Washington, D. C. May 4.—President Roosevelt today sent to Congress the special report of James R. Garfield, Commissioner of Corporations on the freight rates and the oil business. The president declared that this report was a very important matter showing how the Standard Oil Co. has benefitted by secret rates from the railroads for years; how it had crushed competition in its methods and had been aided and abetted in its iniquity by the railroads. He suggested that the Interstate Commission be given power to deal with the matter.


