DEMAND FOR KNOWLEDGE

EDGE OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The decision by the trustees of Princeton College to establish a chair of Public Affairs, is one of the notable signs of this progressive educational age.

The increase in size of this government, the increase of municipalities in the amount of matters committed to the charge of their officials, is demanding more every year, that individual business capacity is the greater need, rather than political ingenuity at the polls.

The old time sneer at the college man has changed to an age when education in every thing is demanded, when the farm life school is as necessary as the college that shall prepare men to serve the greatest official positions of trust, in great corporations, in municipal, state and government offices.

The creation of public offices, those for actual affairs shows how men are needed who shall be men fully equipped and more, with a knowledge acquired through practical management as now taught in most schools and colleges.

President George Washington, with his cabinet of five Secretaries of State, Treasury, War, Postmaster General and Attorney General, no doubt felt that he had a body of men fully capable to meet all wants of the government in its every department.

To meet the increasing government needs, there must be men fully equipped to take charge of public affairs. The civil service establishment, hated by politicians who lost their strength thereby, was demanded if government affairs were to be capably carried on.


NOT THAT KIND OF MONEY.

FOR RECORDERS COURT

HON. WHITEHEAD KLUTTZ FAVOR IT.

Hon. Whitehead Klutz has the following to say in reference to what Rowan county Recorder's Court has done:

"I take pleasure in saying that the Rowan county Court has worked well and has given general satisfaction. Before the court was established our civil docket was one of the most congested in the State, and it took two years after issuing summons to reach a case for trial (Craven county is in the same fix today)."

CLEMENT MANLY'S ENDORSEMENT.

Mr. Clement Manly, of Winston-Salem, who for years was a resident of New Bern, writes as follows in regard to what the Recorder's Court has done for Forsyth county:

"I presume it is unnecessary to say anything in regard to its establishment as a great help in the administration of justice. Formerly such courts were likely unnecessary, but now with our increased population in towns, it is absolutely essential that men have a speedy hearing of their cases, and not be made to suffer for the charge for any length of time without trial."

GRAND JURIES FAVORED RECORDER'S COURT.

The opponents of the establishment of the Recorder's Court say that some of the country people favor this bill, however, the grand juries for the February term, 1911, and October, 1910 made the following recommendations:

"We would recommend, if within our province, a Recorder's Court, believing that it would save the county many thousands of dollars to tax payers."

The October term 1910, made the following recommendation:

"We also would recommend that a Recorder's Court be inaugurated for Craven county, believing that it would save the tax payers many thousands of dollars, court costs etc."

On these two grand juries there were only eight men from the Eighth township. Twenty-eight of these men were from the country.

REASONS FOR THIS COURT.

A few reasons why we should have a Recorder's Court: Busy men from all parts of the country will not have to hang around the court house one solid week as witnesses in petty misdemeanors; busy men will not have to serve on the grand jury more than two days; there will be practically no prisoners in jail.

SPEDDY TRIAL CLEARS DOCKET. Chairman Jeffries, of Nash county, says of the Recorder's Court in Nash county:

"It gives speedy trial of all small cases, both criminal and civil, thereby relieving the dockets at the regular court - great saving to the county, as a case is tried at once, saving jail costs our jail has had its doors thrown open many times as we had no prisoners. The court is very popular here with both the bar and the citizens of the county."

SAVED THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS.

James W. Smith, Mayor of Belhaven, N. C., says in reference to what the people of Belhaven think of the Recorder's Court there:

"They think the very highest of it, in fact, if the court had to be ratified by submitting it to the vote of the people again, I am sure there would not be an opposing vote. It has done considerable towards relieving the congestion of the superior court docket of this county. In a financial way the court has saved the county several thousands of dollars, it has also saved the people of our district considerable expense and time, on account of the fact that heretofore they had to attend superior court as witnesses in some little frivolous case and possibly had to stay there for three or four days and often times a week where now the Recorder's Court has very nearly put an end to our people having to attend superior court, that is in criminal cases."

MR. GROVES EXPLAINS.

Several taxpayers having spoken to me about the calculations and figures appearing in the several unsigned articles published in the New Bern Journal and other sources recently for The Recorder's Court and they having the wrong impression that I had made some of the calculations, an explanation on my part becomes necessary.

I will state, that with the exception of the amount published as having been paid by the county during the year 1910, which was taken from the public records and is as follows:
