M rdan's article is as follows:-

There are thousands of people who not yet understand what the South rn Cotton association stands far, who eated the association or what the as ociation is now undertaking to per orm. People in all lines of business rmers, merchants, bankers, edito or newspapers and others still have vague and indistinct idea of the scen of this movement. Many people in all walks of life appear to think that the Southern Cotton association is distinc tively a farmers' movement to be open Alliance, and in which the interest of other lines of business is only incidental to the immediate carrying out and perfection of the resolutions introd and passed at the New Orleans cotton onvention January 24-26, 1905.
