### RALEIGH.

Chief Dawson's of Elizabeth City, Libel Suit.

Two Thousand New Pension Applications. Vary Young at Marriage. Political Paracent Mrs. Bunch Buried. Missionary Pledge Given.

RALEIGH, Sept. 24.—State Auditor Dixon today completed the examination for the State pension board of the more than 2,000 new applications for pensions.

The State board of examiners of public instruction met here again today. It is composed of W. P. Wood, J. P. Jeter and T. W. Patton. It had a conference with the Governor today.

Chief of Police Dawson of Elizabeth City sued a self-formed "citizens committee" there for libel, growing out of a publication made by it regarding him and the Cropsy case. The court below held there was no libel. The Supreme Court sustains this and says no special damage resulted and that the words used by the citizens committee did not impute to Dawson unfitness to perform the duties of his office or want of integrity.

A charter was granted today to the Piedmont Electric Company of Asheville.

Among today's arrivals were M. E. Manly, New Bern; Edwin A. Holt, Burlington.

Rev. W. C. Newton of the Baptist church at Greensboro, goes to China as a missionary. Piedmont Association has pledged itself to bear his expenses. His own church promised him \$500, but gave him \$750.

The age of two large oaks which died in the capitol square and were cut down this week was found to be 160 and 170 years respectively.

Some of the applicants for widows pensions give their ages at from 44 to 50 years, and this in spite of the fact that in order to receive pensions they must have married a soldier prior to April 1, 1865. The one who gives her age as 44, was therefore only 7 years old at that date. Of course all such applications are rejected.

Secretary of State Grimes and State treasurer Lacy spoke in the campaign in Harnett county today and will make three more speeches in that county.

State labor commissioner Varner, who arrived today from Lexington, says he has been all over the 7th Congressional district and that there is less of the independent movement there than in any other district. He says the Democrats will sweep every county except Yadkin and Davie and that there is a prospect of their carrying Davie, while the Republican majority in Yadkin will be reduced.

This afternoon Mrs. T. V. Bunch, the wife of station-master Bunch of the Union passenger station here, and mother of Mr. R. E. L. Bunch, ex-general passenger agent of the S. A. L., was buried here. Her age was 69. Two weeks ago she fell from a step ladder, breaking her hip and sustaining internal injuries which caused death.

### Superior Court, Tuesday.

The case of White vs. Railroad, was continued until the next Civil term of Superior Court for Craven county.

Case of E. H. Phillips vs. Elm City Lumber Co., judgment was rendered for plaintiff.

J. M. Arnold vs. Seaboard Air Line for damages was warmly contested, and was given to the jury in the late afternoon, and they deliberated on the case until near midnight, when a mistrial was agreed upon.

Several cases were discontinued during the day, and much other routine work done, after which the court adjourned for this term.

### Tobacco Talk.

More tobacco was sold here yesterday than any other day this season, to except opening day.

A large crowd of farmers were in town, coming in on the several trains, and many carts and wagons loaded with the golden product were seen passing on the street. The quality of the wood was perhaps the best that has been offered here so far, and the usual good prices prevailed, gladdening the hearts of the sellers.

### RALEIGH

North Carolina Day in Public Schools.

Rules For Filing Briefs. On Trial For Murder. S. A. L. Wreck Cleared. Pension List Needed Balms Fall.

RALEIGH, Sept. 25.—State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joyner will in a few days designate the day which will this year be observed as "North Carolina Day" in the public schools. Last year the day selected was too early, as many schools were not open. He will in all probability select the Friday after Thanksgiving day. Then all the schools will be open. There will be special exercises.

The Supreme Court today announced a rule amending the rules regarding the filing of briefs. Printed briefs are now required in all cases, except in pauper appeals. The appellant must file his brief on Thursday before the call of the district to which the case belongs, and the appellee must file his on Monday of the week of the district. Printed copies of the above amended rule will be sent to the clerk of court in each county and to attorneys practicing in the Supreme Court.

In the Superior court here today, Lorenzo Morris, white, said to be about 35 years old, was put on trial for the murder of Mrs. Catharine Bailey, whose age was over 60. She was killed in the yard of her home, 23 miles from here, near the Granville county line, and was found lying on the ground with her skull split open and a bloody axe a few feet away. Your correspondent had a talk today with a man who married an aunt of Morris', and this man said Morris was not bright as to intellect; that he and Mrs. Bailey once walked all the way to Raleigh to marry, but that after she gave him \$3 with which to buy the license he decided not to marry and they walked back. She broke down 14 miles from here, and there Morris left her and walked home. Later he said if she would pay for a buggy he would take her to Oxford and they would marry. She gave him the money, but they never went. She wanted to marry him. She had some property. He was teased a great deal about her and was heard to say that he would go over to her house and kill her some day. After his arrest he claimed that Lawrence Davis, a young man of Granville county, had hired him to kill the woman and had promised him \$50 for that work. Davis' arrest followed but he was quickly released on bail, as the story was not believed, but people were sure Morris was the murderer.

Counsel for the defence suggested and solicitor accepted murder in the second degree, as Morris was clearly partially unsound mentally. The judge thereupon sentenced Morris to 30 years in the penitentiary.

The Seaboard Air Line trains blocked by a wreck near Murry Oaks yesterday morning, got through this morning. The loss by the wreck, to cars and private property is heavy.

State Auditor Dixon finds that there were 3128 new applications for pensions of these about 3300 passed. Of the new applications 647 were by widows and 2581 by soldiers. During the year 89 widows and 106 soldiers are reported to have died and this number will reach 300. There were last year 9000 pensions. The net gain this year will be about 2000. Auditor Dixon says this is, in his opinion, the high water mark, and that henceforward the number will grow less and less. The law provides that when the pensions are probated the reduction shall apply more particularly to the 4th class soldiers and to widows. Last year the 4th class and widows got \$20 annually; this year it appears they will receive \$15.

Much needed rain set in today. Streams are very low. For several days this city's water supply has taken nearly all the flow of Walnut creek.

Governor Aycock and Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson left here this morning for the piedmont section on a ten days campaign tour.
