GOVERNMENT SHY BIG SUM TO PAY BILLS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 .- A bill for \$340,000,000 against the government falls due today and at the same time the treasury is to collect \$650,000,000 in income and excess profits taxes.

About \$700,000,000 in treasury certifientes of indebtedness mature today and at the same time the semi-anunal interest on the first liberty loan and the victory liberty loan, aggregating about \$140,-000,000, became payable. In order to provide for current expenses and to meet the remainder of the heavy obligations which mature in January, including \$300,000,000 in certificates, Secretary Houston has offered two new issues of certificates aggregating about \$500,000,-

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 .- The fate of he navel hall on which left Rockaway Point for Canada on Monday afternoon with three passengers and which was repriced to have crashed into the side of York Mountain near Wells, N. Y., last right, was still uncertain today.
