## THIRTY SPINNING MILLS CLOSED

Many Thousands of Operatives Thrown Out of Employment For Ten Days of Longer

Gastonia, 3.—Thirty or more spinning mills in Gaston county will be closed down for the next ten days, or two weeks, and as a consequence many thousand mill operatives will be idle for that period. This number represents 75 per cent or more of the spinning mills and even larger percentage of spindles in this country. Those mills which use their own yarn in manufacturing cloth will not close down, though it is a fact that a few of the mills included in this number are affected by the shortage of power caused by low water on the Catawba and a consequent shortage in electric power available. The unfavorable condition of the yarn market is given as the real cause for this shut-down. One of the best posted manufacturers in this section stated today that he would not be surprised if the larger part of the spinning mills in Gaston and this immediate section should find it necessary to remain idle for a month or more.



## FOOTBALL IS DANGEROUS.

If You Don't Think So Try to Start a Game in Turkey.

It is, or was until recently, a difficult matter to be a sportsman in Turkey. One Rehad Bey tried it, with a result weird enough to serve as a basis for a detective story or a comic opera. The young Turk had organized a football team among his friends, together with some Greeks and Armenians, and began practicing. Not very long after, in the middle of the night, police came to his house and carried him off to Scutari. There he was submitted to a long interrogation as to the club and the game of football.

The authorities were convinced that they had found a great plot and that the club must be a secret society. A special messenger was sent for the ball, and that was duly examined and found to be an infernal machine. The rules of the game were considered to be another piece of damning evidence, and still worse were the sweaters and colors of the club.

## Notice of Election.

Whereas; one fourth of the freeholders of number eight township, having certified their intention to apply to the Board of Trustees of the county Farm Life School located in the Eight Township, and whereas, the said one fourth of the freeholders of said number eight township, presented a petition to this Board, asking that an Election be held in Number Eight Township at the regular polling places in said Township, on Saturday July 22 1911, under and by virtue of section 9, chapter 84 of the laws of 1911, for the purpose of voting a thirty year bond issue, in the sum of twenty five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars, of said Eight Township, Craven County Bonds, bearing 5 per cent interest, and for levying and collecting on all the taxable property and polls in said Township, sufficient to provide for the payment of the interest on said bonds, and creating a sinking fund for the payment thereof, for the purpose of offering the same under the provisions of section 9, as aforesaid, to the said Trustees of the County Farm Life School. Provided said County Farm Life School be located in the Eight Township. Now therefore; it is hereby ordered that an Election be called and held in Number Eight Township, Craven county, at the regular polling places in said Township on Saturday July 22 1911, during the hours on said day as prescribed by the general law governing State and County Elections. The said Election shall be conducted in all other respects under the provisions of the general law governing general Elections. A new registration in said Township is hereby called, to be had in said Township under the provisions of the general law governing new registrations, at which Election those favoring the issuing of said Township Bonds and the levying and collecting of such a tax for such a purpose, shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "For County Farm Life School," and those opposed shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "Against County Farm Life School." Registered further that for the purpose of holding such Election, the following are hereby appointed Registrars and Pollholders, at the regular polling places which are as follows:

First Ward—At the City Hall, Registrar Aba Lee, Pollholders, J. B. Hill, Mayer Hahn,  
Second Ward—At the Court House, Registrar C. K. Hancock, Pollholders, Walter Fulford, Jesse Pope.  
Third Ward—At Atlantic Engine House, Registrar, C. W. Ball Pollholders J. D. McKay, D. W. Bsnight.  
Fourth Ward—At Fourth Ward Fire Company's House, Registrar Alex McLacklan, Pollholders J. F. Henderson, W. F. Gilbert.  
Bern Precinct—At 6th, Ward Hose Reel Headquarters, Registrar, J. H. Stanley, Pollholders B. F. Dukes, E. L. Smith.  
Beech Grove—Registrar J. B. French, Pollholders Daniel Lane, K. McKeel.  
Gum Rows—Registrar J. Wilcox, Pollholders B. B. Scott, D. F. Atkinson.  
Tisdale—Registrar, W. F. Crockett, Pollholders J. T. Shute, Carter Tisdale.

At the close of said Election the Registrars and Pollholders of the First, the Second, the Third, the Fourth Wards, Bern Precinct, Beech Grove, Gum Rows and Tisdale No. Eight Township shall certify the returns of said Election to the Board of County Commissioners, at the meeting of said Board to be held on the First Monday in August 1911, in the same manner and governed by the same laws and such election officers are required to certify election returns for any general election.

## SHORT PASSING EVENTS

Carteret county's first cotton blossom was sent in from Pelletier by Mrs. Clarie Smith, who says that she plucked it from her field June 27th.

The schooner Annie Farrow, Capt. Burrus, arrived from Hyde county yesterday with a cargo of country produce, such as cattle, hogs, chickens etc.

The Journal has received a cotton blossom from L. C. Stokes a farmer living near Grifton, who says that it is the first one reported in that section. It was plucked June 27th.

A telephone message was received from Vanceboro yesterday, saying that the rains of Wednesday and Thursday had done much good although crops had not been particularly suffering from drought. Crops are described as being perfectly beautiful.

A report from Oriental yesterday stated that a colored woman had been so badly burned at her home near that place that it was more than probable that she would succumb to her injuries. Meagre details were learned in regard to the accident, but it seems that she was attempting to make a fire in the cook stove with a can of kerosene and the can exploded while she held it in her hand.

