IS IT DEMOCRATIC EXTRAVAGANCE?

If the State deficit in its treasury funds of \$453,000, is to be charged against the Democrats, and every sign points to this being a leading issue in the coming campaign, then the Democratic administration and its friends should meet the issue frankly, honestly and unhesitatingly.

The Journal disagrees with the estimate, Raleigh Post, in the latter's argument, offsetting the alleged State Democratic Administration's extravagance, by pointing out as extra extravagant the administration of the Nation's affairs, by the Republican party.

The State Democratic administration must stand or fall upon its own record. The present administration is responsible for three great appropriations, \$800,000 for educational purposes, \$100,000 additional for soldiers pensions, \$800,000 for permanent additions in way of improvements on State institutions.

These are magnificent appropriations, but is there a dollar to be clipped from these amounts, which might be termed extravagant, hence demanding that it should be saved to the tax payer?

If it cannot be maintained that a dollar of these appropriations is not justly needed for the use it was appropriated for, how can the claim of extravagance be urged?

An extravagant State administration is one which first makes unwise appropriations for State affairs, and then pays out the money collected for these objects, over freely and unwisely.

There is no question but State appropriations and State expenditures have reached a large figure, but it should not be forgotten that the growth and development of the State demand the increase, if North Carolina is to keep up with the world's progress.

The declarations of the State Republicans, in their platform, are perfunctory, and of course full of indignation from a partisan stand point.

Plank number seven in the platform is as follows: "We invite the attention of the people of the State to the clean, able and economic administration of our State government by the Republican and Populist parties from 1897 to 1901, and challenge a comparison of it with the present reckless management of our affairs by the Democratic party."

This is ridiculous enough to be a good joke, and even Republicans must laugh, when they apply "clean, able and economic" to the late Russell administration.

It is quite a jump from Russellism and his Negrolism, joined with Butlerism, to the present exclusion of the colored voter.

It would have looked better, if plank number seven had been left out.

NEUTRALITY TOWARDS THE COLORED VOTE.

The position of the colored voter in North Carolina at the present time, is that of being a voter of no special political organization.

This is due to peculiar and extraordinary circumstances. The colored man may have voted for Democratic nominees at times, but this has been due to local conditions, so that the colored vote does not belong to the Democratic party, through choice or inclination.

At the Republican Convention at Greensboro, last week, the colored vote was without representation, which provoked certain colored leaders to declare against the State Republicans, and determine upon political independence on the part of the colored vote of this State.

What this may mean, in actual number of votes to be lost to the State Republican ticket, remains to be seen, for there is absolutely no disposition or sentiment in the colored voter, to vote any ticket but the Republican.

So far as Democrats are concerned, this breaking away of the colored vote from the Republican ticket, has no political significance, as being through its influence.

The Democratic party is the original White Supremacy party in this State, and the action of the Republican party at Greensboro is an attempt to place itself in the same white column.

But in this breaking away of the colored vote from the Republicans, there is much which threatens the stability of the Democratic party, especially in those districts where the colored vote is large.

There is the temptation to not merely accept the colored man's vote, when tendered to aid the Democratic ticket, but also to go further, and seek this vote when a Democratic candidate may feel that his election is in doubt.

The colored voter has the right to vote for Democrats, but for Democrats to seek out the colored vote upon the same level, and through the same means as he seeks the white man's vote, then is the stability of the Democratic party, to urge itself as being the white man's party, seriously impaired, with worse to follow, if such a course shall be persisted in.

Presence of Military Prevented Lynching

So Said of Henderson Situation. Political Gossip. Cotton Damage. Personals. New Insurance Company Admitted. New Theatrical Company.

RALEIGH, Aug. 29.—Adjutant General Royster writes here that the presence of the Henderson military company at the Vance county jail unquestionably prevented the lynching of the five negro prisoners there who on Tuesday were placed in the penitentiary. It appears that all the plans were made to lynch the men, not by Henderson or Vance county people but by others.

Hot Because Unsated.

GREENSBORO, Aug. 28.—Ex-Congressman O'Hara of Craven was bitter and outspoken in his denunciation of the convention for unsating the colored delegates. As soon as he ascertained the action of the committee in reporting adversely to his contest he went out on a side porch and unburdened himself. "The colored people," he said, "are as glad to get rid of the white Republicans as they are of us. We certainly do not need the rag-tags. We are not for any set of men, but for principle, and when principles are repudiated we know what to do. Pritchard and no one else can make a contract for me. The colored people won't be led in any such manner as this. We can organize the negroes if they organize against us. We are under no obligations to the white Republicans and owe them nothing. We will not vote for any ticket that emanates from here. Our people are not all poor and we have got some money and can make a campaign if necessary. I pledge that ten colored votes will be cast against the Republican party for every Democratic or independent vote that it captures. The colored people will be heard from; they will not vote for a party that kicks them out. I'll give in every county in the State where there is any ghost of a show for Republican nominees and secure enough negro votes to bring about defeat. There are many white Republicans who feel as we do."
