North Carolina fared exceedingly well in the appropriations granted by Con gress recommended by the River and Harbor Commission. The total amount given to the state will be over a balf on dollars. Congressman Thomas eeded in getting appropriations for the improvement of the Neuse and Trent rivers in the sums of \$50,0.0 and \$80,000 respectively. A rangements have also been made for the deepening of Beaufort harbor.

As compared with North Carolina's share of pork the allotment to the other southern states is interesting. Virginia gets only \$300,000, South Carolina \$100,-000, Georgia, which bas a member of the nittee, gets about the same as North Carolina, and Mississippi, which also has a member on the committee, gets less than North Carolina.

Representative Patterson's district walks away with the lion's share of the state's total appropriation, but that is natural result, since Wilmington is the only port of any considerable comme cial importance in the state. Of the \$590,250 appropriation given North Caro lina, Wilmington's share is \$450,000. As was indicated in this correspondence yesterday the committee gives Wilmington the full amount recommended by the board of engineers. What is especfally pleasing to Representative Patterson is the fact that Wilmington is now put on the list of cities given authorized continuing contracts, and he will be able in the future to devote more time to the Upper Cape Fear project, which will utti cately make Fayettevil'e and vicinity an important commercial centre. An appropriation for this pr j ct was out of the question this year as only the most important and practical schemes were provided for. The upper Cap: Fear pro ject has an available balance to its credit for purchase of sites for locks and dams, and this will be put to practical use at an early date.

The scheme for deepening and improving Beaufort harbor was the next most important for the state, and Representative Thomas scored in scouring substential recognition for the project Mr. Thomas kept his plans quiet and he secured a \$45,007 appropriation which it is believed will give a depth of 20 feet at low water. It is pessible that this appropriation will be increased in the Senate, As Senators Aldrich of Rhode Island and Simmons and Overman, have had such an arrangement in mind. If they do not the appropriation secured by Mr. Thomas will meet the require ments of the situation.




