear of the kitchen, and on the second and third floors were 27 rooms, occupied by 30 cadets. The occupants were aroused about 11 o'clock by the smell of smoke and found the rooms full of it. There was a good water supply and the cadets got to work. A number of the cadets who roomed in the burned building were in the city. Some windows were sufficed to let out the smoke which was raising the fire. The fire corps of the college and the city firemen were at work and thought they had the fire under control, but made the grave mistake of cutting a hole in the state roof. This created a draft and about midnight the fire began to rage, air getting at it through the open windows. Most of the cadets in the building lost all their property. The loss is about \$10,000, with \$6,000 insurance. The 10 cadets thus burned out were forced to go home today, as there was no room for them. The other buildings are full and so are all the available dormitories in We-C-Raleigh. The legislature will now have to provide more dormitories. It was urged to do so at the last session but failed.

SIK HAT AND BARE FEET. In Solingen, the Sheffield of Germany, an individual was declared the other day to have committed a misdemeanor for having walked barefoot through the streets wearing a top hat. A party of wise friends made a bet that one of them, Rudolf Beck, would not walk a certain distance through the town in this eccentric guise. Herr Beck, in carrying out his plan, so offended the youthful population that they assembled in crowds round him and followed him, cheering and screaming, until he had finished his promenade. The police, not being of a humorous turn of mind, objected, charged him with a misdemeanor and sent him a summons calling upon him to pay a fine of 50 shillings. This Beck refused to do, declaring that Germany was a free country and if the police wanted to be allowed a dispensation with hats and shoes and stockings he would not like them. So the case had to go before the sheriff's court, and the result of the law required him forthwith and without the slightest hesitation. The public prosecutor, however, appeared to the criminal court, and the case was tried before a bench of five judges. The bench came to the decision that Herr Beck had disturbed order in the public thoroughfares, and ordered an absolute sanction and had imposed the public, so he was condemned to pay a fine of 10 shillings and costs. BATHROOMS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS. It has been decided that the public schools of Boston shall be provided with well appointed bathrooms. This movement has begun two years ago, when the Paul Revere school was built, and in future all schools are to have such conveniences. When a child presents himself for admission to a school and gives evidence that he has not been as well groomed at home as a proper regard for his health and the comfort of his classroom associates demands, it is the duty of an instructor to lead him to a bathroom and give him a lesson in the hygiene of the person. Not until he has passed a satisfactory inspection is he permitted to take his place in the class to which he is assigned. Children are naturally sensitive to classification among the unclean, who must while in that condition be denied the privilege of fellowship with those whose parents take better care of them, and as a result the boy or girl thus treated is very likely to go home and read the riot act to those responsible for the conditions inviting it. Teachers in the Revere school report that the system works admirably. The scholars come to school much cleaner than formerly, and the work for both teachers and pupils is better than formerly, probably because the classroom atmosphere is less depressing.
