LENOIR REPUBLICANS.

Met in Kinston Wednesday and Put Out a Full County Ticket!

The Republican county convention was held in the court house here, Wednesday and a full county ticket, headed by Mr C S Wooten, of LaGrange, for the house of representatives, was nominated by a viva voce vote, the entire slate arranged in the row before the convention was called to order going through just like it was gassed.

These are they, who were selected for the sacrifice at the polls in November, C S Wooten, house of representatives; T B Brown, sheriff; S R Dunn, Register of deeds; Wm Arthur, Surveyor, Census taker; R B Kinsey, John Tighman, S F Daugherty and W H Cox, commissioners.

Pierce Storm in England.

London, Oct 6.—The coasts of England and France were swept by a terrific gale all through the night and this morning the storm has abated but little. Many liners are storm bound at Liverpool, and elsewhere.

A dispatch from Havre contains a report from the captain of the steamer Lois. He says when 12 miles northeast of Ushant he saw two whale boats and a large quantity of wreckage apparently the remains of a large steamer. It is feared a serious disaster has occurred. The gale was blowing off Ushant then and a thick fog hung over the sea.

Another Naval Victory.

London, Oct 6.—A dispatch to the Central News from Chee Foo, dated 2:30 this morning, says a big naval battle is proceeding outside the harbor of Chee Foo.

It is thought the Fort Arthur fleet made a sortie to reach Chee Foo, and that it encountered the Japanese squadron.

A later dispatch says the firing ceased at 4 o'clock. As nothing has been seen of the vessels it is believed the Russian were either sunk or captured.

RALEIGH.

Assignments of Rural Tax Districts

J. C. Blackley Guilty of Embezzlement. Superintendent of Public Instruction Joyner Ill. Report of Dispensary.

Raleigh, Oct 6.—The jury in Wake county superior court returned a verdict of guilty in case of J C Blackley of Louisburg charged with embezzling \$5,000 while selling horses and mules for J M McAdow of Arkansas. The defense was that Blackley was a partner and not an agent and that proper settlement of the partnership would have been made but for the fact that his arrest frustrated a subsequent investment and lost the fund. Judge Ferguson imposed a sentence of 5 years on the public roads. Blackley appealed and gave a \$4,000 bond. He is a member of an excellent family of Louisburg.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction, J Y Joyner, is ill at his home and was obliged to cancel an engagement to attend the district conference of county superintendents of public schools that convened at Statesville today.

The report of the Raleigh dispensary for the quarter ending September 30th shows that the gross receipts for that period aggregated \$38,878 while the gross receipts since the dispensary opened January were \$117,081. Appointments are made for T C Bowler in the Eighth District at Concord Oct 21, Albemarle Oct 22, Statesville Oct 24, Mooreville Oct 25; Taylorsville Oct 26; Lenoir October 28, Boone, Oct 29.

Superintendent of Public Instruction, J Y Joyner, gives out the statement that another rural local tax district has been established in Henderson county that one other election for local tax will be held Oct 6th and that three petitions were presented to the commissioners Oct 3rd, for the holding election on the question. He says that just one year ago the first rural local school district was established in the county at Pleasant Hill and a beautiful building dedicated and doubtless the success of this first district has contributed much toward the establishment of the other districts in the county.

The Retail Merchants Association of Raleigh now has a membership of 590, having elected 23 new members last night. It was first started as a Retail Grocers Association but now extends its membership to all classes of retail merchants. Its operation locally is proving very satisfactory.

Judge Chas A Cook, formerly of Warren county, and appointed to the Supreme Court Bench by Gov Russell to fill out an unexpired term, was here yesterday and today en route from his new home in Indian Territory to his former home in Warren county. Mrs Cook is with him. He expresses himself as highly pleased with his territorial residence.

Col Fred A Olds who has been out of the city for the past three weeks has arrived at Chase City from a six days stay at the World's Fair and expects to return to Raleigh in the next few days and take up his newspaper correspondence again.

News in a Nutshell.

Twenty million dollars the amount of taxes was paid to the city treasury in New York City, the largest amount of taxes that has ever been paid in one day. The amounts received from the Vanderbilt family were \$400,000.

Five submarine torpedo boats whose ultimate destination is Japan are completed at the Four River shipbuilding works, at Quincy and are ready for shipment. They are now in sections on freight cars.

The cable line to Valdez, Alaska, has been practically completed.

New York capitalists completed a deal for the purchase of Popocatepetl volcano in Mexico, with its sulphur deposits.

Pres Roosevelt has appointed First Assistant Postmaster General Robert J. Wynne, to be the Postmaster General in the place of the late Hon. E. C. Payne.

A Wounded Man Appeals to Court for Leniency to His Assailant.

A rare case of charity was one of the features in the Superior court Wednesday. It was one instance that furnishes an example to jail men, a really practical application of the golden rule do unto them as you would have them do unto you.

The case of the State vs Cuddy Sarje, vice for assault with deadly weapon was on trial. This was for the affair which occurred at the Atlantic Coast Line depot Monday morning in which Mr J M J Kane was wounded by Sarje.

While Mr Kane was on the stand as prosecuting witness, he made an appeal to the court to be lenient with the defendant. He stated himself that he had no ill feeling toward Mr Sarje and that that there may have been a cause for the attack inasmuch as there had been another encounter between them in the state of Kentucky. He stated to the court that he would be satisfied if the defendant was released from further punishment.

Judge Council, however, fined Sarje \$50 and costs.
