Numbers of wagonloads of holly were seen on the streets yesterday. Just at this time much of this is being used in this city for decorative purposes and the farmers who bring it in are doubtless being well remunerated for the trouble they have in gathering it.

While attempting to make a quick turn with his automobile in front of Mr. J. A. Jones' residence on Broad street yesterday afternoon Mr. W. C. Willett ran the machine against a telephone and severely damaged it, one of the wheels was torn off, the fender smashed and various other parts damaged. Fortunately Mr. Willett was not injured.

It is an attachment for each car of a train that causes the instantaneous application of the air brakes of the entire train the instant the wheels of a single car leaves the track.

The weather was severe enough yesterday morning to make a covering of ice on the water in the slip at Middle street.

Joe Cooper, one of the convicts who escaped from the county chain gang a few days ago was brought back from Goldsboro yesterday by deputy sheriff Williams. Cooper was captured near that place.

Although the temperature yesterday was not as low as it was on the previous day, it was far from being comfortable. The weather bureau predicts more extremely cold weather with snow during the next few days.

A live mink is an object of interest at Jacobs & Co's on Middle St. It is kept in a wire covered box, and is so tame that it can be readily handled. Mink hides are quite valuable, being worth in good condition about seven dollars.

The Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company's plant which is located at James City, will begin operation within the next ten days. All of the machinery has been placed in position and the managers are only waiting upon the arrival of several necessary pieces of shafting before starting up.

MAKING PLANS FOR CELEBRATION

Many Prominent Men Will Be Present at the Celebration of the Opening of the Inland Waterway Jan. 6th.

Beaufort, N. C., Dec. 22—A mammoth celebration, commemorating the opening of the southern end of the great Inland Waterway from Boston to Beaufort, will be held on the bank of the canal on January 6th, 1911. The towns of Beaufort, Morehead City and Oriental have joined hands to give this celebration and to make it a great success, the waterway now completed opening up navigation with the north with these three thriving and prosperous cities.

The character of the celebration will be a fine gastronomic and short speeches from United States Senator F. M. Simmons, member of the National Waterway Commission, Congressman John H. Small, Congressman C. M. Thomas, Governor W. W. Kitchin and Congressman J. Hampton Moore, of Philadelphia, President of the Atlantic Deeper Waterways Association, and other prominent men. The railroads will give special rates and the people can secure transportation from Beaufort, Morehead City and Oriental to the celebration in boats.

There is a committee of five appointed from each of the towns, Beaufort, Morehead City and Oriental, and these committees have selected Mr. W. A. Mace chairman of the Beaufort committee, Mr. H. L. Gibbs chairman of the Oriental committee, Mr. C. S. Wallace, chairman of the Morehead City committee, Mr. C. L. Abernethy chairman of the Publicity committee, Mr. C. D. Jones chairman of the Transportation committee, and Mr. G. I. Canfield General Chairman. There are special committees with Mr. W. S. Chadwick of Beaufort chairman and Mr. W. M. Webb of Morehead City, chairman respectively. Preparations are being pushed to make this one of the most unique celebrations ever held in the South. Large crowds are expected to be in attendance. Special invitations have been issued to the Chambers of Commerce of Wilmington, New Bern, Washington, Plymouth, Elenton, and Elizabeth City to join in this celebration. The public is cordially invited to attend this celebration.
