COTTON MARKET SHOWS RENEWED WEAKNESS

Unfavorable Trade Developments Cause Further Drop in Spot Prices—New Business Awaits Stronger Demand for Finished Goods.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—The cotton market has continued its downward course with increased selling pressure of spots from the south at further price concessions; this with a general withdrawal of support by the local and Liverpool speculative element and the limited demand from consumers during the holiday period has given the market the appearance at times of being a very one-sided affair.

cloth market is quiet with quotations nominal or unchanged but with some business doing for immediate delivery.

The general sentiment in the cotton goods trade is that no increased new business will develop until retail prices are further reduced to a level that will materially increase the demand for actual consumption.

WILL INVESTIGATE DEATH OF YOUNG BOSSELMANN

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Federal investigation of the death of Carl BosseLMann, importer of Washington, was ordered by Police officials today following reports to the young man's father that he had been killed by a blow struck by a policeman.

BosseLMann was found unconscious on a sidewalk early yesterday morning and died in a hospital. His companion told his father, the latter said, that BosseLMann was behaving in a boisterous manner following a new year's party, and was struck by a policeman he encountered while on his way to a hotel.

The policeman, questioned last night by detectives, denied having struck BosseLMann.

CENTRAL OF GEORGIA WANTS EQUIPMENT TRUST FUND

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Central of Georgia, a subsidiary of the Southern Railway, has applied to the Federal Reserve Board for permission to issue a trust fund for the purchase of equipment.

The trust fund would amount to \$1,000,000, and would be used for the purchase of equipment valued at \$1,000,000. The trust fund would bear interest at the rate of 7 per cent and are payable in annual installments, maturing in 1940.

The Richmond Terminal Railway Company also applied for permission to issue trust notes amounting to \$25,000. One note for \$12,500 would be made payable to the Richmond, Fredericksburg & Potomac Railroad Company and the other for a like amount, to the Atlantic Coast Line.

Both notes to bear interest at the rate of six per cent and to expire on January 1, 1924, the date of issue requested being January 1, this year.
