Mexico City, June 8-Sixty-three persons were killed, 75 wounded and property worth \$100,000 was wredged today by an earthquake which shook the Mexican capital and injected a note of tragedy into what was be be a day of pure rejoicing over the arrival of

Francisco I, Madero, Jr. When the work of searching the ruins is completed it is possible that the live or dead will be increased somewhat as here and there throughout the city there doubtless are many wounded who, with traditional fear of the authorities and government hospitals, are anxious to

evade discovery. The earthquake shook the city just before daylight. At the first shock every light was extinguished and there was a rumble like artillery, which pre-

vailed for several momen's. No pe sonal property of Americans was damaged, and, with the exception of one Chinese killed, no foreigners were injured. In the barracks where the soldiers were killed, 12 women also lost their lives. They were the wives

of artillerymen. The water mains of the city were not injured and the light and power company suffered little inconvenience in operations.
