SUNDAY.

The attention of all the sportsmen in this section is called to the fact that the season for hunting squirrels will not open until October 1st. Those caught violating this law will be dealt with according to the law governing that offense.

It is understood that an attractive premium list will be printed for the big agricultural exhibit which is to be held in this city on November 22 and 23. Several hundred prizes will be given to the various contestants and in order to arouse more enthusiasm it was thought best to issue such a premium list.

Next Wednesday, September 27th Haug's combined shows will exhibit in this city. This aggregation is one of the largest on the road this season and you should not fail to see it. The free street parade at 11 o'clock will be worth walking many miles to see. Come to New Bern on that day and mingle with the large crowd that will be here to attend this circus.

Geo. F. Anderson and Dallas Morris, two young white men who live near Vanceboro, were given a hearing before Justice of the Peace S. R. Street yesterday morning on a warrant sworn out by Game Warden Geo. B. Waters, charging them with shooting squirrels before the season opened. They were found guilty and before they were released, contributed their mite to the county funds.

TUESDAY.

Next Friday night the Dandy Dixie Minstrels will give a performance at the Masonic opera house. The entire theatre will be turned over to the colored people.

Mr. King informed us that he has been transferred to Spartansburg, S. C., and that he will leave for that city on October 1st.

A colored man who said that his name was Fred Davis was brought to this city yesterday morning on the Atlantic Coast Line train, with a badly injured foot. The negro said that he was accidentally shot Sunday night at a point a few miles from this city. He was carried to Stewart's sanitarium where medical attention was rendered him.

The Lyceum Course Promises a Rare Treat For New Bern People This Winter.

New Bern people are promised a very rare treat in the attractions which will appear on the graded school lyceum course this winter. Washington will have them this winter for the second time, and they are one of the numbers on the big Atlanta course.

Birds and Fishes and Glass.

A correspondent recently reported what he described as the "curious freak" of a blackbird flying against a parlor window many times at the same spot continuously. Such an incident is not uncommon. Birds have been known to fight for hours at a time, day after day, with their own image reflected in a pane of glass, pecking and fluttering against the pane and quite exhausting themselves in their fury to demolish the supposed rival. It is another instance of how the arts of our civilization corrupt and confuse the birds. It is the same with fishes. Darwin tells a story of a pike in an aquarium separated by plate glass from fish which were its proper food. In trying to get at the fish the pike would often dash with such violence against the glass as to be completely stunned. It did this for more than three months before it learned caution. Then when the glass was removed the pike would not attack those particular fish, but would devour others freshly introduced. It did not at all understand the situation, but associated the punishment it had received not with the glass, but with a particular kind of fish.

VISIBLE SUPPLY OF COTTON

In Sight Considerably Larger Than Last Year.

New Orleans, Sept. 22.—Secretary Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton issued yesterday shows the total visible to be 1,921,700 bales against 1,897,944 last week and 1,776,123 last year. Of this the total of American cotton is 1,265,700 bales against 1,011,944 last week and 972,123 last year, and 1,766,925 year before last and of all other kinds, including Egypt, Brazil, India, etc., 656,000 bales against 786,000 last week and 694,000 last year.

Of the world's visible supply of cotton there is now afloat and held in Great Britain and continental Europe 919,000 against 854,000 last year; in Egypt 24,000 against 25,000 last year; in India 972,400 against 828,000 last year, and in the United States 895,000 against 856,000 last year.

The cotton trade is pessimistic, we had a much lower market today. Receipts continue heavy in the South, and the market at present is badly mixed with uncertainties. The farmers are marketing their cotton freely as the enormous receipts indicate, and the cotton market is influenced thereby. So long as we have such heavy receipts the bears will continue to depress the price, and the market will decline further.

Cotton is too cheap at 10 cents.

MAKING FINE BACK FAST

Trust Makes \$200,000 A Day by Raising Price On Sugar. Don't Mind Paying Small Fine.

New York, Sept. 25.—The sugar trust, which was convicted recently of robbing the Government by means of false weights, is now said to be making a profit of \$200,000 a day over and above its profits at the beginning of July, when the price of sugar was increased. Another quarter of a cent a pound has just been added to the wholesale price, which will increase the additional profits. On July 1 the price was advanced. Calculating the actual working days from July 1 to September 18 at seventy the additional profits of the trust in that short time have amounted to \$14,000,000. Last June 30 the trust was charging 4-3/4 cents a pound. Assuming that today it is obtaining only 6-7/8 cents, which it ostentatiously advertises, the difference between those two figures is 2 cents a pound, or \$10 a ton of 3,000 pounds. The trust sells 5,000 tons of sugar every working day of the week. Consequently the additional profit to the trust on its own figures is \$200,000 a day. Washington B. Thomas, head of the trust, is reticent as to the immediate plans of the sugar people.
