AN UNPLEASANT EXPERIENCE.

Mr. J. B. Dawson Dragged by the Mail Train, From the Pollock Street Crossing to Above Broad Street.

Mr. J. B. Dawson had a very narrow escape yesterday from a serious and possibly a fatal accident.

In the future, he will either take no other mode of transportation or will measure the speed of a moving train with his life.

Being desirous of going to the depot to mail some letters he found he was too late for a transfer and therefore went to the Pollock street crossing and endeavored to get on the train there. It was moving faster than he thought—too fast indeed, to attempt to board. He grabbed both rails but his hands slipped down giving him no opportunity to get onto the car steps nor to change his position. With great presence of mind he held on to the rails with a vice like grip and kept his feet from contact with the wheels.

The conductor and a passenger got hold of his arms and did all in their power to help him seeing it was impossible to get him on the train. He was dragged for a distance of ten or fifteen feet above Broad street.

On account of some truck cars being on the train the air whistle was disconnected, consequently the engineer could not be signalled to stop the train.

Happily Mr. Dawson did not suffer any bruises or lacerations on account of his experience and he did not think he was in an extra hazardous position as long as he kept his feet out side of the track.

When the train stopped he boarded the train as lively as if nothing of the kind had happened.

He Worked the Aurora Borealis.

George Bartlett Prescott was one of the pioneers of the science of electricity in America. He began the study of electricity in 1846, when he was sixteen. With Edison, he owned all the patents in the quadruplex system both in this country and in Great Britain. He introduced the duplex system in 1876 and the quadruplex two years later. Prescott made certain that the aurora borealis was an electrical display, and while in the Boston office on one occasion he disconnected the batteries and operated the wires with the atmospheric electricity.

Balloons and Rifle Balls.

Some interesting experiments have just been conducted at Bienna, France, for testing the practical utility of captive military balloons against infantry or machine gun fire. The Paris correspondent of the Newcastle Chronicle states that at a height of 800 yards a few volleys sufficed to shatter the balloon, the range, it should be stated, being known in advance. At an unknown altitude varying from 1,100 to 2,000 yards no fewer than twenty-two trial shots were needed to fix the range. It was only the sixty-fourth volley that hit the balloon, without, however, doing it any apparent damage. The experiments are regarded as showing that rifle fire is not very effective, even against captive balloons, at uncertain ranges and still less so against balloons that are not captive.

Declining Birth Rate.

The continued decline in the birth rate in England has begun to arouse apprehension of the nation's future. In 1896 the birth rate was 35.3 per 1,000. By 1900 it had fallen to 28.2 and by 1901 to 28.5.

Attention was called to the matter in the registrar general's last annual report, issued in June, 1903, which pointed out that the birth rate was then the lowest on record, while infant mortality was startlingly high. Dr. Sturdevant in a recent lecture at Stoa college showed that the decline especially pertained to industrial centers. In England generally it is among the middle classes that the birth rate shows the most serious decline. In Australia the working classes are the pioneers of restricted families.

Proceedings June Meeting. Liquor License and Schedule B Tax Reports County Officers.

Board met at Court House in regular session June 6th 1904.

Present Commissioners Baxter, Foy, Wadsworth, Harvey and Richardson.

Ordered that A. D. Harris of 8th Township be relieved of poll tax on account of poverty and infirmity.

On motion Board took recess until 4 o'clock p. m.

The Commissioners met with the Magistrates of the county June 6th 1904 for the purpose of laying the taxes for the year 1904.

There being no quorum present the Board took recess until 5 o'clock.

The Board of Magistrates met at the Court House at 8 o'clock p. m., pursuant to recess.

Upon motion the roll was called and there being a majority of Magistrates present, the meeting proceeded to business.

The following levy was made for the year:

State purposes 21 cents on the \$100 valuation.

Fenians 4 cents on the \$100 valuation.

Schools 19 cents on the \$100 valuation.

County purposes 98 cents on the \$100 valuation.

County special 10 cents on the \$100 valuation.

Bridges 10 cents on the \$100 valuation.

R. R. Bonds 3 cent on the \$100 valuation.

Poll Tax \$2.84.

On motion it is ordered that the Board of Magistrates petition the Legislature to pass an act empowering the commissioners to use the convicts of Craven county upon the public roads in the county.

On motion of Jas A. Bryan it is ordered that the Board of Magistrates petition the Legislature to pass an act reducing the number of counties in Craven county to four (4) during the year.

Upon motion Board adjourned.

The Board of commissioners met at 4 o'clock p. m., pursuant to recess.

Present commissioners, Baxter, Richardson, Wadsworth, Harvey and Foy.

Ordered that a voucher be issued to Seth West to the amount of \$8.08 for taxes paid on property of R. P. Walker in 3rd Township, which should have been paid to Lenoir County.

Ordered, that income to the amount of \$900.00 listed to E. M. Green be stricken from the list, it appearing that same was listed through error.

Ordered by the board that whereas it appears by the petition of Thomas H. Grover and eleven other land owners that all land owners over whose lands the road hereinafter mentioned will pass desire that the road beginning at Coats Creek running by Hogswell gate, via the old Taylor road to the Adams Creek road be made a public road. It is ordered that said road be and is hereby made a public road provided the county shall not be charged with any expense in the matter.

Ordered that poll tax charged to S. L. Kilpatrick of 8th Township be stricken from the list, he having died during the month of September 1903.

The report of the Auditing Committee upon being presented was after examination accepted and ordered spread upon the minutes.

Ordered that tax deed of Cleora Best in 2nd Township be transferred to N. I. Fulcher, he having paid taxes and costs on same.

Ordered that report of Dr J F Rhem Supt of Health be accepted and spread upon the minutes.
