A E Eubank of Jacksonville, spent Xmas at home with his mother.

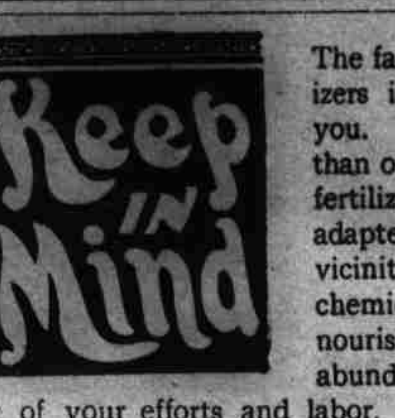
Miss Ina Eubank of Maxton is home with her mother for a while.
