"The opinion of tobacconists who are in close touch with the market is that prices will be better, though they don't look for a repetition of the fancy prices of 1902. Some reasons given for this belief are the light crop and curtailed acreage in the old belt, a larger number of independent buyers, more in quiry from the two large corporations and the fact that the Japanese govern ment has taken her account from the A. T. Company and will enter the market as an independent buyer. This last fact is especially significant, as the Japs are heavy purchasers of the Amer ican product."