### SATURDAY.

Another large shipment of Irish potatoes passed through this city yesterday morning enroute from Pamlico county. All during the present week large shipments of the tubers have been made from that county and from all reports the farmers are receiving good prices for their products.

His many friends in this city will regret to learn that Mr. R. C. Roberson, of Clayton, N. C., and who recently assumed the management of the Gaston Drug Company, is seriously ill at the home of his parents at Clayton. Mr. Roberson was taken ill in this city several days ago with an attack of typhoid fever and was carried home.

Next Wednesday the First Baptist Sunday School of this city will picnic at Oriental. A special train will be secured to carry the crowd down to that place and the fare for the round trip will be very reasonable. This will be a good opportunity to visit that place and it is more than probable that a number of outsiders will take advantage of this reduced rate.

The Broad Street Grocery Co. is making preparations to remove to the brick store on Broad street that was occupied by C. V. McGehee. New goods are being placed there every day but the business will not be transferred until next week. The removal is necessitated because of lack of room in the present quarters. The new place is considerably larger and in better shape to accommodate the large and rapidly increasing business of the company.

Yesterday afternoon Capt. Harper took a party down to Slocum's creek on a crabbing expedition.

Last Friday night one of the valuable horses belonging to Daniels & Newberry was stricken with an attack of colic, and before medical aid could be secured the animal died.

Quite a large shipment of soft shell crabs passed through the city yesterday morning enroute from Morehead City and Beaufort to points in the western part of the State.

Mr. T. F. McCarty is having the building that occupied the corner of his lot on Pollock street and which was formerly occupied by T. F. McCarty & Son grocery store torn down, in order to enlarge his lawn and so that he could further improve the premises surrounding his dwelling.

A company of colored people have purchased an automobile and will use it for a public conveyance, for hire, especially to take out pleasure parties for a ride. It is said that the charge per person is forty cents for a ride "around the circle," that is from town out Jacksmith road, via the Oaks to Neuse road and back, which is quite reasonable, in the absence of a car line.

It is understood that several licenses to sell malt liquor have been issued in this city by the U. S. Government.

Whether the owners of these licenses will make an attempt to sell malt here is not known. In the law enacted at the recent session of the legislature there was nothing said in regard to this variety of liquor and it is probable that an attempt will be made to place it on sale.

The other morning a small colored boy who had beat a ride from the passenger station on the eastbound passenger train came near losing his life by attempting to jump from the steps of the car. He was thrown several feet away and rolled down an embankment but fortunately he escaped serious injury. This business of young boys beating rides on trains is very dangerous and should be stopped.

### TUESDAY.

Today, July 4th, being a Legal Holiday, there will be no business transacted by the banks of this city.

Misses Addie Bagwell and Mamie Denton left, today for New Bern to attend Miss Pearl Walters house party. They will go to Morehead before returning home.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Three cases of disorderly conduct were disposed of in the police court yesterday afternoon. The defendants all plead guilty to the charges against them and were released upon the payment of the cost of the cases.

Several of the local dealers have fireworks on sale at their places of business. Each year the celebration of the "Glorious Fourth" in this manner collects a ghastly toll in the maiming and death of hundreds of children and it is to be hoped that nothing of this sort will occur in this city today.

The Sunday excursion train from this city to Wilmington is gaining for itself a distinction that is not at all enviable. Parties going over to spend the day at Wrightsville say that on both the outgoing and incoming trains crowds of disorderly and terrorizing passengers by their conduct. Few people desire to travel over a road that allows such conduct.

In attempting to avoid running down a launch loaded with ladies and children as it was passing through the draw at Morehead City Sunday afternoon the torpedo boat "DeLong" ran into the draw and the bow of the boat was badly battered. The captain of the vessel stated to the Journal reporter yesterday that unless he had run his boat against the draw it would have struck the launch and cut it in two. Fortunately the jar did not start a leak in the vessel and it was able to come on to this city.

## OYSTER ISLANDS.

Their Growth is Exactly Analogous to That of Coral Reefs.

Oyster islands similar to those formed of coral are found in several parts of the world. The islands in Newport river and Beaufort harbor, North Carolina, says a writer in the Century Path Magazine, have been discovered to have as base a reef to which the spawn were attached and above this layer upon layer of oysters, vegetable growth and debris brought by the action of the waves and winds, all of which finally grows high enough to rise above the surface of the water. This growth is exactly analogous to that of the coral islands of the Pacific. The islands near the mouth of the river Tagus, in Portugal, are said to have been built up in this way also. Here, where there is such a quantity of oysters that 100,000,000 a year would scarcely be missed if they were removed, the expanse of water just beyond the river's mouth is dotted with oyster islands. As in the case of the coral reefs, which on the seaward side may be covered with living, growing coral, live oysters thrive in the same waters where the accumulation of dead generations has served to form the islands.

Muscles May Move Themselves.  
Albert von Haller, a Swiss surgeon of the eighteenth century, was the first to point out that the muscles of our bodies have an automatic action. Before Haller's time it was believed that the muscles could not contract or swell up of themselves, but were drawn up by the nerves of volition. Haller discovered that this is not so, but that a muscle, if irritated, will draw itself together automatically, even when it is quite separated from the nerves, and this has since been proved to be true by a great number of experiments. So that, though it is true our nerves are the cause of our moving, because they excite the muscles and so cause them to contract, yet the real power of contraction is in the muscle itself. The body of man is full of wonders, not the least of which is this automatic power of contraction in all muscles.—Louisville Courier-Journal.
