ROCKEFELLER'S INSINCERITY.

da Tarbell Holds the Oil King Falls on His Own Showing of Christian Standard He Pretends.

Cleveland, O., July 18.-Ida Tarbell today, in a telegram to a local news-paper, replied to John D. Rockefeller's defense of his business methods, made by his attorney, Virgil Kline. Her state

ment says in part: "I accuse Mr. Rockefeller not of breaking the law, or even the rules of business as they seem to be interpreted by many men in business- I judge him by the golden rule, and I claim Mr. Rockefeller himself gives me the right to use that rule in estimating his char-

"He presents himself to the public in only two phases, as the richest man in the world and as an active adherent of the Christian church. If Mr. Rocke feller did not and had not all his life publicly declared that the church and the Bible were the most precious things in his life I should hesitate to apply the golden rule to the Corrigan case. As it

is, I claim that I have that right. "I see nothing in what Mr. Kline has written to make me change what I wrote in summing up the case in question. Mr. Rockefeller's practice, mu tual helpfulness has nothing to do with trace, Might makes mistakes right; not generosity, not justice, not humanity. It is a far cry indeed from this creed to the one of that religion which Mr. Fockefeller holds up to the world as his most priceless possession the religion whose very essence is bear ing one another's burdens."
