C., Jan. 7 --- A jury in the court of general sessions here this morning returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Will Lattimore placed on trial yesterday for the killing of Mack Lowry, in this county, in 1901. Lattimore fled immediately after the killing and was not apprehended until two months ago, when he returned and surrendered. He claimed the killing was an accelent. He said he had been living at Caroleen, N. C., less than 30 mile from here, for the past year.
