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### Letter to N. C. Armstrong

New Bern, N. C.

Dear Sir:—If you could get five millions round—50 as sweet as a pound of sugar, and cost no more—you'd jump at it, wouldn't you? There wouldn't be 100 lb of any other sugar sold in a year in your town; you'd gobble the trade; and it wouldn't hurt your whole business. ### A Plan That Will Relieve the Present Labor Shortage in Municipalities Will Come to Rescues.

Southern Lumber Journal.

The action of the Georgia and Florida Sawmill Association in Jacksonville the other day, at which time it was resolved to inaugurate a local campaign in all the cities and towns throughout the South, is the right and proper thing and word should be passed down the line to this effect by the lumber contingent all over the country. Under the plan as adopted at Jacksonville it was deemed wise and best that very lumberman should call upon his home paper to urge the mayor and board of aldermen to rigidly enforce the vagrancy law of that community. The scarcity of labor and mill help in the South has assumed such proportions since the first of the year as to arouse the most serious apprehension over the final outcome of this mooted question. At the same time we can all bear testimony to the fact that there is not a city, town or hamlet in the country but what you will find negroes loafing on the street corners and hanging around the wharves and steamship docks in great droves, ranging in size from 5 to 25 in number. Herein lies one of the serious troubles with this vexatious question, and one of the primary causes of the universal scarcity of labor. Since the first of the year matters have been growing from bad to worse, and the importation of foreign labor has thus far failed to remedy the situation.

This plan would have the effect of dissolving and scattering the numerous bands of loafers, who are barely eking out an existence in different cities, towns and villages on five and ten cent jobs; and in this way furnish an immense number of hands for the mills, woods and fields. We honestly believe that we have enough help here in the South, if the vagrant laws were rigidly enforced, to fill every need, and what is more, the average negro help in this country is far superior to that of the average foreigner, such as we have been able thus far to induce to come down this way. Will the Mayors of the different municipalities throughout the country adopt this plan and thereby render a lasting service to a great country? Great shall be their reward if they will.
