TEXT OF BILL OFFERED BY REV. W. C. BARRETT.

Following is the text of the bill offered recently in the North Carolina General Assembly by Rev. W. C. Barrett, pastor of the First Baptist church in Gastonia:

A Bill To Be Entitled An Act To Amend Chapter 90, Public Laws 1919, As Amended, Session 1920.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That in the preamble of Sec. 90, Chapter 90, Public Laws 1919 as amended by Session 1920, that after the word "follows" in line sixteenth the following words shall be inserted, "except as hereinafter provided."

Section 2. That Section First of aforesaid Section and Chapter, be and the same is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof: "Where the person or persons entitled to any beneficial interest in such property shall be the legal issue, or legal ancestor adopted child, or husband or wife of the person who died possessed of such property aforesaid, or where the person to whom such property shall be devised or bequeathed stood in the relation of child to the person who died possessed of such property aforesaid, such person or persons shall be exempt from the payment of said tax, and the Clerk of the Superior Court shall determine whether any person to whom property is so devised or bequeathed stands in the relation of child to the decedent."

Section 3. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

MONEY IN SWEET POTATOES

FOR FARMERS OF THE SOUTH

ATLANTA, Ga., March 4. - Sweet potatoes could be made to yield a much larger money return to Southern farmers if there were sufficient curing and storage houses in the producing sections says General Agricultural Agent Roland Turner, of the Southern Railway System. "There is a growing demand for Southern sweet potatoes from consumers outside the South as well as in the Southern cities," declares Mr. Turner "and this crop can be made to bring much more money to Southern farmers if facilities can be provided for storing and curing the potatoes so that marketing can be spread over the greater part of the year instead of being confined to the harvesting season. Plenty of sweet potatoes are grown in the South, but sufficient attention has not been given to the marketing feature and to proper grading."

Several years ago the Southern Railway aided in introducing the Southern sweet potato into northern markets and this and similar efforts have created a demand which is not now being supplied. For years Southern sweet potatoes have been featured on the menus of Southern Railway System dining cars and an increasing demand for sweet potato dishes particularly from tourist travelers, has developed.

Plans for the construction of curing and storage houses can be secured from the United States Department of Agriculture or from any state agricultural college and the Development Service of the Southern Railway System will be glad to assist in every way possible at any point on its lines where there is an interest in such an enterprise.

ABANDONED TASK OF MOVING SUBMARINE.

(By The Associated Press.)

NEW BEDFORD, Mar. 4. - After moving the Grand United States submarine O.S. two hundred feet along the beach at the east end of Pequot Island in Buzzards Bay, the coast guard cutter Washnet temporarily abandoned the task early today. A further attempt will be made to release the submarine later in the afternoon.

The O.S. struck during a fog late yesterday. The crew remained on the vessel, which started away during the night. Navy authorities said there was no danger unless heavy northeast wind set in.

The Washnet reached the submarine at midnight. Several lines were thrown aboard and unsuccessful efforts were made to pull the craft into deep water by the tide ebbed.

The City's coast guard crew, in a power boat and the mine sweeper tender with the Washnet stand by to render assistance.

IMPORTANT TO MEXICO.

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 4. - Mr. Harding's inauguration was considered, by Mexican City newspapers as of immense importance to this country, there being a general belief that a definite Mexican policy would be announced soon.

The presence of Senator Fall in the interior appointments, with Henry P. Fletcher as Under Secretary, was a matter of some concern, Senator Fall already having been elected as an "elector" to Mexico.

WOODBURY CONFIRMED.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4. - The Senate today confirmed the nomination of Assistant Secretary Woodbury, of the navy department, upon motion of Senator Poindexter, republican, Washington.

SOME UNEASINESS SHOWN IN PARIS

PARIS, March 4. - Underlying editorial comment upon the inauguration of a new president of the United States in this morning's newspapers there was a certain amount of uneasiness as to the effect of Mr. Harding's policy on the European situation. The inauguration of Mr. Harding was given much attention, but by no means as much of an unknown quantity to most of the editors.

The Journal observed it had "caution" in the brightness and broad political sense of Mr. Harding to regard, as far as possible, the consequences of Mr. Wilson's mistakes.

The appointment of Charles E. Hughes as secretary of state was considered by the newspaper as an evidence of good will to France, and hope was expressed that Myron T. Herrick would be appointed ambassador to France.

"Sure of American friendship," said the Echo de Paris, "we can only rejoice to see at last the great transatlantic republic resume its place in the international council board."

Apparent contradiction in Mr. Harding's utterances on international questions, were pointed out by L'Homme Libre, Premier Clemenceau's newspaper, and it expressed fear that Mr. Harding would be opposed by Senate leaders notably by Boies Penrose, of Pennsylvania. Hope was expressed, however, that any obstruction would not have regrettable consequences for other countries, particularly France.
