The Harbor of Refuge.

Beaufort, N. C., Jan. 13.—Opposition to the building of the harbor of refuge at Cape Hatteras, which has been decided upon by Government engineer having in charge of the project, has developed here and the Chamber of Commerce will meet today to advocate Cape Lookout for the sailor's haven.

The chamber will lay particular stress on the shifting sands of Cape Hatteras and the shoals which move up and down the coast for half a mile. They say that to build the harbor where the engineers have selected would mean the expenditure of three times the sum if it was built at Cape Lookout.



GREAT CENTRAL HIGHWAY

From Beaufort to Tennessee Line to be Considered by Convention Feb. 14th.

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 12, 1911. The Wake County Good Roads Association has undertaken to promote the construction, through the heart of North Carolina, from Beaufort harbor to the Tennessee line, of a great road, to be known as the "Central Highway," running through the following counties, cities and towns:

Carteret, Craven, New Bern, Lenoir, Kinston; Wayne, Goldsboro; Johnston, Smithfield, Wake, Raleigh; Durham, Durham; Orange; Hillsboro; Alamance, Graham; Guilford, Greensboro, High Point; Davidson, Thomasville, Lexington; Rowan, Salisbury; Iredell, Statesville; Catawba, Hickory, Newton, Burke, Morganton; McDowell, Marion; Buncombe, Asheville, and Madison, Marshall.

The said Central Highway to be built in the following way:

1. The State Highway Commission to locate and designate the roads, thus avoiding local contentions and frictions; and each county through which the road passes to be authorized, by legislative action, to appropriate not exceeding fifty dollars per mile of road in said county from the general county funds.

2. The road forces now controlled by each county, whether convict or hired, may be used by the county in constructing the portion in that county.

3. Voluntary contributions will be received from public-spirited citizens, owners of automobiles, garages, etc.

4. By volunteer work, to be done on one particular day, to be hereafter named, by all persons who live within five miles of the road and who are willing to contribute to the public good.

Governor Kitchin has recommended the legislative progress to the general assembly; and it is believed no trouble need be anticipated in procuring legislative sanction of the scheme.

For the purpose of reaching a common agreement and the appointment of suitable persons to have charge of the work in each county, a convention is hereby called, to meet in the court house in Raleigh, on Tuesday, the 14th day of February, 1911 at noon; and each county, city and town along the route of said highway is requested to appoint one or more delegates to attend meeting. The number of delegates is unlimited; but whenever called for, the voting will be by counties, each county having one vote; and no county will be expected to yield on any point where its delegates consider the vital interests of that county to be at stake.

The Wake County Good Roads Association requests the Board of County Commissioners of each county to select one or more delegates, who will agree to attend this meeting; and each city and town on the said route is likewise requested to appoint one or more delegates, which appointment may be made either by the Mayor or Board of Aldermen. Each Chamber of Commerce and each Retail Merchants' Association are requested to appoint one or more delegates who will attend. Each local Farmers' Union is likewise requested to appoint one or more delegates. His Excellency, the Governor, is requested to appoint such number of delegates from the State at large as he may deem proper.


