The Loguillo in the only Nation prest in the insular posses United States, and while it reated in 1903, provisions for its ad-ninistration were not made until earin January when the Comptroller t the Treasury affirmed the juris liction of the Department of Agricul ure over the forest.

The forest takes in a little less that 6.000 acres and is located in the north astern part of the island.
