CUBAN REBELS BURN PROPERTY

Reinforcements Are Rushed to Marine Detachment on Duty at Mines—Three Hundred Insurgents Surrender.

Santiago, June 21.—The buildings of the Ponopo Manganese Company, an American concern, situated near La Maya, about seven miles from Santiago have been burned by the Cuban insurgents.

A detachment of forty marines under command of Captain Alexander S. Williams, U. S. M. C., arrived here on a special train from Guantanamo to reinforce the garrison at Firmeza mines and to protect the property of the Jurgua Iron Company.

As a result of the latest amnesty proclamation issued by General Monteagudo, commander-in-chief of the government forces, about 300 insurgents came in and surrendered to the military authorities.

The indications are that the actual rebel forces are not diminishing.

ALLEGED DISTILLER CAPTURED

Pick Willis, of Vanceboro, Caught in the Government's Drag Net For an Alleged Violation of the Internal Revenue Law.

Pick Willis, white, of Vanceboro, was arrested yesterday morning by Deputy Marshall Samuel Lilly on a capias issued by the Clerk of the Federal Court on an indictment already found charging him with illicit distilling.

The defendant was brought to this city and carried before United States Commissioner Chas. B. Hill for a preliminary hearing. At the hearing three witnesses swore that they had purchased whiskey from the defendant. The Commissioner found probable cause and bound him over to the next term of Federal Court under a bond of \$300. He could not give this bond and was committed to the Craven county jail.

Pick Willis is the father of M. R. Willis who was arrested by Deputy Marshall Lilly several days ago while he was enroute to this city and who later gave bond for his appearance at the next term of Federal Court to answer to an indictment on the same charge.

WRECK ON NORFOLK SOUTHERN

Tender Of Engine No. 1 Turns Turtle and Train Is Delayed For Several Hours. No One Injured.

DISORDERS IN LISBON

Demonstration Joined by Large Portion of Populace. Cavalry Called Out Charges on the Crowd With Drawn Sabres.

Lisbon, Portugal, June 24.—Serious disorders broke out in the streets of the capital yesterday morning when three bombs were thrown in Dom Pedro square, by striking street car employes. One person was killed and thirty others were hurt.

The demonstration was joined by a large portion of the populace. The cavalry were called out and charged the crowd with drawn sabres. There were many arrests, the prisoners being conveyed to the workshops. Strong forces of infantry and cavalry occupy the streets and principal squares. The government fears the monarchists may seize the opportunity to attempt an invasion.
