REVENUE CUTTER BILL.

Introduced By Congressman Thomas For New Vessel For Service Albemarle

December 10, 1901, Congressman Thomas introduced the following bill, which was referred to the Committee on Inter state and Foreigh Commere and ordered to be printed.

ed with an amendment, committed to the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union, and ordered to be printed.

"For the construction of a steam revenue cutter adapted to service in the wa ters of Albemarle and Pamlico sounds North Carolina.

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to construct a steam revenue cutter of the first class adapted to service in the waters of Albemarle and Pamlico sounds and Neuse River, North Carolina at a cost not to exceed the sum of one hundred and seventy five thousand dollars."

Mr. Davey, from the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, submitted the following report.

The Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, to whom was referred the bill for the construction of a steam revenue cutter adapted to service in the waters of Albemarle and Pamlico sounds North Carolina, report the same back with amendment and with the recommendation that the bill as so amended do pass.

Strike out all after the enacting clause and insert in lieu thereof the following: That the Secretary of the Treasury be and he is hereby, authorized and direct-

ed to construct and equip a steam reve nue cutter of the first class, adapted to service in the waters of Albemarle and Pamlico sounds, and Neuse River, North Carolina, at a cost not to exceed the sum of one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars.


