Lightning and Thunderclouds. In a lecture on "Rainclouds and Lightning" a scientist explained the extreme blackness and grotesque shape of thunderclouds as being caused by electrification and said that occasionally lightning goes upward from ground to cloud. Lightning continues until the thundercloud has risen too high above the subjacent ground for the tension requisite. As the cloud lifts the lightning's path becomes more vertical. Thunderheads may be seen 200 miles.

Window glass has been broken by heavy thunder. The cumuli rise to a height of some six miles, then slop over and form a haze (thunder haze). Lightning will fall vertically from the extreme limit of the haze cloud some times, though no rain is falling. Lightning causes the clouds to partially fall to the earth in showers, and so itself causes rain.
