**The Size of Some Stars.**

M. Nordmann of the Paris Observatory believes that he has devised a successful method of determining the diameters of stars by a comparison of their effective temperatures with their parallaxes. In the case of some of the brightest stars he has reached interesting results. Thus he finds that Aldebaran, the bright star in Taurus, a veritable giant sun, the ratio of its diameter to that of our sun being greater than that of the sun to the planet Jupiter. This means that Aldebaran has a diameter probably not less than 8,000,000 miles, or more than thirty times the distance from the earth to the moon. On the other hand, Sirius, the dog star, to our eyes the brightest of all the stars, is, according to M. Nordmann, but little larger than our sun.

At the close of said election, the Registrar and Poll-holders shall certify the returns of said election to the Board of County Commissioners, at their next regular meeting after said election, in the same manner and governed by the said laws as such election, officers are requested to certify election returns in any general election.
