INCORPORATED CO'S.

Increase of Million Dollars in Raleigh's Tax Valuation.

Beaufort Naval Reserves Accepted. Cow Killed Car Escaped Detachment. Colonel Olds Gives Lecture.

Raleigh, July 11.—The following important companies were incorporated in the Secretary of State office today: The Clyde Cotton Mill of Newton, Catawba county, with \$100,000 authorized capital and \$50,000 subscribed, J. O. Smith and G. A. Warwick are the principal incorporators; The Haywood Coageage Company of Waynesville, to manufacture barrels, staves and coageage material, with \$4,100 subscribed and \$15,000 authorized, the principal incorporators being A. A. Boggs of Waynesville, and W. E. Boggs of Jacksonville, Fla. The D. M. Jones Company, to deal in hardware and general merchandise at Elizabeth City with \$10,000 capital. The Bank of Faison at Faison, in Duplin county, with \$10,000 capital, the stockholders are B. B. Witherington, J. M. Faison and other local men. The Faison Glazing and Manufacturing Co., of Faison, is also incorporated with \$3,035 subscribed capital and \$25,000 authorized.

Adjutant General Royster is here to confer with the Governor and decide the three locations for the annual encampment of the North Carolina regiment. The first regiment will encamp at Morehead City, but the other two points have not yet been announced. Plans will also be perfected today for the movement of the troops and the exact date for the encampment determined.

The application for admission into the Naval Reserves of the Company organized at Beaufort is accepted by the Adjutant General. This will make the sixth company of Naval Reserves, and the State is allowed eight such companies.

Quartermaster General Francis Mason was unable to be here for conference with Adjutant General today. He is at home suffering from a painful wound in the foot which is giving him much trouble.

The funeral of the late Major A. M. McPheeters was held from the First Presbyterian church this afternoon. Thirty prominent citizens acted as pallbearers. The remains were interred beside the grave of his father Rev. William McPheeters in the old City Cemetery.

A peculiar accident occurred on Hillsboro street last evening. A street car coasting down the hill going to the Fair grounds struck a Jersey cow on the track. The cow was instantly killed but the car passed over her body without even being delayed.

The time for listing taxes in this county expires today but the lists in Raleigh will probably be allowed to continue next week. The lists estimate that over \$150,000 worth of real estate has not been given in. They also believe that the personal property will show a falling off of between \$200,000 and \$250,000 from the previous year. This is due they think, to investors placing their money in non-taxable securities. The assessors have completed their work in the city and are now assessing the outside property of the township. They expect an increase of a million dollars in the valuation over the previous assessment.

The State Central Executive Committee of the Anti-Saloon League has been called to meet here next Monday night. It is probable that at this meeting action will be taken carrying out the work outlined by the recent State Temperance Convention. The field workers are to be chosen when the necessary \$5,000 is provided.

Col. F. A. Olds yesterday conducted one hundred teachers through the State Hall of History and lectured to them on the various objects of interest there.

The low water in the river has made a deal of trouble for heavy draft boats. Last night the steamer Neuse endeavored in vain to get away from the E. O. D. dock. The "donkey" engine made several efforts to get her off but to no avail.

The tug and steam boats shared the same fate in different places on the river and they patiently awaited the rise of the tide.

It was expected that the tide would arise during the night and release them.

The river is the lowest that it has been for years. Off East Front street the bottom is visible nearly to the channel and boatmen find it impossible to get to the docks.

The Board met at the Court House, July 8th, 1903 at 10 o'clock a m in regular session.

Present Commissioners, Baxter, Wadsworth and Richardson. The Board being without a Chairman Commissioner Wadsworth placed in nomination Commissioner Baxter for chairman, there being no other nomination Commissioner Baxter was unanimously elected.

Ordered by the Board that the Court House be draped in mourning for thirty days in memory of the late Chairman K. R. Jones.

Ordered by the Board that a recess be taken until 2 o'clock, out of respect to the memory of the late Chairman K. R. Jones.

Ordered by the Board that J. L. Lupton be allowed to list his taxes, he having given a satisfactory excuse for not listing same at the proper time.

It appearing to the Board that a vacancy exists on account of the death of the late Chairman of the Board, K. R. Jones, and that the same ought to be speedily filled, as the Board of Equalization meets on the 2nd Monday in July; it is ordered by the Board that the Justices of the Peace convene at the Court House in New Bern at 12 m on Saturday July 11th, 1903 to fill the said vacancy as required by law; it is further ordered that a copy of this resolution be published in the Daily and Weekly Journal until the day of meeting and that the clerk send written notices to all magistrates in the County, and it is further ordered that the Chairman sign said notices.

Ordered by the Board that the petition of E. F. White and others for a draw in the bridge across Swift Creek at Vanceboro be referred to Commissioner Harvey, to inquire as to the advisability of having same and cost of putting it in, and to report at the next meeting of the Board.

Ordered by the Board that O. W. Jones be allowed to list his taxes for the year 1903, as it appears that he was sick during the month of June and could not list same.

Ordered by the Board that Jor. Nelson be allowed to list his taxes, he having given a satisfactory excuse for not having listed same at the proper time.

Ordered by the Board that a recess be taken until 2 o'clock, out of respect to the memory of the late Chairman K. R. Jones.

Board took recess until two o'clock p m. Board met at 2 o'clock p m pursuant to recess.

Ordered that J. J. Wolfenden be allowed to list for the year 1899, 1,000 acres of land lying in Township No. 2, on Broad Creek, being formerly the property of Hearn, Loky and Cannon, now the property of J. J. Wolfenden, said Hearn, Loky and Cannon having failed to list the same for that year.

Ordered that G. M. Robinson be allowed to list his taxes, he having given a good excuse for not listing same at the proper time.

Ordered by the Board that M. W. Chapman be allowed to list his taxes for the year 1902.

Ordered that report of J. W. Biddle, sheriff, be accepted and filed and spread upon the minutes.
